Day of Remembrance

Olvir of Egg



Sometime between 1020 and 1021 CE, the Christianization of Pagan Europe was well underway. King Olaf II was ensconced on the throne of Norway. Much of the country had been baptized under the threat of torture and death. Such things, however, were not enough to deter the faithful, and eventually, word reached the ears of King Olaf II of gatherings in and around Trondheim of a very pagan nature.

Olvir of Egg, a leader and a Gothi of his people, was elected by his people to speak to

the King on their behalf and to defend their religious activities. An intelligent man, Olvir was called before the King on two separate occasions to defend the stories of Pagan festivals and feasts. On both occasions, Olvir of Egg humbly described not Pagan gatherings, but communal gatherings, in which neighbors drank and feasted as friends.

Both times Olvir left behind an unconvinced King and when spies told him a third time of an Eostre festival being arranged for the people, Olaf decided that he had heard enough. Five ships and over three hundred men were gathered and set out to ambush Olvir and the men and women who worshipped with him. Arriving under the cover of darkness, Olaf's men ambushed Olvir and his pagan community. Olvir was killed and many of his people were tortured, mutilated, or killed. Once a great stronghold of the Pagan faith, Trondheim had been taken.

And what can we learn from this story?

Many of these stories are not happy stories. On the surface, they are stories of death and defeat, but we have to look past the surface of all of these stories. Here, with Olvir, we see a man who loved his Gods and, despite all of the pressures of his ancient world, did his best to worship them. Not only did he do his best for himself, but he also did the best he could for his people. In the face of adversity, Olvir did his best to provide and protect his people from the angry, outside force that was the King.

Our world is not the same world that Olvir lived in. We have the right to choose our faith, but there will always be obstacles. In these times, when our native faith is still so small, and our heritage is being challenged by the multicultural whirlwind, remember Olvir. Provide a safe place for your folk to be away from the harm of the "societal norm". Remember that sometimes smart words are required instead of rash ones.

Be there for your folk. Provide for your folk.







The fellow quickly got out of the car and asked how he could help. The answer was simple: help carry bags. With his help, we were done in no time. After a round of hearty handshakes, he returned to his car and gave a big wave as he drove off. As always, people instinctively feel the warm nature of Odinshof when they pull into the driveway. We never let them down.



Since April, I've built a strong bond with our food source's CEO and his warehouse manager. We still shine in their eyes, no matter what they've heard, because they know us for who we are. Several men engaged in an activity of nailing pine planks to build a wall for our Midsummer's ax-throwing. This all led to plans of scheduling a work-weekend for mid-March of maintenance and repairs.





Children's chatter came to us from the swing-set and play area called Kinderheim. Midday, they filled and hung hummingbird feeders under the guidance of Folkbuilder

Ashley Stockton. Ashley also brought planting supplies, which kept the young ones busy filling peat-pots with soil and seeds.



Gythia McNallen invited the ladies to come into the hall for a discussion about the nature of our Goddesses. Contemplation of personal goals and tips for achieving those, using the metaphor of planting sunflower seeds and watching them develop from now until Midsummer. Meanwhile, Stephen McNallen gathered the men outdoors to give his views on the impact of "the plow" on our people and how it has encouraged community from ancient times to today's AFA.





Each monthly event now features a traditional European dish. For February, Krystal spent long hours preparing Hungarian pork paprikash with homemade spaetzle, served with fried cabbage & bacon. A 50/50 raffle to benefit the Hof came next. Marc and Deedy donated their winning half back to Odinshof, which was gratefully accepted.



It was now time to gather in the ritual circle for the honoring of the lesser-known Goddess, Gefjon. In our lore, Gefjon employed her sons in pulling a plow to cut a huge rift that created an island of her own. To this day, Gefjon is the patron Goddess of Denmark. With the theme of cutting the turf to prepare for planting, each person was told to set a personal goal and think about the tools necessary to achieve that. We focused on the rune Mannaz, for achieving balance and excellence in preparing for what lies before each of us. Galdring runes and a mead blessing of "head, heart, and hands" were part of our exchange with the Holy Powers.



A deep chill descended as the day waned and people drifted towards the campfire ring with the bonfire. Many had left for home, but those who remained were ready for the Sumbel. Noble deeds and people were remembered, with many thanks expressed. In his own unique way, gracious and caring words from Victor were expressed to each one of us ~ love of Folk and Family.


