
The start of a new year is the perfect time to set our sights on things we wish to

Over the years these have been based on different platforms, such as private forums, Facebook groups, Telegram chat groups, and now MeWe.

I am thankful to everyone for their effort and patience as we moved the AFA private

groups to MeWe! Gythia Catie and I are in the process of packing up to move across-state and know moving anything can be a real pain.

MeWe allows separate posts in its groups on specific topics. I will allow our AFA leaders to better moderate the posts to prevent infighting, misunderstanding, and off-topic content. MeWe also will allow us to have members answer four simple questions so that they are not anonymous to other groups members. These questions are:

- 1. What is your legal name?
- 2. What are your town, state, and country?
- 3. What is your AFA Kindred?
- 4. Would you like to provide contact information? (Please list here)

The conversation about whether folks should use their real name and photo is one that we can all have differing opinions about in good faith. In the private setting of AFA groups, we believe our members have a right to know with whom they are interacting. We hope that having one's posts and comments associated with one's name will bring greater responsibility and accountability to those participating. Also, because these questions can only be viewed by members of the private and unlisted AFA groups our members will be able to use pseudonyms and avatars to maintain anonymity to the public outside of the AFA groups. The content moderation available on MeWe gives us a great opportunity to reboot that group so that our fellas can discuss men's issues responsibly and productively.





Day of Remembrance

Raud the Strong



So well-known was the hero, Raud the Strong, that his story comes to us from several Icelandic Saga's, the most common of which is the Heimskringla (The Chronicle of the Kings of Norway) by Snorri Sturluson. The story tells of a great seafaring warrior who had Thor and Seiðr on his side.

Around the year 1000, the zealous Norwegian King, Olaf Tryggvason, began an expedition to North Norway to continue his Christianization of the pagan people. Olaf found much success in his efforts, owing largely to his brutal methods of both torturing and killing those who refused, but not all were swayed.

In Godøy, near present-day Bodø, lived the man Raud the Strong. Raud was known to have a strong connection with the Sami people, and to own a remarkable longship that was larger than any that Olaf himself owned. With a gold-plated dragon head, it is what many suppose the popular Viking longship designs are based on.

Upon hearing that Olaf was heading his way Raud gathered as many men as he could and lead a great assault at sea. Despite everything, however, Raud found himself overwhelmed and had to retreat from the battle. Stories say that Raud was able to Seiðr to call on the winds to speed him home safely while also blocking Olaf Tryggvason's chase.

It was all for naught, however.

Though he made it home, Raud was eventually caught by Olaf Tryggvasson. Despite the King's efforts, however, Raud refused to turn his back on his gods despite torture. In the end, he was killed when a live snake was forced down his throat. Many of Raud's men, following his example, were also killed after refusing to convert.

So, what can we learn from this story?

Some might make the argument that it is better to live another day, to fight another day. In some cases, this might be true. For every one of us sitting here reading this, however, one of our ancestors made a different choice. The choice to convert saved our lives.

For many of our ancestors, death was the best option. Which of us ever chooses to be killed in a horrible, painful way? Was death the better option? We must believe that for some, it was. For Raud the Strong, friend of Thor, it was. To convert was to turn his back on his Heritage, on his Honor, and on his Courage and a warrior and leader.

Our ancestors lived in a very different time. They lived in a world in which men and women could be killed for choosing to remain loyal to their Gods. We are exceptionally lucky that we live in a society that allows us the freedom to worship our Gods.

That very same society that allows us to worship our Gods, however, does not do so without stipulations. That society, so unlike the sort of tribal society our ancestors lived in, would tell us how to worship our Gods. They would tell us who is allowed to worship our Gods. And that society would try to harm us for choosing to do it differently than they tell us we are allowed to do it.

We don't face the same torture and death as Raud the Strong for choosing to worship our Gods our way, but we do face the possibility of ostracization from society. People, even our families, can turn their backs on us for disagreeing with the "rules" they have given us. We are not free from the effects of the multi-cultural paradigm, but we do not have to bow to it.

Like Raud the Strong, we can stand tall and be proud of who and what we are. We are Asatruar. Like Raud the Strong, we can stand against those who would tell us to turn our backs on what we know to be Tru. We can live with Honesty, with Courage, and with Honor.

Hail Raud the Strong!

Porrablót



Porrablót is an Icelandic midwinter festival dedicated to, as the name describes, Por, or Thor. Porrablót is named after the Icelandic month of Porri from the historic calendar and ran from mid-January to mid-February. Though Porrablót is a relatively modern social celebration in Iceland, there is a reference in the Flateyjarbók that states that the Kvens offered a yearly sacrifice to Porri at mid-winter. Typically, Porrablót is celebrated by gathering together and eating many of Iceland's traditional foods and by singing, reciting poems, and telling stories.


Some good ways to celebrate Þorrablót include eating traditional Icelandic foods, such as Hákarl (putrefied shark), Blóðmör (blood suet, filled sausage/black pudding), Hrútspungur (ram's scrotum with testicles), Lundabaggi (sheep's fat), or Svið (burnt sheep's head).

