

# Day of Remembrance





Near to what could be considered the beginning of the Christian conversion of Norway, under King Olaf Tryggvason, there was a farmer of Noble stock who stood against the king and his attempts at conversion.

Eyvind (Pronounced Ivin) Kinnrifi was called to make plans against the upcoming invasion by his friend Harek of Thjotta, who had very recently returned home after himself refusing conversion to Christianity. Eyvind answered the call, and for the sake of haste, he traveled with only a small retinue of men. He was well welcomed by Harek, but shortly after his arrival Eyvind was ambushed.

Unbeknownst to Harek, he had been followed by some of Olaf Tryggvason's men. They forced Eyvind to Throndhjem, where Olaf attempted to convert Evyind, first with offers of land and gold, and then with threats of torture and death. Unwilling to turn him back on his faith, Eyvind was eventually killed.

So what can we learn from this story?

On the 9th of February, as we stop to remember Eyvind Kinrifi and his unwavering faith despite the consequences, take a moment to consider what in your own life is important to you. Have there ever been times in which you had to choose between keeping your faith and losing something else? A Job? A friend? Family?

Even in these times, when we are living with unparalleled freedom of choice, it can be difficult to choose faith over all else. It is sometimes easier to hide behind the idea of a pseudonym or to keep your faith hidden from those in our lives that should matter. Remember, when you think of Eyvind, what truly matters. Stand strong with and take pride in your Folk.

# Charming of the Plow



Charming of the Plow is a ritual that takes place at the early beginning of the planting season. As the name implies the plow, or other tools used, are blessed and offerings are made to the Gods for a productive growing season. Traditionally, after blessing the plow, a ceremonial furrow was dug and then filled with cakes and other offerings. For

our ancestors, this was a crucial time of year. Poor preparation often led to a poor harvest and a poor harvest led to starvation.

Asatru is the modern celebration of our ancestral heritage. Charming of the Plow symbolizes our willful penetration of the unyielding soil. It is with our own industriousness, our own will, that we create, that we change, that we provide. In the Asatru Folk Assembly, we often celebrate the Charming of the Plow by planting a tree.

Inflict your will on your world. As Asatruar, this is a time to "charm" the implements of your own productivity. Entreating the divine to bless your tools and your plans for the year is essential to starting things off right. Inviting the divine into our plans and intentions is a great way of making us aware of the sacrality that should be a part of all we do. The AFA encourages all Asatruar to be industrious in all that we do. Dream grand dreams. Make solid plans. DO big things. And after hard work, reap a bountiful harvest.

And what can you do to celebrate Charming of the Plow? Though most of us do not rely on growing our own food to survive, now is a good time to consider starting a small garden, or even just growing some herbs on the patio. Make a plan. Choose a small patch of yard and map out your garden beds. Bless the shovels and spades. Dig up the soil and begin fertilizing it with eggshells and coffee grinds. Prepare. If you cannot plant a small garden begin planning some projects. Sew a quilt, build a chair, take an idea and make a plan, and then put that plan into action.





Urnes Stave Church or Heathen Hof?



When science challenges orthodoxy, paradigms are corrected.

Nothing could be more obvious than with new technology such as dendrology, (dating by tree ring growth) that contradicts the sophistry of the Church when declaring that all of the Stave Churches were built originally as churches. It starts with a decree by the Catholic Church that Norway with the brutal conversion of Norway to Christianity started around 1020 with the Martyrdom of King Olaf, a tyrant of extreme cruelty and cunning. For example, the dating of Urnes Hof/church shows that the trees in some of the oldest parts of the building were cut down in 723. Another point that raises questions and I believe answers this issue of what came first the Hof, or the Church was the carving on the North Wall depicting Nidhogg eating on Yggdrasill a most basic part of our Lore and very Heathen.

There are also remnants of earlier construction under the Urnes Hof/Church. The architecture is not Romanesque as suggested in Wiki but in my opinion, was indigenous to Norway and possibly other parts of Scandinavia and possibly the continent but being nearer to Rome in time and space were destroyed earlier, read here the Saxon Conversion, another testament to cruelty and the power of propaganda.