Our next Moot will be on Friday, March 25th at Ludwig's German Table in San Jose, CA. We hope to see you there!

The Egoic mind, the "chatterbox" that is in our heads, exists only here in Midgard and thus constantly creates drama, tempts us with vices, and bombards us with negative thoughts to instill fear and distract us from ascending and learning our true purpose, our Fate. Our Fates were written in the fabric of time by the Norns, and the Gods have given us free will to discover and live with our fate so that we may fulfill our roles in this great recurring cosmic battle. Free will allows us to choose to not be afraid, to do the right thing.

In the Grímnismál from the Poetic Edda, we are told that Valhalla has five hundred and forty doors and eight hundred Einherjar can pass through simultaneously to engage the wolf Fenrir at Ragnarök. This is a total of 432,000 Einherjar, which coincidentally is the number of years of the Kali Yuga, from this we can derive that time is cyclic and we are in the Wolf age. The Völuspá gives us a description of the Wolf age:

Brothers shall strive | and slaughter each other; Own sisters' children | shall sin together; Ill days among men, | many a whoredom: An ax-age, a sword-age, | shields shall be cloven; A wind-age, a wolf-age, | ere the world totters.

If you haven't noticed, the world has flipped on its head. What is right is wrong and what is wrong is right and it certainly sounds like this passage from the Voluspa. The fact that you have felt the calling of our Gods and joined the AFA is proof that something higher is out there, you have heroically stood up to do the right thing counter to what the world is telling you. You must always remember that you are doing nothing wrong, there is nothing to fear. You of your own free will have chosen to do the right thing.

Odin and our Gods live without fear battling and defeating the giants that stand in their way, and we must follow their example and lead a fearless life. Do not be afraid of death for it truly is not the end as heroes are destined for Valhalla! Finding your true purpose and living with your fate will make certain that you do not waste your opportunity in this life to do something meaningful. Ásatrú, our ancestral spirituality helps guide us to live heroically and in line with Natural Law. Natural Law are those truths that are inherited in all of us from the moment of birth, passed down from countless generations of ancestors, and by living with these innate laws you will create a happy and fulfilling existence.

Listening to the negative egoic mind creates a tsunami of negativity and crushing fear that will manifest the exact thing you are dreading. By Immediately countermanding negative thoughts with positivity put into past tense and known to you as fact, things will come to pass that seemed impossible. Through controlling and combating negativity we begin to build our will and gain access to our true selves, the part of you that has been through all your re-births here in Midgard. Connecting with the immortal part of you will allow you to understand the nature of Midgard and that it may be directly manipulated according to your desires. The Allfather Odin hung on a windy tree for nine days and won us the Runes by his self-sacrifice, and he teaches them to us so that we may play our part in this cosmic battle more effectively. With this knowledge comes great power and it must not be wielded selfishly but in accordance with your fate.

When you counteract negativity and put out to the universe that something positive has happened, it will manifest. The things necessary for this manifestation to occur will present themselves but be aware they may not appear as you would think, and so you must be open to whatever comes your way, realize that you may have to work for it, nothing is free.

Do not forget to take time to enjoy life, something that seems as trivial as feeling the sun on your skin, or the laughter of your children may help to offset the seemingly endless struggle to obtain your goals, but again do not give in to indulgence as moderation is a discipline all into itself.

Our ancestors greatly dreaded a Straw death, meaning not to die heroically in battle but rather from old age. I would put forth that this may also mean that you remained asleep and did not answer or ignore the call to awaken and take your place in history. So be alert when your intuition guides you or synchronistic events show themselves to embrace them and bravely venture forth to fight in the fray, knowing you will gain your goals and live your fate!

I hope that these words may help you find your higher purpose here in Midgard, and someday may we all feast together in Odin's Hall, Valhalla!




Taking an Oath

This is THE rune set of the Asatru Folk Assembly and our Hofs! If you've seen any of Witan Svan's murals, you may have noticed that he uses runes from all four of the main futharks: Elder, Younger, English, & Armanen. The purpose of this, and of the Folk Futhark in general, was to create a living tradition of runes for our modern Folk.