Don't worry! If these are unavailable, or simply not to your taste, eating goat and goat products such as goat cheese or goat milk are also appropriate options.

Called by some as the cabin fever holiday Porrablót is a great way to liven up the doldrums of mid-winter. So take some time to light a fire and make merry. Have the folk tell stories or recite poems about Thor. Eat, drink, and enjoy the company of folk and family.







Var, Goddess of the Oath



Var is the Goddess that was known throughout Germania and Scandinavia a thousand years ago.

The Norse that found a way to trade with the Middle East through what became Russia, found a trade route from the headwaters of the Volga River to the Black Sea that is; from what today is known as Ukraine to Crimea, where the Volga River empties into the Black Sea.

It is speculated the reason that the Norse used this trade route was due to the loss of old trade routes through central Europe that were closed to non-Christians, the old routes were used for centuries to trade goods from the North to Rome, however, the elder routes were later dominated by Christian Rulers.

The Norse from Sweden, Denmark, and Norway that developed this route to the large metropolitan center called at the time, Byzantium, later known as Constantinople, also brought law to what became Russia. These were warriors that held the Oath as inviolate, and the Goddess of the Oath in the Elder religion of the North was/is called VAR. Hence, these warriors were known as Varangians.

Byzantium was ruled by a Royal Family it was an Empire and required an army, security forces, and especially a Royal Guard.

Byzantium was politically corrupt and the culture seemingly, degenerate. Assassination was always a threat, and the Palace Guard was corrupt. Into this giant ancient city that the Norse named, Mikligaard, came the Varangians. Due to these Warriors, not corruptible due to their Oath to Var, that is, their mores and spiritual beliefs, they made excellent Palace Guards and did so as mercenaries for generations. Today there can be seen Runes carved into marble posts, much like graffiti, reminding us of their presence.

The long and dangerous Route to the Silver/ Silk trade and from the North, such as Amber/fur/ ivory (Ivory only came from the North at that time), so the trade was prosperous, and the Silver Hoards in Scandinavia can attest.

<u>4th Annual Charming of the Plow – Asatru Folk Assembly (runestone.org)</u>

Using Fehu, Uruz and Thurisaz



In this installment of my series on activating the energy body, we will be utilizing the Elder Futhark Runes Uruz and Thurisaz. As part of this next step, I believe it is important that we look at the lore in reference to our souls and the infinite knowledge that can be accessed by us. Two books that have been invaluable references to discovering the fact that we truly are spiritual beings in a material existence are "The road to Hel" by Hilda Roderick Ellis M.A., Ph.D. and "The Asatru' Edda", by Mark Puryear. "The road to Hel", correlates several excerpts from our sacred lore as to the immortal nature of our souls and the cycle of re-birth that our ancestors knew of. "The Asatru' Edda", has combined, referenced, and sequenced the stories of the Elder Edda into a readable text.

The many examples from the Sagas and Lore of rebirth that are given in the chapter "THE CONCEPTION OF THE SOUL" from "The Road to Hel", establish that we are more than our physical bodies. Rebirth among the Gods includes the Jotun maid Gullveig who was killed and burned by the Aesir 3 times. The third and final time she was determined by the Gods to be Gullveig incarnate, Thor killed her with his hammer without hesitation. Gullveig at this time was Freyr's Mother-in-law and this action caused a war between the Vanir and Aesir resulting in the decapitation of Mímir and the banishment of Odin from Asgard. When Odin was finally restored and peace between the Aesir and Vanir was again established, the Aesir had to swear not to kill Gullveig should she be reborn again and show herself, but instead to banish her to Járnviðr.

So now armed with this knowledge of your own immortality and the cycle of rebirth, which you must know as a FACT, not a belief. We may start to seek access to the knowledge contained in Mímir's well as Odin himself had done. Mímir is a Thurs and the knowledge he shares is invaluable if you are wanting to learn the true nature of Midgard. However, keep in mind this verse from the Hávamál before embarking on this path:

It is best for man to be middle-wise.

Not over cunning and clever:

The learned man whose lore is deep

Is seldom happy at heart.

From the lore we know that Mímir was a giant, son of Ymir and the description of Mímisbrunnr as compiled in the Asatru' Edda:

"Next, there is that land, which is owned by Mímir, called Glasisvellir or Ókolnir. This is a place of indescribable magnificence, with flower fields and groves that are never ravaged by frost or winter. Here is also where Mímir's hall is located. That wonderful hall that the Æsir call Brimir's hall, was owned by Mímir. After his birth, Mímir became the guardian of the central well, Óðrærir, or Mímisbrunnr, and the root of Yggdrasill borne out of it. Because this wellbore Yggdrasill's seed, the great ash is called Mímameiðr as well. Hidden in the glorious well of Mímir lies all knowledge, and wisdom and intelligence are also hidden there. He is full of wisdom because each morning he drinks his mead from the Gjallarhorn. It is from him and his well that the rúnar and Galdr have their origin. "

The third rune in the Elder Futhark is Thurisaz. Thurisaz is known as a Thurs, which means giant and this giant is Mímir the guardian of Mímisbrunnr. Meditation on this rune will bring about an awakening, however, it is not free. Mímir demands a sacrifice as related to us from the Lore:

"One drink from Mímisbrunnr could help him; but Mímir, the well's deep-minded guardian, refused him the drink before he would prove himself worthy through self-sacrifice. Then Óðinn gave himself as the sacrifice for his life task, which he described in his own words:

I know that I hung on the wind-tossed tree nine nights,

wounded by my spear, given to Óðinn, myself given to myself.

on that tree of which no one knows from what root it springs.