Just the sheer skill in obtaining seasoned trees and knowledge to build these fine architectures is not something one would expect to happen in the short life of Olaf the Saint or even his Bishops that came after him and spread rumors of his miracles and church construction.

You see, with the coming of Christianity, came the Roman Church and Divine Right of

kings a most helpful form of opposition to what in Norwegian history is called "Petty Kingdoms" meaning no less than an attack on small republican, assemblies where a Chieftain/Gothi, Gythia were seen as leaders due to ability and service or value to the community that could be removed by the challenge at the Thing or combat in an extreme case.

Yes, we contrary to the bishops (the scribes of the Church) had law and order as the rule. There were in fact three areas of Norway and Sweden that were districts sort of a district court in modern parlance. The elder was Gula Thing, near Bergen and northward, the second was the Frostathing near central and southern Norway and Eidvasting in the east and border area of Sweden.

I have no doubt that the Cross was added to the Stave Hof/Churches and the latter was most likely constructed as a Church. Just like Christianity has done in other lands, they keep culturally familiar things out of the fire and add the propaganda for the new generation. Nothing new in the bag of tricks of tyrants.

Some things are true, such as the spiritual, our connection to the Divine, Numinous, Creator Ancestors.

There is a reason that the word, Rune means Mystery.



#### Growing In Oregon





#### **Meditation Part 2**



Now that you are in the habit of fifteen minutes a day (you ARE in the habit, right?) we can add a couple of elements to enhance your practice.

First, posture. When you sit, stretch the neck upward slightly and tip the head down as if you are looking at something on the floor about ten feet away. This straightens the spine completely.

Next, breathing. When sitting - or any time, really - you should breathe from your diaphragm. This promotes complete filling and emptying of the lungs, which enhances energy circulation and clears the lungs of impurities. With each complete inhalation tighten the muscles in the pelvic floor (also known as the perineum; this is much like the muscle contraction used to staunch the flow of urine). This prevents the loss of spiritual energy.

Lastly, for today, is the Big Picture. I was trained in the practice of kundalini meditation. Kundalini theory says that your Life Energy - variously called kundalini, chi, or ond - lies dormant at the base of the spine and must be awakened by mindfulness and meditation. So, when you inhale imagine your breath reaching all the way to the

base of your spine. Then when you exhale imagine that life force rising up the spine. You can imagine your breath sequentially activating the three cauldrons that Mr. McNallen writes about: Bodn, Son, and Odrereir. This work will raise your life and spirit from the lower motivations - food and sex - through the heart, with the love of family and tribe - up to the ideals of self-realization. This is the highest manifestation of the Odinic path.



# Georgia

Reconstruction or Revival?



Many organizations and individuals who practice Asatru often fall into the trap of trying to do things "by the book"- by this, I mean they want to do things in the exact same way that our ancestors supposedly did. They want to read or recite their invocations from a script during Blöt, they want to wear tunics during ceremonies, they only ever spell names and locations in perfect Old Norse, and they only focus on Viking Age Scandinavia or Iceland. These folks call themselves "reconstructionists".

Reconstructing Asatru to make it historically accurate in regard to how the Vikings practiced it sounds great, but as modern Aryans living in the 21st century, would we be properly worshiping our Gods by pretending to be Icelandic? Well, maybe Witan Svan would be, but my ancestors, for example, were Saxons and likely worshiped our Gods differently from the Icelandic Folk. Our people come from all over Europe, from Ireland to Russia, from Finland to Greece, and each of these regions connected with the Divine in similar ways, but different enough that "reconstructionists" will split hairs

and call things "inauthentic" ... All while not properly connecting with the Gods in the process. Rituals and invocations and prayers are about speaking from the heart and continuing the gifting cycle in a meaningful way. I don't know about you, but when I speak from the heart, it is never in Old Norse.