We are no longer Proto-Germanic, nor Vikings, nor Saxons of the Heptarchy, and we are certainly not all Armanen... We are modern Aryans, with our roots spreading across all of Europa, and we are building a modern tradition of Asatru and rune work. This Futhark holds the same concepts and mysteries of the Elder Futhark runes, but some of the staves themselves are borrowed from the other three rune rows.

With all this being said, I will start writing short lessons on each of the Folk runes, and explaining why Witan Svan chose different staves, if applicable. We will study a few runes a month, starting after Ostara!

Despite the precarious travel conditions, we enjoyed an incredibly solid turnout for our blót honoring Eyvind Kinrifi. We told the tragic tale of Eyvind and drank to his memory, we shared food, fellowship, and offerings to Ása-Thor, we... berated one another into an impromptu pull-up contest which, in honor of our illustrious and ill-fated hero Eyvind, I chose to heroically lose... really, really bad...like, brutally.



By mid-February, my masculinity had recuperated to the point I allowed myself to be suckered into a wintery rucksack death march at the behest of the leering snow demons masquerading as friends in the background of the picture above. An ice storm the night before had made the woodland trails difficult (and a little dangerous) to traverse. It is usually appropriate for something like a ruck hike to be associated with communing with nature; it is true that the icy woods were both peaceful and beautiful.

Arrival of Spring and plans in Western Pennsylvania





Happenings in Southeastern Ohio






Fallen Timbers Presents: Charming of the Plow

She spoke of the importance of this and how it translates to the start of our new season and the welcoming of the gods of fertility.







We closed the ritual after passing the horn around and calling upon a god and sipping the mead and gave our offerings into a bowl. The whole ritual and experience was so powerful I honestly cannot put into words how meaningful it was. By the end of it, I welled up with tears from the amount of energy that filled the room.

After the ritual, we blessed the food and enjoyed a meal together. The rest of the evening we all enjoyed our time together as children played throughout the house.



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Runic Yoga Part 4 NOT/EH



If you have made it this far, I am sure you have noticed results in your life. The runes themselves start speaking to you more and more and you may have found the ability to see everything from a different perspective. Like standing above all the events that are happening around you and knowing the wisest way forward in all choices made. What your personal life's mission is has become clearer. The list goes on but in general, everything is syncing, and you have become more than what you were before. Of course, there is still work to be done and that is what we shall cover today.

Before we get into the main topic I would like to discuss "will" and "knowing". The will is vital in Runic Yoga. We have to learn to shut out all distractions and concentrate on the task at hand with everything that we have for those brief moments. This translates to other areas in our lives. The things that used to overwhelm us no longer do. Our mind, body, and spirit are now under our control. During the pulling energy part, this is where "knowing" comes into play. We don't just want to believe and visualize that we are doing it but actually know we are and willing it into ourselves. Truly pulling it from above, below, etc. For myself, this transition took some time but one day it all clicked. I had stepped to the other side so to speak. Now of course I am not perfect. On certain days I lose the battle in Runic Yoga and life itself but at the end of the day or even at the moment of failure I have learned to take an inventory of myself. I can quickly realize I wasn't being directed by who I wanted. With every failure though is where we will find growth with the right mindset. We have never actually failed but learned. To summarize, "know" that you can do anything, and anything is what you shall do *.

NOT Rune

Face North and take 3 to 7 deep breaths in the IS rune stance.

Now raise your arms with the right higher and left lower like in the picture provided. With each inhale pull the energy through your right arm and down into your body. Note: I generally pull it towards the right side of my head then down to the solar plexus region.

Do this a minimum of 9 breaths and on every 3rd hum (nnnnnn)

When completed, put your arms down and stay in this IS rune stance for a period of time. Breathe, be quiet and lose any mundane thoughts. In time answers will come.



EH Rune

Face North and take 3 to 7 deep breaths in the IS rune stance.

Now raise your arms, left higher and right lower (the opposite of what was done in NOT)

Now with each inhale instead of pulling energy from the higher arm and downward you'll actually pull it from the lower and upward through yourself out the upper arm.

Note: for myself, I get a sense of being pulled in that somewhat upward direction.

Like matter breaking apart and physically lighter.

Do this a minimum of 9 breaths and every 3rd sing (aaaaaaa).

When completed, put your arms down and stay in the IS rune stance for a period of time again and feel the love if you will that is working its way in you.