No one gave me bread, nor a horn of drink,

I peered downward, I took up the rúnar, wailing I learned them,

then fell down thence.

I obtained nine Fimbulljóðar from Bölþorn-Ymir's, Bestla's father's, celebrated son, Mímir, and I got a drink of the precious mead drawn from Óðrærir.

Then I began to quicken, and to become wise, and to grow and to prosper.

each word I sought resulted in a new word.

each deed I sought resulted in a new deed.

We must give a sacrifice for this knowledge, and the sacrifice that must be given is only known by you. It must hurt, it has to count, it must be difficult, it is not something that is easy. Odin did not eat or drink for 9 days and was shown the runes. There is this passage that may help from Havamal Stanza 68:

"Fire is best among the sons of men,

and the sight of the sun,

if a man can have his health with a life free from vice"

There are countless ways to interpret these Kennings, perhaps this Stanza is telling us that fire (Fehu) is more active when you conquer your vices. The point is you must look inside and know what is difficult for you and rise above it, putting your mind to the test. Control your appetite,

Change your diet, conquer your vices and make that sacrifice. At the very least you will build your will and become a healthier stronger person for pushing the limits of your body.

For this month, take the Fehu energy that you have been cultivating from last month's exercise and move it up to your spine and center it between your eyes. This energy is moving in the form of the rune Uruz and can be equated as kundalini, Chi, or Prana. The rune Uruz is described as a mighty Auroch that bursts down barriers and this energy is being used to ignite the Third Eye, the eye that Odin placed into Mímir's well. Meditate upon the rune Thurisaz, carve the rune in your mind, draw it in red on a card and stare at the shape and quiet your mind. Read everything possible relating to Thurisaz and its meaning, practice austerity. Austerity is your sacrifice; it is not denying

yourself pleasure but removing obstacles that are preventing you from becoming who you really are.

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
Washington

Great stew, strong coffee and good mead was shared with our Gods, Ancestors and Folk.








Our lovely host's great kin of ours helped put on an amazing event bringing a glorious end to Yule and ushering in the new year!

I will post details in the Ladies' group on MeWe. If you do not use MeWe, please email me directly so that I can get the information out to you.



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From Ve to Church: Evolution of the Hof



As the Asatru Folk Assembly continues to grow and solidify Asatru into the 21st century and beyond, we will continue to see natural evolutions take place that would have occurred the same as if our ancestors had never let Christianity take root.

One of the biggest throughout 2021 has been the establishment of 2 more hofs and many more kindreds. In nature when adversity, growth, or natural selection occurs the strong, the right and the true survive and claim the right to lead and establish a legacy. In this truth and spirit, I find immense value in taking a moment to reflect on how our ancestors went to the hills, forests, and cliffs, to be eech the gods & wights for their blessings & favor. Back then our ancestors, started in the same "back yard Asatru" fashion as many folks today have in beginning their journey home. Over time a truly powerful & holy place would be found or established, a Ve would be established to mark the area off and provide a place to engage in sacred works. Much like any other civilization, this act is a cornerstone in establishing the permanence, of a community. Where we diverge in 2022 in this progression, is in our already having developed countries and cities. Where our ancestors would have likely built around a holy place or took into consideration access and travel to a holy site, in building their municipality, we already have these things established. As such we build an area up where a divine spark has taken root instead. However, the evolution is the same. As Frith and Wyrd become more woven together, and luck grows typically a shrine would be built around a Ve or several throughout the community to honor heroes, ancestors, and the gods. These shrines become more narrow or specialized in their sacred works, in the case of a Ve or shrine dedicated to one of our gods, a place for blot tools, and shelter from the elements may be necessary for both utility and piety's sake. This progression begins to start taking on the resemblance of a "bare-bones" or "proto-type" hof. The final step in this evolution is the most powerful one that declares "This is our foundation and we are unwavering!". This step brings us forward out of the fringes and shadows, and in the light among other recognized religions and it is the building of a hof reflecting in structure the same care (or more) that we have in the building of homes, centers of commerce or even municipal building. In our ancestor's time this would have built up around the Ve, and then shrine itself. Today we respond in like-kind to foreign invaders who repurposed or holy places as their own and move the Ve into them.

