Gothi Svan Herul and Apprentice Folkbuilders Rob Stamm & Daniel Young have been hard at work making preparations for this holy temple to be ready for our Thunderer by mid-July. We are all very excited about this milestone. The Asatru Folk Assembly now has the distinction of being the only organization in the world to have multiple temples dedicated to Aesir.

The Asatru Folk Assembly is a registered 501c3 non-profit religious organization, otherwise known as a church. Óðinshof and

Pórshof are "real" and properly zoned for religious land use. No one else has been able to accomplish this in the modern history of our faith and it is something in which we should all share pride. For so long we have been worshiping in backyards, in sheds, in parks, and so on. That was good to start, but I cannot emphasize enough what a big deal it is for our Aesir to have proper temples. And we aren't going to stop. There will be a third, and then a fourth, and then a fifth, and one day a twelfth.

We in the Asatru Folk Assembly are just now beginning to realize our full potential. We are standing on our own, have learned how to walk, and are now ready to begin the marathon.

Day of Remembrance for King Athanaric

King Athanaric, King of the Visigoths, ruled his people from 369 CE until he died in 381 CE. Sometimes called the first and greatest King of his people, Athanaric was a staunch Gothic Pagan. Viewing it as his responsibility to foster and promote the faith of his people he went so far as to execute over three hundred Visigoths that had converted to the Christian faith. Their Gothic culture was paramount, and he feared that the advent of Christianity would destroy it.

During his 12-year reign, Athanaric fiercely defended his culture against the advance of the Roman Christian conversion. In the early years he allied with his fellow Visigoth King, Fritigern, to stop the encroachment of the Roman legions into their lands. While the two were allied the Goths managed to stave off the Roman armies. For unknown reasons, however, Fritigern turned his army against Athanaric, causing the Gothic Civil War.

In the early stages Athanaric won every encounter he had with his one ally. This prompted Fritigern

advances, Fritigern lost the war. The Gothic Civil War took a toll on the land and the Visigoths, however, and when the Huns began to invade shortly after the end of the Civil War Fritigern appealed to Emperor Valen to allow him and his people to cross into Roman land. The appeal was answered, but only for Fritigern, who had since converted to Christianity, and his followers.

The rest of the Visigoths were left to fend for themselves. Despite his best efforts King Athanaric was unable to hold his grounds against the ruthless,



and better provisioned Huns. In the face of starvation, Athanaric led his people into the Alutus Valley (modern-day Transylvania) where they settled. In 380 CE Athanaric was deposed and removed himself to none other than Constantinople and the lands of his once upon a time Enemy, the roman empire. The new Emperor, Theodosius I, accepted Athanaric to the empire graciously. Upon his death some two weeks later Athanaric was buried in all state to show Theodisuis' respect of the Gothic Culture.

Despite all, King Athanaric stood his ground in the face of all. He recognized the importance of maintaining the Culture of his people, recognizing the dangers of conversion for what it was. IN these modern times it is even more important to view Athanaric's struggles for what they were and to remember that the preservation of our people and our culture is so very paramount. It's about Roots. It's about Connections. It's about coming home.

Let us always strive to make sure we have a Home for our folk to come back to!



Europe

A Visit to Öland

It's a funny thing. I've been to a lot of places around our planet but there are still large parts of my own country, Sweden, that are unexplored to me. Therefore I was happy to receive an invitation

just off the Swedish southeast coast connected to the mainland with a bridge. I had never been there but had heard a lot about its beauty and how picturesque it was. Furthermore, the island has a rich history and is covered with ancient sites of all kinds, from graves to forts.



I have to say that Öland didn't disappoint. Within ten minutes of crossing the bridge and arriving on the island, I had to stop my car three times at burial mounds and an old fort. If this is what I can see directly from the road, I thought, I wonder how much more there is to see? Quite a lot as it turned out. In one weekend we visited numerous grave fields, three ancient fortifications, and saw more stone circles and runestones than I can remember. There are also hundreds of old windmills that are fantastic feats of ingenuity that bear witness to our folks' industrious spirit. One of the largest windmills is open to entering and we marveled at the wonderful ancient technology, made of wood, metal, and stone. Another beautiful sight is the old lighthouse Långe Jan (Long John) that

stands on the southernmost edge of the island, among grave fields and burial mounds. Öland is a truly wondrous place; you can feel the history and spiritual energy so dense that the air tingles.