Note: Another important practice that can and should be done in between each Runic Yoga stance is to give part of the energy back to its source. A gift for a gift in a way. We are given health, knowledge, strength, etc but we also contain qualities that we can share with the Holy Powers. This is how I do it so hopefully, it will give all of you some ideas. I simply take a deep breath, raise my arms like in the picture provided and pull energy from my being (a solar plexus area is a good place) up my body through my arms and out my fingers to the Black Sun that is pictured in my mind's eye. If you want to get an idea of what this energy looks like coming out of yourself, stare at your fingertips for a period of time. Eventually you'll start to see streams of Vril shooting out in a way. For myself, that is what I am giving back. Lastly, while doing this short practice keep our thoughts on pure thankfulness and love.

Now let's move on to some thoughts about these 2 Runes that will help guide us in this part of our transformation process. In the first 5 runes covered, we gained power, health, and wisdom from the great cosmic forces at play if you will. In the Cross Rune we more or less put it all together. Now we find ourselves at NOT, back in this reality in a sense. For many, NOT can seem like a negative rune. Falling, tension and adversity are a few of the words that come to mind. What is interesting about this is

that almost all of our misery presently comes from ourselves. It could be from a number of things like our actions and even our thoughts from this life and past. When we can make this realization, we start to "see" differently. The dots start to connect. NOT is very personal in this way. When we understand all is in flux around us because of our past and not let it overtake us, we win. The Hero knows how to work within these laws and in some cases breaks them entirely. He has "settled the discord quickly" within himself as the rune song states. In doing so, a change happens. He has won his combat here; entropy has been reversed and his prize is in EH. The One lost long ago and now found. The Beloved, the Higher Part of himself. The Horse and the Rider reunited to take on eternity together. EH in many ways is the total opposite of NOT. It is NOT from the other side. It is the rune of pure love; freedom and we can also say no laws in a sense. As many know Marriage is by far one of the most sacred aspects for our people and is a huge part of this rune as well. Utter devotion and loyalty to the physical wife or husband here also translate to the Beloved within. We must remain forever loyal if this special person is ever found. It is not good enough to just not betray him or her in the flesh either. Even when our minds wander to another we have already lost. We are not made of just one body but many. This is extremely important to remember. In the age we live in there are many distractions or traps by design but EH shows us the truth in how we are supposed to be as an Aryan.


In closing, we must watch what we put out into the world in thought, word and deed. We will have to contend with it. It's up to us if it will be descending in nature † or ascending †.

I know that I hung on a windy tree nine long nights, wounded with a spear, dedicated to Odin, myself to myself, on that tree of which no man knows where its roots run. - Havamal 139

The preceding Havamal stanza is one of the most widely known in Modern Asatru. Here, Odin hangs himself upon Yggdrasil in order to gain knowledge of the runes, the secrets of the universe. What can we learn from this, and how can we apply this in daily practice? Like many things in Asatru, the answer can be multilayered and complex. Today we are going to explore these possibilities in a simplified way.

First, let's define sacrifice. The Free Dictionary defines it as; thus, "The act of giving up something highly valued for the sake of something else considered to have a greater value." There are of course definitions involving ritual slaughter of animals, but for the

sake of this article, I'll use the definition shown above.

Havamal stanza 139 shows us that Odin was willing to sacrifice himself in his current state to achieve a state of greater importance. If the god of the highest stature in our pantheon was not enough for himself, then why would we, as his followers, ever become static? He saw himself as worthy of sacrifice, to attain a higher state of being. So, we must view ourselves in a similar light.

Who do you want to be? What would that look like? Picture that version of yourself. Meditate upon it. Begin to think about what it will take to get there.

For many of us, personal health and fitness is something we don't take seriously until it's too late. In 2017 I was diagnosed with Type 2 diabetes. For a guy who is 165 lbs. soaking wet, this came as a shock to me. I even argued with the doctor. "There is no way I'm diabetic, I'm rail thin!" But reality began to sink in, this was going to be a lifelong fight. No more sugar, cut back on alcohol, find a way to beat this without medication if possible. Hit the gym and eat right.