As with many other things in our lore and in nature, even when the mediums change, the law & flow of nature does not. As our Tru & righteous church grows it's always due to the devotion, piety, and generous gifts of our kindreds, and individuals throughout the AFA who come together and pour the soul out in each of these areas. As we continue there may come a time where another stage of evolution manifests. After all, the hof is the outermost expression of the innermost part of our folk soul. It's only natural, that like us, it too should grow and evolve so it succeeds where even Thor

could not in wrestling old age. With Hof not far off we shall get to see this cycle once again blossom into fruition and take further note, of how the divine manifests itself in 2022

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Meditation



Two years before my divorce I discovered meditation, enrolling in a teacher's certification class for kundalini yoga. Good thing, too; without meditation, I could easily have fallen into alcoholism, depression, or worse.

The benefits of meditation are many and I won't bore you with those here, I will wait until I see you in person. Instead, I will review a few meditation methods that incorporate our way--runic meditations, or galdr, along with a few pointers to get your own practice going. This first in a series covers a few basics.

Meditation can be practiced in dozens of ways, and all of them have good points about their method. Luckily by the time I began meditating diligently I was well-grounded in my faith in the Aesir, so I was able to use my practice as a supplement to my faith. I

found many ways in which meditation fits neatly with the beliefs and practices of The Folk.

You can meditate any time of the day or night, but I find it is best in the early morning before breakfast. Get up earlier than usual (I know, it was difficult at first), go to your quiet place (mine is in front of my altar) and sit. To begin with, let's do something simple, and do just that: just sit. Your squirrel-mind will panic and begin flailing around looking for something-ANYTHING to do to fill its need for busyness. Ignore that as best you can; don't force it down or suppress it though. My favorite technique is to just say to myself, "I'm not doing that right now," and let the thought drift away.

Find a timer, like an electronic kitchen timer. Yes, you can use your phone, but your phone has is the distraction and its presence does not lend focus. Start with fifteen minutes; yes, it will seem like fifteen hours, but believe me, the timer is not broken. Your mind will begin to heal itself from that first session.

Yes, it is hard to sit on the floor, but that is best. Find a small rug or even a large sofa cushion so you are not on the bare floor, and a firm, medium-sized cushion to put under your butt. Start with a simple cross-legged sit; try a quarter-lotus, placing your right foot up on your left calf. I prefer the adept's posture, with the left foot tucked into the fold of the right knee and the right heel against the perineum. Place your hands in your lap, right hand in the left hand, left fingertips on right knuckles, thumbs gently touching. Breathe deeply from the diaphragm; hold a moment, then relax. Repeat until the timer interrupts.

For this month, this is the exercise: sit. Fifteen minutes, every day. Allow your mind to relax, or wander, or consider the beauty of your altar.




that things just are not right nowadays, but many of us are going through the motions, perhaps waiting for a leader or a hero to show us that there IS a way through this spiritual darkness.

Let's talk about something that we often take for granted, but was deadly serious to our ancestors:

Oaths.

Promises or vows made before the Gods, and before any Folk gathered to witness them. These promises are often spoken of in Asatru circles, and they are often made loosely with little to no follow-through... This is wrong on a multitude of levels.

First, it is obviously not good to be known to the Gods as an oath-breaker. Nastrond is said to await those who break their oaths.

Second, the luck of the witnessing Folk is tied into the luck of the individual taking an oath. This is why, in the AFA, oaths during High Sumbel must be cleared with leadership before being made over the horn. Everyone who holds that horn in that ritual will be tied into any and all oaths that are taken. If the individual fails in their oath, the luck of everyone at that Sumbel is affected.

Lastly, when you walk the road to Hella's Home, to return to your ancestors, do you want to be greeted as someone who spoke their words with carelessness?

Remember that when you speak words at all, you are speaking with the Breath of Life given to you by the All-Father. Over the horn, or when taking an oath, these words spoken with Ond should be spoken bright and true and should be backed up by right action.

"Words are Wind, Deeds are Iron".


To Live Honorably

Under Ash + Oak



Before our Yule event kicked off, the members of Under Ash + Oak took our official oath to each other as a Kindred on a beautiful oath ring fabricated by one of our kindred brothers. I was asked at Winternights by our Alsherjarhgothi why "Under Ash + Oak"? I explained then, but thanks to the Runestone's format I can now thoroughly explain the importance of these two trees to our Pan European Folk and why this name was so important to us.

The words for ash and spear seem to be related in that a poetic Anglo-Saxon word for the spear was aesc and the Norse word for ash was ask. These words influenced Highland place names such as Port Askaig. The Vikings were also referred to as the Aescling meaning 'Men of Ash'. Like the Vikings, the Gaels also thought of the ash tree as protective. In some Celtic legends, it is also seen as a tree sacred to the god Lugh, who is celebrated at Lughnasadh. Lugh and his warriors carried spears made of ash in some folktales.

Due to its close association not only with the Divine, but with knowledge, Ash can be worked with for any number of spells, rituals, and other workings. The Ash appears as Nion in the Celtic Ogham alphabet, a system also used for divination. Ash is one of three trees that were sacred to the Druids (Ash, Oak, and Thorn), and connects the inner self to the outer worlds. This is a symbol of connections and creativity, and of transitions between the worlds.