It is hard to describe the beauty of Öland. The island is pretty flat and the much of the middle of its southern part (where we spent most of our time) is covered in Alvar vegetation; a sort of unique limestone terrace with low vegetation and the lush hills roll downwards towards the sea and the beaches. There are farms everywhere and beautiful old houses in small villages and towns. Södra Öland (southern Öland) is a world heritage and the closest I



can come to describing it is like a giant outdoor museum. There are more things to be seen and experienced than can be done in a single weekend. If you are traveling to Europe and want to see as much ancient history in an as short time as possible, I can really recommend it because it is so condensed. There are even houses with millennia-old stone circles in their front lawn, for crying out loud! Also, if you look at the names of the villages you can see clear Asatru roots: Torslunda, Stora Frö, Lilla Frö, Ottenby, Runsten, and so on. The street names give homage to the Aesir and Vanir as well. Once upon a time, Öland must have had an abundance of cults dedicated to the worship of our gods.

A special mention must be made of the Eketorps borg(Eketorp's fort). It is an iron age fortification that has been excavated and rebuilt. For 300 years (approximately 400 AD to 700 AD) Eketorp was a fortified farming community and home to about 200 people. Located in the middle of Alvaretwith



outside of the fortress walls is a marsh with a well, where religious ceremonies were held. To mark the holy well and create a place of sacrifice, spears of hazelwood were placed in the ground around it. Bones from horses and other animals have been found in the marsh, remnants from sacrificial meals. The horse was considered

holy and its meat was eaten in communion at large feasts. Due to the Wuhan virus, my two friends and I were almost alone at the fort and could feel the heartbeats of history unbothered by others. It was truly a wonderful experience.

My friends are not Asatruar. But when I raised the prospect of holding a blot at one of the sites we visited they didn't hesitate. After asking our Folkbuilder Anders Nilsson for advice, I decided to perform an Odin blot. Shortly before nine in the evening we arrived at Gettlinge grave field, a three-minute drive from Martin's house. Gettlinge is an impressive place. It has a couple of stone ships, stone circles, mounds and a pair of huge stones erected in one end of the field, forming a sort of gate. It is located with a beautiful view of the hills and sea. We performed our blot on a mound in the middle of a stone circle. I had described what we were going to do while we were eating dinner that day and I was surprised at how well everything went. It was as if Martin and



André knew what they were supposed to do and took to it with ease, despite it being their first blot, chanting 108 names of Odin and pouring mead over the statue. As we sat there around the fire, making toasts and drinking of the mead made holy under the first stars of the evening, it all felt so natural. It felt right. Perhaps it was the days leading up to the blot, spent visiting all these ancient sites when not working on the house, that put us all in the right mood. Perhaps it was the soft pull of the ancestors and the gods. Perhaps it was both. Regardless of which, the blot was a success and one of the most pleasant ceremonies I've ever participated in. My friends are already talking about wanting to perform blot again the next time we meet and may just have gained a couple of new recruits to the Asatrú Folk Assembly.

One thing is for certain. As we left Öland, we all agreed to come back and meet on that magical isle again.

on the same grave field but this time on a triangular-shaped stone setting. The last two Odin rituals we had ended up being 9 people by "coincidence" it's fantastic to see how they organize things without us knowing or understanding why.

Last, on this eventful day, some of us had a "utesittning", where we spent the night contemplating the time and watching the stars pass by.

I ventured out to buy a birthday gift for my son and after about 10 minutes of driving, I was reminded how much I hate traffic! But it's good to see that things seem to be getting back to normal with people being able to frequent restaurants, stores, and going out in general. Now with the restrictions being eased, we have the freedom to come together and honor our Gods and ancestors, and I'm looking forward to a great summer of creating strong bonds of kinship!

Hvel Power Centers – The Energy body

If Christians pray to cause changes in this world, what did our ancestors do before their forced conversion? They used the Runes and this is called Magic. Magic has been made a joke by the media and was literally murdered out of us by Christianity. Magic is real, it is what our ancestors used to create changes in this reality, it is the power of the runes and when you use them you are creating Magic. During this plague and our forced lockdown I have been furloughed and my work week reduced which gave me plenty of time for meditation, self-development, and actualization. I have delved into the spiritual energy centers that we all possess but rarely utilize thanks to the programming that we have all had to endure. These centers are called the "Hvel" they are also known as the Chakras.

I HAVE always wondered what use could these power centers be? All the material about them constantly speaks about healing and I have never felt I needed healing for anything. What I have found is that energizing and harnessing these power areas raises your vibration so that when you use the Runes they affect the change in this reality that you desire. I have also discovered that they spin as connecting gears, one spinning the next. The following is the result of my own development and experience. We are all unique beings, so as to what you actually experience or discover may be somewhat different.