Every time I lay back on the bench press, or step to the squat rack, I visualize the version of myself I want to become. Every press of the barbell, every squat, every deadlift is an act of self-sacrifice. Sacrificing the current version to that which I want to ascend to. The bench is my altar. Every time I want to eat cake, drink a sugary drink, I try to visualize that ideal self. Ripped, strong, and happy. I add the word "happy" here for a reason. Physical excellence adds to spiritual excellence. If you feel good physically, your emotional state also improves. Someone will tell you that dopamine increases during physical exercise. That may be the case, all I know is it makes you feel better.

Ascension is what defines us as Aryan men and women. Our ancestors were constantly chasing new horizons, giving up what is "good enough" for something more. This is an Odinic way of being. Overhauling an engine takes time and patience. You'll bust knuckles and strip bolts along the way. Just know that you are worth it. Every mile you run, every drop of sweat you wipe from your brow, every aching muscle is a sacrifice of yourself to yourself. For our Gods, for our children, for our ancestors... Stay strong my folk!



Charming of the Plow in the Stonewall Shire



We began the ritual with a retelling of the Skirnismal over the course of the several preceding days. When we gathered for blot, we reenacted the trials of Skirnir in the hall of Gunlod, as he heroically (and at times not so heroically) attempts to win the maid of Jotunheim for his Lord Ingvi Frey.



Just before blot, we had a moment of preparation in which each member present was

given a small token, a simple medallion of cut birch wood, with which to create a personal sigil - a "seed" containing each individual's intention to plant for the coming season.

First, we offered an apple into the furrow. Then the promise of Draupnir, the ring of Odin. These present insufficient to win over Gunlod (who for our ritual purpose represents an allegory for the frigid earth before planting season), we then reenacted the panic of Skirnir as he threatens her with beheading, the slaying of her father, and a beating with a club - all in vain.



Finally, we gave lufe to Skirnir's last resort - magic. Three curse staves representing madness, lust, and shame were given to fair Gunlod with a magic wand obtained from the woods. While this act represents necessity and desperation, (for it is death to the tribe if the earth refuses the blessings of the fertility god), the wand was nonetheless broken and laid in the furrow with a deep apology to the Great Mother for this needful bit of coercion.



Then, a horn of mead was shared among the Folk, given to Skirnir by Gunlod, as is told in the Edda. After the remainder of the horn was poured lovingly into the furrow, the tokens bearing each member's personal sigil were buried with the apple, the broken wand, and the consecrated mead. The furrow was then buried over and tamped down so that no trace of it remained.





Stonewall Kindred continues to grow, not only in numbers but in sophistication. We are now in the second year of our ritual cycle, each new repetition of our seasonal blots being an improvement upon the previous year. We look both to the past and to the future with the hopeful expectation that this trend of growth in our region continues as strongly as it began.

Delightful or Disgusting?



During Charming of the Plow at Baldrshof, we introduced a new adventure to our Hof events: "Delightful or Disgusting?" Our goal is to introduce Folk to food recipes of our ancestry that they may not normally try!

Hardfiskur was introduced to the Baldrshof Folk, most for the first time. Hardfiskur, a staple of an Icelandic diet, is traditionally made by hanging and drying fresh fish (most often cod or haddock) on outdoor racks to dry and preserve. After drying for several weeks, the result is a tough and smelly leather that is best described as "fish jerky".

Although it is best served after being beaten (to soften it up) then slathered with butter (try it with butter and lemon!), our very curious folk just tried it straight from the bag before I had a chance to fix it upright. There was a definite line drawn between those who loved it (and were excited to take leftovers home) and those who hated it (and asked what was WRONG with me).

If you are brave (and like fish) hardfiskur can be found easily online.

I have something just as delicious (or disgusting) planned for Ostara. Be brave and give it a try!

For March, we have Ostara in the Midwest in collaboration with Indiana neighbors, Heimdall's Mitgart. I look forward to hosting this and posting about it next month.





Rules For Pitch:

Objective: Reach 11 points

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Point Scoring per hand:
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High Card, 1 pt

Low Card, 1 pt

Jack, 1 pt

Joker, 1 pt

Game (High Hand Points), 1 pt

The object of the hand is to maintain or take the High Card, Low Card, Jack, Joker of the trump suit during gameplay.

*Note: The low card can not be taken, it remains with the player to whom it was dealt and they receive the point.

