Words from the Alsherjargothi



The Mission to Establish Njörðshof

"The third among the Æsir is he that is called Njördr: he dwells in heaven, in the abode called Nóatún. He rules the course of the wind, and stills sea and fire; on him shall men call for voyages and for hunting. He is so prosperous and abounding in wealth, that he may give them great plenty of lands or of gear; and him shall men invoke for such things."

Njörðr shall have his hof and our AFA Family shall make this happen. The road to Njörðshof begins today and has 3 phases:

- 1. We must pay off the remaining loan amount for our previous 2 hofs: MISSION ACCOMPLISHED! (pay off check will be in the mail Monday!)
- 2. We increase or Maintain our average monthly income (including this fundraiser!): We have met the Goal, now we MUST maintain it!
- 3. We locate a property and secure funding and any necessary down-payment: We have compiled a list of counties in order of best to less best. We have secured lending for \$20,000 (not enough...but possibly enough for nonpayment.) We have a list of Real Estate Agents to begin contacting next week.

I will adjust these numbers and update you all on progress as it happens. Your generosity is Astounding and ALWAYS appreciated.


The price of tickets includes a camping spot for the weekend! Detailed event information is available prior to the event.

When the harvest is in, the summer plants have died off, and the winter is quickly approaching the veil between the living and dead is said to be at its thinnest. Again, we will gather to worship our Gods, our Goddesses, and our Ancestral Mothers in the crisp air of mountains as winter sets in. We build upon the success of the Asatru Folk Assembly here in the Northeast by making new friends and renewing old friendships. We look forward to seeing members and friends!

Your registration fee includes all workshops, lectures, meals, cabin lodging, and of course our holy rituals. Only AFA members and vouched-for-guests will be admitted to this event. If you are not an AFA Member you should confirm with the member who is vouching for you that they will do so when asked about your registration.



Day of Remembrance

King Radbod of Frisia

August 9



Radbod, known as the greatest King of the Frisians, spent his life tirelessly fighting against the subjugation of the Franks. While his predecessor, Aldegisel, had accepted Christian conversion easily, Radbod was unwilling to stray from his belief in the Gods of his people.

On the verge of accepting baptism, Radbod turned to the Priest presiding and asked if his ancestors would be waiting for him in the Kingdom of Heaven. Upon being told that his pagan ancestors were burning in Hell Radbod refused the baptism, expressing that he would rather burn in Hell with his pagan ancestors than live in Heaven with beggars.

His rule, 680 - 719 CE, was spent fighting against the Frankish rule and banishing Christianity from his land. Despite losing to Pepin of Hertal on several occasions

Radbod never gave up. While never successful in his lifetime, his successors continued the battle for many years after his death.

What can we learn from this story?

Radbod was not bolstered in his mission by success. When he looked back he did not see win after win, but quite the opposite. What Radbod could see, however, was the long line of his Ancestors stretching back to the first in his line. He saw them and he was proud of them and of their faith. Rather than disappointing them, King Radbod did his very best to make them proud and to continue their legacy.

Our culture, our society, as a whole, is under attack. They would have us turn our back on our families and on our folk. They would have us turn our backs on Asatru and our Ancestors. They would see the death of the traditional nuclear family and of the dedicated community. Everything from the books we read to the shows we watch looks to tear down the idea that our Folk should grow stronger together.

Like Radbod we should look behind us to see the long line of our Ancestors standing behind us, supporting us. We should then look forward to the bright future for our children and their children, a future that we should fight for tirelessly, no matter how many times we might stumble along the way.

Greetings from Indiana



July has been a month of growth for us here in Indiana. We have had two new members join the AFA and a few potential members asking questions and inquiring about membership. One of our new members participated in July's Heimdall's Midgard Camping event. It's always great to meet new Folk and build frith with them. We all came together for Sigrblot and feasting! Great times!



On our Kindred Camps, we never use a lighter to start a fire. It is always done in a very primal way. I like to start our holy fire with sparks. I never use any type of flammable fluid when building the Holy fire that cooks our food, lights the night, and more. This month I have begun working on making short survival videos. I have the first one done and I'm going to add to it each Heimdall's Midgard Camping trip. After I've built up a handful of these videos, rounding out what I'd like to teach, I'll make them available for our Folk. Heimdall means something like, "Hearth-Fire," or "fire of the home." That is one reason our fires are built this way.

On the weekend of the last Sunday of the month, you can always expect a weekend of outdoors AFA frith in Southern Indiana. 

Asatru At Home

When I first joined the Asatru Folk Assembly in 2018, my mission was simple. I wanted to learn how to practice Asatru at home in a meaningful and powerful way that was easy to teach my youngest daughter in the coming years. What I learned and have continued to learn is the importance of Ancestor Worship.

When most of us think of doing proper worship, we think of a gift cycle to our noble Gods and loving Goddesses. However, we often overlook the practice of ancestor worship. We often have altars at home dedicated to Odin and Thor, Frigg and Baldur, which is appropriate. But to some of us, we may see the gods in an abstract way. They are so powerful, their nature is so mysterious, we may never fully understand them. But our ancestors, we know them. We have been held in their loving arms, hugged them, and eaten meals with them. Spent years of our lives looking up to them. Often we have pictures of grandparents on an altar. But what does ancestor worship consist of and what can we do to honor them in a spiritual way?

Alongside our portraits of our grandparents and great grandparents at our family altar at home, Heather and I have small items that belonged to a loved one, such as jewelry, medals that her grandfather earned in the service, and things of that nature. Sometimes I'll pour a shot of rum for my grandfather (his favorite drink.) I'm currently trying to track down my grandmother Mary's favorite perfume. We may pray to our ancestors to brag to them about an accomplishment that they would find joy in. Or thank them for the time we had with them. Ask them for guidance in life's difficult times. Things we would normally do if they were still with us on Midgard.

Another common way to honor our ancestors is during sumbel. During sumbel we encourage folks to say their ancestors' name over the horn, which, in a sense, brings their glorious deeds to light in a powerful way. Simply saying "Hail Papa Dan", using a sweet nickname that he would recognize is nice, but saying "Hail Col. Dan Van Sickel!" gives us and those who watch our worlds a much clearer picture of who he was, and is in my life.

A practice that has been becoming much more common is preparing a plate at a high place at the table during feasts at Hofs, Kindred events. Where maybe the folk gathered to prepare a full plate for the collective ancestors or someone, in particular, we want to honor. Recently the team at Thorshof dedicated a shrine to our friend, Terry Rumph by sharing a beverage with him at his Shrine.

These are just simple examples of the practice of ancestor worship and are by no means dogmatic. There are plenty of ways you can honor your ancestors at home. But the very best way to honor them is to carry ourselves in an honorable and noble way that would make them all proud. We are, after all, their representatives, and as Elder Gothi McNallen has said, "we are all ancestors in training."

Hail the Ancestors!


Salsa and Ducks


BBQ, Swimming, and Smiles