In British folklore, the ash was credited with a range of protective and healing properties. Most of these were related to child health. Newborn babies were popularly given a teaspoon of ash sap. Ailing children, especially those suffering from rupture or weak limbs, would be passed naked through a cleft in an ash tree or ash sapling, to cure them. The cleft was often made for the purpose and bound together again after the ceremony to heal over as the child also healed. Some folklore then suggested an intimate bond between the welfare and fate of the tree and person. Harm to the tree was reflected in the healed person's life, leading people to become understandably protective of 'their' ash tree.

Ashwood is very strong, tough, and elastic. It is said that a joint of ash will bear more weight than any other wood. Chariot and coach axles were made of ash as were oars, tool handles, and the weaponry already mentioned. The tree coppices well, giving strong straight poles for bean poles after five years or oars after twenty. Ash coppice stools seem to be able to go on producing poles almost indefinitely. An eighteen-foot-diameter stool in Suffolk has been estimated to be over a thousand years old. The density of the wood also makes it an ideal fuel. This is reflected in its Latin species name Fraxinus meaning firelight. One of the traditional woods used as the Yule log was ash. To this day ash is the most highly valued firewood, burning for a long time with intense heat, whether seasoned or green.

Throughout the major cultures of Europe people have held the oak tree in high esteem. To the Greeks, Romans, Celts, Slavs, and Teutonic tribes the oak was foremost amongst venerated trees. In each case associated with the supreme god in their pantheon, oak being sacred to Zeus, Jupiter, Dagda, Perun, and Thor, respectively. Each of these gods also had dominion over rain, thunder, and lightning. It is no coincidence that oak trees are more prone to lightning strikes than many other trees. This is because of the tree's high-water content and the fact that they are frequently the tallest living things in the landscape.

The Druids frequently worshipped and practiced their rites in oak groves. The word Druid may derive from a Celtic word meaning "knower of the oak tree". The Gaelic word for oak is darach and remains in place names such as Glac Daraich (oak hollow/small valley) in Glen Affric.

Mistletoe, probably the Druids' most potent and magical plant, frequently grew on oak trees. Its presence was believed to indicate the hand of God having placed it there in a lightning strike. Ancient kings presented themselves as the personifications of these gods. They took on the responsibility not only for success in battle but also for the fertility of the land, which relied on rainfall. They wore crowns of oak leaves, as a symbol of the god they represented as kings on Earth. Similarly, successful Roman commanders were presented with crowns of oak leaves during their victory parades. Oak leaves have continued as decorative icons of military prowess to the present day.

To further explain the flag design, we put the Algiz or 'Man' rune in the Armanen futhark. This rune and its positioning symbolize us working towards ascension, overcoming earthly trappings on the quest for the gral. The blue and gold are matching the colors of the AFA tri horn, to which we owe our existence, if it wasn't for the AFA we would not be here together. The Celtic knot is not only aesthetically pleasing, but it symbolizes our unity and frith towards one another.

I hope that was worth the read and you can all see how proud I am to share our kindred's etymology as we live and die under the Ash and the Oak.

I am so beyond proud of him that he took that from our gathering with folk.

Yule at Home





This really is the busiest time of the year. Not only are we busy with our AFA family and gatherings, but we have our families at home that we celebrate this holiday time with.

Something we have started this year is building new Yule traditions that are done at home with the family. And this year the biggest lesson to my son was the gift cycle.

This started when we got our tree. Before we cut it down Drayk had asked the land wight if we can have the tree. He put his head to a branch and said "It said yes". He then asked the wight of the tree if it would like to be our Yule Lad, he again put his face to a branch and listened and said "it has accepted". So daddy worked hard to saw the tree down and after it was cut Drayk dug a hole near the tree stump. He placed an orange in the hole and covered it up and said "A gift for a gift". This made me a proud mamma. After a week went by it was Yule! We already had to tree strung with lights but we decorated it as a family with ornaments that every single one meant something. 

Runic Yoga Part Two



Odin: Valhalla's Queen! I pray thee say
Which to Vafthrudnis Hall the way:
For I with him intend to try
My skill in ancient mystery.

Frigga: Do not leave thy native skies,
Source of Heroes! I advise:
For well I know no giant might,
Ever witnessed in the fight,
With his prowess can compare.

Odin: Mysteries divine and rare
I've often seen, I've often known,
And now am bent to make my own
All from mortals can I learn.

Frigga: Safe mayest thou go, and safe return, And, for each Goddess, may thy life Be safe from every mortal strife. Let prudence on thy steps attend, Thus, doubly guarded, Chief! advance Thro' fate's elaborate mystic dance.

And so, we continue.....

Last month we covered the IS and KA runes. I hope some of you have gotten something out of what was discussed and perhaps given it a try yourselves. One thing I have noticed is that our spiritual practice is no different than for instance our physical. Sometimes we will see great results and sometimes for long periods it's just going through the motions, not seeing or feeling much of anything. We yearn for that lightning bolt of inspiration to hit us again where we become something else for a few brief periods of time and understand it all. Unfortunately, it doesn't always come so easy. It is through continuous effort just like anything else that breeds our results. To add once again positive thinking always. I cannot stress this enough.