Game point is determined by hand points. Whoever has the highest hand points receives the 1 game point. Hand Points are counted from the cards a player has at the end of the hand from the stacks they have "won" during gameplay.

Scoring for Hand Points:

Aces = 4 points

Kings = 3 points

Queens = 2 points

Jacks = 1 point

10s = 10 points

Joker = 1 point only as a tie breaker

All players can receive and lose points, not just the winning bidder. The benefit of being the winning bidder is choosing trump and playing first, essentially having the chance to control the hand and gameplay.

Hands are played until 1 player reaches 11 points.

*Note on "going out": If the winning bidder reaches 11 points during gameplay, the game ends before hand is complete.

Dealing:

Strip the deck of all 2s, 3s, 4s so that 5 is the "Low Card" (6 players)

The dealer deals three cards at a time to players in clockwise order. Each player receives 6 cards.

A few cards will be leftover, reshuffle these cards back into the deck after a hand is over.

Trump explained:

Whoever wins the bid (bids the most points), decides what suit will be trump and leads the hand. A card of this suit must be played as the first card out.

Trump must be played if trump is led. Any other card is suitable in absence of trump.

Trump does NOT have to be played if a suit is led that does NOT trump and the player does not have cards of the played non-trump suit.

The JOKER is a trump card, greater than 10, less than Jack. It can be taken by any trump face card.

Bidding:

The first bid is the player seated to the dealer's left.

Each player will "bid" on how many points they intend to take. The minimum bid is 2. Players can bid or pass.

Players must bid higher than the player before them or "pass".

Should a player overbid, the player will lose all points bid. For example, player bids 3, but only takes 2 points, this player will lose 3 points from their score.

*Note: Players can not go "below the line". If a player has 0 points but does not hit their bid, they do not receive negative points.

*Note: If a player "shoots the moon" and bids all 5 points AND wins all 5 points, the game is over.

*Note: If all players "pass" and there is no bid, all cards are turned back in and reshuffled and redealt.

GamePlay:

The player who won the bid plays first and must play a trump card first. Bidder decides the trump suit.

Each player plays one card per play, keeping the stacks that they "win" and using the entire stack at the end to count "game points".

The highest card takes the stack, or if trump is played, the highest trump card wins the stack. (Aces are high)

Points are counted at the end of each hand, with the exception of the bidder "going out". Dealer responsibility moves to the left with each hand.

Gjallarhorn



March marks the beginning of spring and new birth. We will be celebrating Ostara this month. Also, we will be remembering the devotion of Olvir of Egg who continued to follow our faith after several warnings under penalty of death by the Christian convert King Olaf, who eventually had Olvir killed. Many will hold rituals to both Olvir as well as to Eostre the goddess of the dawn, Ostara. These rituals can be as simple as adding a place setting for Olvir and your table and raising a horn of mead and toasting his name or a blot to Ostara.

One Component of a Ritual involves a Gjallarhorn: Gjallarhorn or "hollering horn", the "loud-sounding horn" is associated with the god Heimdallr and is often made from cattle horn. The Gjallarhorn is mentioned once in the Poetic Edda and three times in the Prose Edda book of the Gylfaginning Chapter 15, 25 and 51.

Prior to the sounding of the Gjallarhorn an explanation of why it's done is in order and may vary with the Gothar's intentions. I approach this as a preparatory to command; to gather the folk for Blot/ritual.

The Gjallarhorn is blown 3 times: Horn is blown very loudly so as to be heard in all of the 9 worlds.

1st sounding.

This is to inform the folk and the Landvættir that we are about to call the gods. You could say, "Ljossalfar, Svartalfar, Dokkalfar, Landvaettir. Light Elves, Swarthy Elves, Dark Elves, Land Wights. Do you know that we are about to call the Holy Aesir? Those that Wish us Woe, Wend your Way from here. Those that wish us Weal are Welcome" Sound the Gjallarhorn!

2nd sounding.

All having heard the first sound of the Gjallarhorn will be making their way to the circle and follow the lead of the Gothar sunwise into the circle for Blot The second sounding is a final call to our folk and our ancestors to join us as we are about to call the Holy Aesir! Sound the Gjallarhorn!

3rd sounding.

In the presence of the ancestors and folk, Call the Gods! Sound the Gjallarhorn! This concludes one component of a Ritual