So how do we actually start powering our energy centers in preparation for magic? We start with breathing. The breath is a major component of power and life, deep full breaths into your solar plexus and a regular rhythm begins to change our vibration and readies us for igniting our power centers. I have found that the first area activated is my Third eye.

The Third Eve

This I have found to be the rune **Ansuz**. It is located in the center of the forehead and about the temples, there will be a distinct tingling when it's functioning. This was the first chakra that was opened for me through intermittent fasting which I believe decalcified my pineal gland. Ansuz is the rune of Odin, it is the god rune and is associated with this Hvel. It is a connection to the folk-soul and the knowledge of that folk. How to feel or find the actual deity of Odin would take a while to

The path for spinning our energy centers begins here at the third eye with a connection to Odin. When the area in between your eyes begins to tingle, make it rotate in a counter-clockwise direction. When it is spinning feel a powerful serpent of energy leaving from the right side of the wheel, traveling down and have it begin spinning the next gear/Hvel in our bodies in a clockwise direction. The throat.

Throat

I have found this to be the rune **Tiwaz**, it is truth and justice. This empowers us to speak only the truth. I have noticed that when talking sometimes it is as if I'm talking underwater, my mouth becomes dry and my temples and third eye vibrate as well as my Crown chakra. I believe this is a signal not to speak as doing so may hurt my reputation or cause undue problems. It is like my audience is not ready for my words, mostly it happens when speaking of the metaphysical. Now follow the clockwise rotation of the Hvel and the serpent of energy as it leaves and engages with the heart Hvel, spinning it counter-clockwise.

Heart

I have found this wheel to be the Rune **Elhaz** which is your Fetch (Elhaz). This is your true self, the inner daemon, it is in your heart beating and giving life. Contacting your true self is one of the first things a person needs to do, your true self is the only thing that remains constant throughout your various incarnations. While listening to a program on the rune Elhaz, it was mentioned to internalize this Rune and when I did, it went immediately to my heart. The new age movement says love is felt there but I feel my Fetch and it is defense and protection. Perhaps what the love they are describing is the love of my true-self, protecting and guiding me. The serpent path of our energy now activates and spins clockwise the Solar Plexus Hvel.

Solar Plexus

It is the Rune **Sowilo**, the power of the sun, and victory. This is in the area of the stomach, our "second brain" as well as the pancreas. It took me a long time to actively empower this Hvel, but after some serious meditation I can spin it on command. This wheel spins clockwise and turns the Sacral Hvel.

Sacral

It is the Rune **Kenaz** and located below the naval, it is creativity and spins counter-clockwise. It is associated with the reproductive organs. I have also just recently been able to activate this wheel on a regular basis. The serpent path of our energy now activates in a clockwise motion the Root Hvel.

Root

It is the rune **Fehu** and it is located at the base of the spine, it is the first rune and the power of


serpent". This serpent in the rune poem is kundalini (Eihwaz), the serpent energy that has been powering our Hvels. I have read that the Hvel can be powered beginning at the root as stated in the rune poem or from the top down. You will have to begin working with the Hvels to see what works best for you. The Root Hvel color is red and rotates clockwise, the serpent energy now exits on the opposite side it entered and travels back up our spinning power centers, each turning the one above it until it reaches the Third eye and the path repeats. At some point you may notice a tingling sensation on top of your head. This is the crown Hvel.

Crown

Gibor (Armanen runes) is this Rune and it closely related to the elder Futhark **Gebo** Rune and is located at the top of the head. This is your connection to the Infinite. I have noticed that when this area is activated it is always after my 3rd eye is functioning. It never seems to tingle without it.

The All-father himself is on a constant quest for knowledge leaving no stone uncovered in his quest for immortality, and I hope that my experiences help you in some way on your personal path to enlightenment. I would recommend The "9 doors of Midgard" by Stephen Flowers who lays out a great program for learning about these powerful centers and the Runes. If you have any questions or comments don't hesitate to send me a message.



Each Hvel power center is closely related to a corresponding gland in our bodies, the colors of the light spectrum are also associated with each one and in turn each has a Rune associated with it. This is the Bifrost or Rainbow bridge. In my experience I have found that they rotate like gears, each one spinning the one above and below it. I have also found that kundalini (Eihwaz) travels in a path that is ascending and descending in a back and forth pattern that powers the wheels at either side of the spine (front and back), as represented by the ancient "Staff of Hermes" symbol.

This June the main event will be the midsummer festival at the Hof in California, but there are several events around the NW including the Midsummer blot in Couer d'Alene ID with the Cascadia Althing Kindred.