Let's summarize a little on the IS and KA rune before we begin what will be covered this month. Previously we talked about the importance of the sound when we sing the rune. This is very apparent, especially in the IS rune. Depending on the sound sung is where we will feel it in ourselves. We talked about keeping a steady 7-second breath, in and out, during each practice as well as visualization. Also, the importance of doing the exercises facing North unless instructed otherwise. IS can be looked at as separating from time and space, being the pillar, and realizing our divinity. KA on the other hand has both physical and spiritual effects, preparing us as we move ahead but, in the end, I will say once again find your own understanding of all of this. It will come. Now let's look at the MAN rune practice.

MAN Rune

Like all exercises begin in the IS rune stance. 3 to 7 breaths taken.

Raise your arms and the palms of your hands facing up.

3 breathes and on the 3rd exhale hum (mmmmmmm) and while doing that rotate in a clockwise position, slower to the North and to East and spinning faster South/West. Do this for a minimum of 9 breaths/3 rotations.

During the practice also try to picture energy coming down from above, entering your hands and back of your head, and finally going through the body until it hits the ground. Note: looking upwards while doing this I have noticed some results like a stream of light entering my forehead and exiting out the back.

When complete and back in the IS rune position say a few positive words to yourself like "I am now charged with the power of my Guides. May I be a representation of the God-Man, the Spirit Man here." But once again this is an example and use something

that has significance for you.

After the practice, you will notice in your head area a feeling of lightness. Like the upper part of your "tree" has absorbed what many of us seek, higher consciousness. Lastly in my own personal practice, I don't always picture energy coming down into me but instead me in a way disintegrating and rising up. Resurrecting if you will, breaking free from matter, and leaving this place for a moment to another.

UR Rune

Begin in I rune stance and take 3 to 7 breaths.

Now bend down, legs straight, arms to the floor like the picture provided. 3 breaths and on the 3rd sing (uuuuuuu) deeply. Also, try to picture pulling energy from the earth's floor through your body and out your hands back to the earth. For me, I picture a pulsating, cool energy but use what works best for you.

Repeat the above 3 times, alternating between the IS and UR positions, with 3 breaths on each. After the third is complete lay on your back, head facing North, and try to feel the earth waves pulling through you. It's been said to feel like a drifting or floating sensation. I generally don't get that and instead picture myself as a being of light and one with the source, the Black Sun. Remain in this position for a minute or so but you can do it longer.

Probably one of my favorite things about this exercise is the feeling of quietness that comes from it. It's almost like everything else around you stops for a moment. You stand still in creation in a way, not here nor there. If you try it, over time you'll see what I mean. Lastly and perhaps a topic that some will shy away from, but I will not, and it correlates to UR and life energy. For us men, creation lives in us, and I am sure you know what I am referring to. When wasted not only do we lose physical strength, and our moods change for the worse, but it affects the path we are trying to take spiritually. We lose our willpower and a greater connection to the subtle energies/bodies. I am not saying do not have children.... HAVE children and love your wives/girlfriends but know that each time you give it away and the more you do, there is a price to pay if you choose to walk this path. Use it wisely and to add to my own path not only have I gained a stronger will by practicing this but a greater love for my wife. Seeing beauty far beyond what meets the earthly eye. We'll cover more of this in the EH rune.



Witan Herul gave a great class on Yule traditions, while the ham and the fixins filled Rumph Hall with a wonderful aroma.

As we began our Yule blot in the Vé, children were running about and laughing, mothers and fathers were looking on with radiant smiles. We all placed lit candles on the Yule log and said names of folks we wished could be with us on this Yuletide. Our beloved Assembly is growing by the day, why not count yourself among the growing tribe dedicated to the worship of our forebears and Aesir?

We're accomplishing great things in the Asatru Folk Assembly. This weekend's Yule celebrations across Midgard are a testament to that.

We would like to thank Witan Svan Herul, Katherine Herul, and Folkbuilder Heather Young, as well as all the volunteers who helped put together such a successful event this Yule!




Columbia Moot

South German 12th Night Tradition



Greetings all! I hope everyone has had a wonderful Yuletide!

So, this month I wanted to keep it lighthearted and share with you a fine Bavarian tradition. On New Year's day, the local gun club goes out and rings in the new year by firing black powder blunderbusses. The first recorded instance of this is in the 1600s, however, it is generally believed to be much older and harken back to pagan times when German men would make noise with cowbells and drums to wake up spring from her slumber. This of course occurs at the end of Yuletide when the Germanic new year begins. Many Bavarian traditions still practiced to this very day have their origins in pre-Christian times. Another Bavarian tradition for New Year's Eve is giant bonfires. Another fun tradition from elder times was that no clothes washing is done during Yule, and especially on the 12th night. This is still a folk custom in much of Germany. It was believed that if you have clothes on the line on New Year's Eve, Wotan would get

tangled in the clothesline on his way back from the wild hunt, and you would have bad luck the rest of the year. Even with modern electric dryers, the superstition is observed by many.

Happy new year to you all, and I hope we see many of you for Ostara in the south at Thorshof! It promises to be a grand event!