One of the big things that set the AFA apart from and above the others, is that we are REVIVING Asatru rather than reconstructing Asatru. Our faith is alive, and the Gods should be worshipped in the modern world just as fiercely as they were in ninth-century Iceland! We speak English (or another modern language) when we invoke Thor for strength, not Old Norse. We wear suits and dresses when we hail our ancestors, not tunics from Amazon. Our Gods must appreciate these things, as they have been blessing us abundantly for the last 27 years!

It is 2022- Asatru is alive, and it is the AFA who makes it so!

### Burning Befana



These are pictures of the "Old woman Bonfire", an ancient ritual with heathen roots. The old witch represents the old year with his negativities and suffering. By burning it (during the night of 5th January, at the end of the 12 nights, when Odin rides the Wild

Hunt) an apotropaic rite is carried out in order to drive away the Evil and the evil spirits and propitiate the fertility of the fields and the abundance of future crops.





The old lady is called "Befana" in Italy and "Frau Holle" or "Perchta" in Germany and Austria and is connected with the langobardic goddess Frea, which is the equivalent of Frigg, the wife of Odin: it's evident also the similarity with Mother Nature/Mother Earth Nerthus.






Christmas Story House

Under Ash + Oak Kindred gathering at our fellow member's home in Kentucky on January 15th.






Under Ash + Oak Anniversary Dinner

Runic Yoga Part 3



If you have been following along over the past couple of months, we have covered variations of the IS, KA, MAN, and UR runic yoga. We covered some basic methods on how to perform them and also some of the meanings behind each. I will say there is much more though. If we stay disciplined in the process the runes will constantly reveal more to us. On another note, reading about these topics is great but the "key" is not found there. It's found in actual practice. Nothing is greater than that and nothing more profound than when the answer comes to you from that "voice" within from doing so. At that moment you know what was spoken was what you have been seeking.

For this month's Runic Yoga practice and to add I have given this quite a bit of thought. I feel it's best to cover the NOT and EH rune together in one article. They are intricately connected, and we'll see the importance then. So, we will cover just the

Cross Rune Stadha here. Some may be asking themselves "what is the Cross Rune?". That is understandable. It technically isn't part of the Armanen Futhorkh. We can look at it in a couple of ways. One that comes to mind is the Sun Cross and the other as Spirit crucified in Matter. The latter is very important for us in this case. That is what we are at this very moment and one possible goal would be to break free from it. In the end, it is certainly not Christian. Much of the symbols we find today have always been ours and ours to take back. So, with that let's begin.

Face North, stand in the IS rune position, and take 3 to 7 breaths. While doing that, imagine being on a mountain or someplace in nature meaningful to you.

Now raise your arms like the picture provided.

As you breathe in, picture yourself drawing in energy from all four directions. From the sides, below, and above.

With each breath picture, it all is colliding in your center.

Do this for a minimum of nine breaths.

Lower your arms and if done right you will very much feel you are being magnetized. For me, it's from my head down to my feet.

Say a few positive affirmations to yourself now. It could be something like "I AM the Initiate. Filled with health, spirit, memory, will and power" or something along those lines. Use what is best for you.

At this point, you may be noticing somewhat of a pattern in how this is all going. You have pulled the different energy streams from all directions in the previous runes and put them into this one. Hence why I feel that this is such a powerful practice. In my experience, this particular one gives a much different feeling. Not so much relaxed or calmness but a feeling of strength and a willingness to take on the world so to speak. I feel alive and with purpose, the Initiate. I would also like to touch on another aspect of the importance of Runic Yoga. We all may know that dance, mantras, galdr, etc has an effect on our physiology. We feel good after doing it. By combining the form (stadha) and the mantra of the rune itself the end result is twofold. Twice the results and twice the acceleration on not just our physical bodies but the other more subtle like the astral, mental, etc. It works in all of them, at once, and in turn, makes us evolve or involute depending on our thoughts on this matter.