Grandmom's Springerle Recipe



Springerle is a traditional German pastry made around yuletide and enjoyed through January. Flavored with anise oil for its distinctive "licorice" taste and designed to sprout up in the shape of a mushroom cap, it is an ancient yuletide delicacy with roots deep in pagan Europe.

"Bildergebäck," pastries with imprinted designs, have been used as sacrificial offerings as far back as the Indus Valley culture and ancient Egypt, and through cultural exchange over millennia the practice spread to Greece and eventually Rome. Their use spread to our Homelands north of the Danube through centuries of contact between Rome and our Germanic ancestors, where it became a native delicacy with spiritual implications. (The Christian Eucharist wafer, imprinted with a cross, is an example of borrowing of the native sacrificial tradition). Anise is native to the eastern Mediterranean region and its cultivation likely spread to Germania through this exchange as well.

I grew up with these delightful treats and they have always been my favorite. In fact, I refuse to let Yule pass without making one or more batches! My family has an old Springerle recipe, passed down through my mother and grandmother that I'd love to share with you, word for word from a handwritten notebook.

You will need a springerle roller, a special rolling pin made just for this purpose. Please read the whole recipe before starting, or you will just make a mess!



SPRINGERLE COOKIES

3, 1/2 to 4 cups flour

4 eggs

3,1/2 cups (1lb) powdered sugar

1/4 tsp anise oil

1/4 tsp baking powder

Mix eggs (beaten), oil, and sugar with an electric mixer. Flyff eggs as much as possible. Add baking powder and flour.

You will have to knead it by hand to get all of the flour to mix in.

DO NOT ADD WATER. If it is too dry, instead add less flour.

You would have to use EXTRA LARGE EGGS to use 4 cups of flour. If you only use large eggs it will be less. (I suppose you could try using 5 large eggs).

Divide dough in 1/2.

Shape dough into blocks, the width of the springerle roller, and about 1/2 inch thick. Roll with springerle roller.


Push on the sides a bit to shape them and puff up the designs.

Set out on an ungreased cookie sheet overnight. Cover with wax paper.

Bake 300° for 1/2 hour. One pan at a time.

We held an Odin's blot that was the best I've ever done and also held a baby naming for a local AFA family.






I personally took an oath and joined Midhearth Kindred and with them held another Yule event at end of the month! Been a busy month and am excited for this upcoming new year!

ULLR'S GIFTS TO HUNTER

Long ago, in the days before man received the gift of iron or runes, he hunted. During the long, cold winters, it was the heart of the tribe. Long after the plants were gone, hunting provided food. Long after Sunna's warmth had gone, it provided furs for warmth.

The whole tribe hunted together as the whole tribe ate together. With nets, they captured the large game, with rocks and sticks they killed the small ones. All was well.

Until the year the tribe almost died.

It was a harsh winter. Cold enough that a sapling bent to set a snare would snap. Cold enough that the people had to go far out on the ice to breakthrough for water. Cold enough that a child grew deathly ill.

The child's sickness swept through the tribe, making everyone too weak to hunt, save one. He was called Hunter, for he was the best at killing a rabbit with a thrown rock or stick.

He tended his tribe, waiting for the sickness to pass. None died, but none regained their strength. Then the stored food was gone, and the fever did not pass.

Hunter gathered his rabbit sticks and went out. The snow was deep, and Hunter had to force his way through it. The hares and rabbits, who walk on the crust of the snow, heard him and stayed out of his range. Hunter wished that he too could walk on the snow, but he was not a rabbit and had to return home at the end of the day without food.

And his tribe grew weaker, and his daughter no longer answered when he talked to her.

The next day he took the tribe's nets out to the trails the larger animals left in the snow. He found two trees close on either side of the trail and placed the net across it. Hunter then circled far around and, with his flint-tipped spear, waited beside the trail. Deer rushed down the trail towards his net but stopped in front of it. Hunter rushed towards them, yelling and hoping to scare them into the net, but they ran around it. Hunter threw his spear, but even at his closest, he was far out of range.

Without others to cast the net, the deer could not be caught.

Again Hunter returned home unsuccessful. And now many of his tribe no longer spoke, and all were close to death.

The next day Hunter brought all of the tribe's nets. Hunter skillfully created a trap from them, so that no matter which way the deer ran they would be ensnared. Hunter again circled far around and, with his flint-tipped spear, Hunter waited.

A bull moose ran down the path and, being poor of sight. into the net. Angered, it began tearing the precious nets to pieces. In horror, Hunter jumped forward and thrust the spear into the moose. But a spear thrust will not kill a moose, and Hunter had to climb a tree for his life.

As Hunter sat in the tree, he felt a new type of cold, this one starting from his heart and flowing out. Hunter had failed. He could not provide food for his tribe, and without food, all would die. Hunter wept for his people.

A movement in the snow caught Hunter's attention. He watched in amazement at a tall man walking across the top of the deep snow carrying a bent stave. Hunter had never seen a man such as this before, who seemed to shine brighter than the snow. He looked at his feet and saw that he walked on nets stretched between sticks. The man stopped before Hunter and reached up, touching his tears.

"My people," said Hunter "they die. They are starving and I cannot feed them."