Thanks for listening and we'll pick this up again next month.

# A Swedish Treat



In Sweden, we have something called "fettisdagen". This day has Christian origins and was one of the days before the fast of easter. Although Christianity has waned considerably in Sweden, this tradition still remains. On this day, we eat a special pastry called a Semla. And it is delicious, so we thought we'd share the recipe for it!

Fettisdagen occurs earliest 3d of February and latest 9th of March. But as the years go by, the date gets pushed earlier and earlier, as it is big money for stores and bakeries. We Swedes are crazy about Semla. So don't feel bad if you make it outside those dates.

#### Semla Recipe

Ingredients

Buns

11 oz milk

5 oz butter

1 Tbsp cardamom

2 oz fresh yeast or 2 packages dry yeast

1 egg

1/2 cup plus 2 Tbsp sugar

1 tsp salt

5 cups flour

# Filling

1 1/4 cup cream, whipped

3 1/2 oz almond paste, coarsely grated

2 oz milk

powdered sugar

#### Directions

Buns

Combine the milk, butter, and cardamom in a small pan and heat until the butter has melted.

Leave to cool to just above room temperature and add the yeast.

Transfer to a large bowl and add the egg, sugar, salt, and flour. Knead until smooth, shiny, and elastic, about 10 minutes. Let rise until doubled, about 20 to 40 minutes.

Tip the dough onto a lightly floured surface and knead slightly. Shape into 12 balls.

Place a few inches apart on parchment paper-lined baking sheets. Let rise again until almost doubled, 15 to 20 minutes.

Bake at 400°F for 10 to 12 minutes or until golden, then cool on wire racks.

Cut the tops of the buns, making three incisions to form a triangular lid. dig a bit of the bread out and save it for the filling.

Filling

Blend the reserved breading, almond paste, and milk. Spoon a bit of filling onto each bun and top with whipped cream. place a lid on each bun and dust with powdered sugar.

Thorrablot in the Stonewall Shire



How do you honor the Thunderer? What manner of offering might be pleasing to the God of Strength, Speed, and Explosive Action?

Would we pour and share a horn of mead? Certainly!

But what reason has one, so beloved of his Folk, so high and holy as Asa Thor, to take

notice of just another libation poured into the ground?

We must do something with it first!

It is the life force, the vital essence of the worshipper, that is the True sacrifice. The physical and spiritual contact between the giver and the gift is the moment at which the life force is transferred - "charged," as we say

And it is this magical charge, this gift of concentrated Will, that Truly nourishes the Gods.



On Sunday the 23rd of January, Stonewall Kindred gathered at Shenandoah River State Park in Virginia to celebrate Thorrablot, giving the seat of honor to the Storm Rider Himself. Our True gift was in the form of the vital electricity flowing from our hearts to our limbs, and in the spirit of the vital action the Mighty One loves so much, we "turned up the voltage" of this gift in a way we thought He would appreciate: by recreating the trials of Thor in his visit to the hall of the Giant King.

Our first trial was to run (while the giant Skrymir was walking): a major wake-up call for all of us as we break the static, leftover hibernation of the holidays!



Next, it was the impossible foot race of Thor's thrall Thialfe against "Thought," represented by an actual foot race in friendly competition against one another. By this time the blood was pumping against the crisp, cold air in which we spent the entire day!



We then picked up the Giant King's "cat." (Due to an unfortunate shortage of giant cats to pick up, we substituted a decent-sized boulder and had a tossing contest). We hope our mere human imitation of His great feat at least made him smile as he watched us brave the freezing liquid in his name.

We then took that charge, that mighty magnetic force built through our series of exertions, and channeled it into the Mead in our Blot horn. Before pouring it, we accepted blessing from the Defender of the Gods upon our Mjolnir pendants, which had been laid out before the altar while we went through the day's physical sacrifice.

From our hearts to our hands to the horn; from the horn to the earth to the Gods. Hail Thor!

Finally, I was honored to present a new and very promising member, James Bethard, with his first-ever Mjolnir pendant. It had been my first Hammer as an Asatru practitioner, a difficult thing to part with. But where better, than before the high seat of the Mighty One Himself, than to increase the Voltage of one's first Hammer by passing it on to a brother in the Faith? Welcome home James and wear it with pride!



After Blot was formally concluded, we engaged in one last unofficial test of courage - a quick plunge in the sub-freezing Shenandoah River! I'm proud to report that nobody from Stonewall who was physically able chickened out.

It was just the way a proper Thor Blot should have felt. Lighthearted, high energy, and tons of camaraderie. The Frith bonds, we feel, are deep and long lasting after this day.

Our hearts are Tru, and we feel the Thunderer must surely agree.

## MIA! A manly game that brings JOY to the Beer Hall!



"Lot Box is always play and laughter among bold men, Where the Warriors sit in the Beer Hall, Happily together."

### - Anglo Saxon Rune Poem

Here is an example of a pastime that brings Joy among rough men. A game you can honestly say tests your Luck while building camaraderie among the war band.

Stonewall decided to try out MIA, a dice game with roots in ancient Germanic Mead Benches. It is our intention to use it as a 50/50 raffle among the men of the Kindred, as a more interesting way to pay for incidental expenses while testing this ancestrally driven side of ourselves.

Using a lot box that normally houses a set of Runes, we sat and tested our collective and individual Luck by dicing while in the presence of the Mighty One this Thorrablot.

It's a game that relies on Luck (read as precisely your level of magical Voltage) and upon your ability to manipulate Luck (in this case, through the subtle art of bluffing).



Here are the rules in short. May it bring as much joy to your Mead Bench as it has to ours!

RULES: you begin with three "chips," which we represented in this picture (awesomely) with pieces of ice.

- 1. You roll two dice in the lot cup, and you alone get to look at your roll. You may then tell the truth (to the man to your left), lie "low" or lie "high."
- 2. Your opponent (to your left) then decides whether to accept your claim or call it out. You are safe in telling the truth lying lower than you rolled but lose a "chip" if you are caught lying higher than your roll.
- 3. If you are called out as a liar, you must show your roll. If it is shown to be a lie, you lose a "chip." If it is the truth or lower (but not lower than the table's minimum roll, see rule 4) then your caller-out himself loses a "chip."

- 3. Whether or not you roll higher than the man before you. You MUST claim an equal or higher number than the last roll. The table's minimum roll is whatever was last "accepted." Thus, it gets harder to lie and easier to get caught the longer a round goes.
- 4. Whenever a player gets caught, the round is over and the table's minimum roll resets back to zero.
- 5. The lot cup passes sunwise, until only one player is left with any chips. This is the winner of whatever is in the pot...in our case, the winner of the 50/50 raffle.
- 6. Order of precedence: the highest rolls are doubles. 6-6, 5-5, and so on down to 1-1. After that, the higher number is thought of as the "suit" and the lower number is the "rank." 6-5, 6-4, 6-3, etc. Down to 2-5, 2-4, -2-3.
- 7. The lowest possible roll, thus, is 2-1. This roll, however, is called "Mia!" and it alone is worth two chips instead of one. If you lie Mia, you risk getting caught at higher stakes. If you call out Mia, you risk the same.


We had a successful trial run and worked out a few kinks to where we can agree on a coherent set of rules. May it bring you and your Mead Bench as much joy as it brings us, especially as, over time, it is connected from point to point in Wyrd, a tradition of laughter and bonding among frith folk!

We want all our folk to come out but leadership more than anyone else should be setting the example and working hard to make our Hofs godly places for our folk to gather. Because that is the role of a leader, to lead by example, not merely direct or supervise, but to work your ass off and be someone of substance that our folk will follow.

I want to thank Witan Brandy Callahan for driving the distance and leading the Blot for us. We were joined by two other members and one child.




Afterward, we went and shared in fellowship and feasted together at a local restaurant