The brilliant man pointed across the field toward several deer, who were poking their heads deep into the snow to graze.

"I have tried." Hunter said, "but they are too wary for me to net alone, too wary for me to approach in this snow."

Hunter picked up the snowshoes and looked at them. "We can make these!" he said and tied them to his feet.

Hunter picked up the quiver of arrows and examined one. "We can make these!" he said and tied the wolf hide belt around his waist.

Hunter picked up the bow and drew the string. "We can make this!" he said and slung it across his chest.

Hunter then hurried to the deer, for he had many to feed in the coming days. As he dragged it home, he heard wolves in the distance. He listened to them calling to him who is first among them.

"Uuuuullll" they called.

"Ull" Hunter replied.

I was also happy to have been able to give a small talk on the importance and traditions of Yule while at Baldrshof. Although this isn't the medium for me to go into all of it in detail, I will quote the one piece that I have held on to the most through the nights of Yuletide. Joining the AFA and stepping up as an aspiring leader has truly been about coming home for me, about finding that family.

"Another important note of Yule is that of community, of the clan, of our folk. To Asatruar, our ancestral line is ONE – past and present and future. We are the summation of all who have gone before us – our gods and ancestors one and the same, and we will

be the ancestors of our children and their children so. Yule is a time for family, the nuclear family we have in our homes, our clan and kindred family, our folk family, our AFA family, but also our family throughout time."

Shortly before making the drive up, I asked some of our northern folk how the weather was, and I should have known when they said it was fine, that their definition and mine were going to be a little different. All in all, it wasn't bad...Illinois gets snow and freezing temps, so that wasn't anything I couldn't deal with...if I had prepared. Ladies and Gents, bring proper head-coverings to our northern hof. A nice week of coughs and sniffles made returning to work after the trip oh so fun. Every second of it, however, was so very much worth it. Getting to spend time with members of both the Northern Blood and SigTyr kindreds, seeing all of the little children (OUR FUTURE) running around and playing, I wouldn't and couldn't trade those times for anything. The meals were excellent too, and speaking of that food, it was nice to be able to see first-hand giving back to the community through their food bank giveaway.

As I said in last month's issue, I am so excited for the coming year...to not only see how much I can grow and achieve but just to sit and watch as I know the AFA folk are going to do big things. And I don't think it's much of a hint to suggest that we ought to all be getting our trunks and preparing to book for a warm-water vacation pretty soon.



I can't leave off here without reminding everyone that January 9th is Remembrance Day for Raud the Strong, and in his honor, we'll be holding a moot here in Southern Illinois. Reach out to me for details and to RSVP. Look forward to seeing you there!


Saturday was the monthly food distribution and we handed out food to several families in the local community. I look forward to these every month and seeing the locals.





Following the tracks of deer lead through winding pathways through the trees and into ravines and small valleys. Eventually, this led all the way to the far side of the park. This is where things got difficult.



Acceptance



When something bad happens it's normal to rage against it. It's in our nature to fight or to try to improve our situation. Accepting things as they are can be a very difficult thing to do, especially when we find ourselves forced to accept something very negative.

There's a phrase that I used to hear repeated by someone whom I cared for very much. At first, I found the utterance of this to be frustrating, they always said it when I would raise some issue that had caused us harm. Anytime something negative would happen in life or someone else would do something bad I would want to take action to change it, but my friend would always just say, "it is what it is."

I found this baffling. I just couldn't understand how they could simply accept something horrible and then move on as if it hadn't happened at all. Here I was furious at the injustice that had just been done, or ill-treatment we had received, but my friend didn't seem to be that bothered by it at all. I just didn't get it.

I always wanted to fight back; to change or remedy all ills. Yet, of course, there are

many things that we simply cannot change. When faced with some injustice against which you can do nothing what does anger get you? That anger and frustration can become nothing more than a poison that eats away at your own soul. It is true that when some wrong has been done we should seek to better things if it is within our power to do so, but when we have no power to change it all our attempts may do is further frustration. I never understood this and so I tortured myself trying to change things I either had no power over or no responsibility for.

It took me years to finally understand my friend's philosophy. You see I viewed their utterance of, "it is what it is," as a weakness. I saw it as an admittance of defeat; I saw it as a passivity that indicated submission. This frustrated me to no end until one day I was placed in a situation where something was happening that I found most disagreeable.

As is in my nature I immediately began looking for a solution. I tortured myself for weeks trying to find some way to fix this problem even though it was not my creation. Until finally I realized that the only thing, I could do was to accept the reality of what was happening and that I had no power to change it. All I could do was say, "it is what it is."

Acceptance is not weakness, or submission, or defeat. Rather it is the realization that sometimes we don't have the ability to change something and trying to do so is nothing more than masochism. Accepting the things, we cannot change does not mean that we allowed them to overcome us, but rather it means that we have decided not to allow them to control us. That we will seek our happiness and find the positive things in life rather than dwelling in the negative. It means seeing the darkness for what it is, but not allowing it to have power over you.

I once loathed the phrase, "it is what it is," but now I see those words as liberation. Change what you can, accept what you cannot.
