Day of Remembrance






Originally born in Denmark, Else Christensen (nee Ochsner) was one of the leading figures in the modern Asastu movement. As a young woman, she left her hometown of Esbjerg in favor of Copenhagen. It was during her time in Copenhagen that Else awoke

to the ideas of National Socialism in the midst of right-wing and left-wing radical struggles. She met and married Aage Alex Christensen, and together they were members of the Danish Workers Party.

Both she and her husband were imprisoned after the German invasion of Denmark in 1940 for their involvement with elements of the National Workers Party. After their release from prison Else and her husband emigrated to Canada, via England.

Even from Canada, Else continued to nurture her desire to find a place for her own people. It was during this time, while she was reaching out to far-right activists across North America that she first discovered Odinism in a pamphlet titled Call of Our Ancient Nordic Religion, by Alexander Rud Mills. This was the beginning of Else's dedication to the revival of the worship of the Norse Gods. Her understanding of our relationship with the Gods was heavily influenced by the idea that the Gods were encoded in the collective unconscious of the Aryan race.

In 1969 Else Christensen founded the Odinist Fellowship. Until her death in 2005, Else worked tirelessly for her folk, spreading the word of our faith and our Gods to all who would listen. She founded a prison outreach program that proved to be instrumental to many men. She wrote and published many publications. Her efforts saw her recognized as the Folk- Mother to Asatruar everywhere.



So, what can we learn from this story?

We don't always know where our stories end. We can't always see the ramifications of our thoughts when put into action. Else was just one single woman. She was a woman who believed in unpopular ideas at a time when those ideas were definitively unpopular. Despite being imprisoned for those beliefs she did not give up.

Our current times are, in many ways, similar to the ones that Else dealt with. They are turbulent and wrought with anger on all sides. We stand at the precipice of a new world, but we have no way of knowing which way the tides will turn. Else didn't turn and run. She stood and faced the future. In doing so she became one of the most important women in the Asatru movement to date.

When things are hard, when public opinion would have you conform, just remember. Your story hasn't reached its end yet, and only you can control the direction the story takes.

Stand strong.

Stand with Else.

May Day



On the heels of Hexxenacht, when the cattle were blessed in the smoke of the fire before being sent to their summer fields we celebrate May Day! Halfway between the spring and summer solstice, May Day is often considered to be the first day of summer. Warmer days are becoming normal. The spring rains that helped to nourish the wakening fields have begun to taper off. The world around us is verdant again.

On May Day, sometimes called Sumermál, big celebrations were held both to celebrate the end of the harder days of winter and to bless themselves and their crops for a fertile and productive year. Men and women leaped over fires together or alone, wishing for fertility in the coming year. The maypole was raised and around it, people danced and wove their ribbons. Women decorated their windows and doors with flowers and wove them into their hair.

Mayday is the coming together of men and women to celebrate life. We use this time to celebrate all the good things that we have, all of the things that we have worked hard for. We have survived the harsh months when stagnation is so easy a thing to fall into. When the celebration is done, the real hard work begins. The plan that was set into motion at Charming of the Plow will now begin the active stage. Those seeds that you planted, or that project that you planned at Ostara, will now need real tending to. Mayday marks the beginning. It marks the start of growth.



Ancestral Food and Culture

Meron Family Meat Pie Recipe



This is my mother's meat pie recipe. For us, this was always a Christmas Eve tradition and so now I am working it into Yule instead.

1/2 lb ground beef
1/2 lb ground pork
large onion
large potato
1 tsp salt
2 tsp Bell's poultry seasoning
1 can golden mushroom soup
6 saltine crackers
pie crust

I have not made a pie crust for this and always used a store-bought one. Lightly fry the pork and beef until it starts to brown. Add onion and saute. Microwave a large potato for 5 minutes. Peel off the skin and add to the meat. Mash and mix together. Add salt, poultry seasoning, soup, and cracker crumbs. The two key flavors here are the poultry seasoning and the Golden mushroom soup (not cream of mushroom) Spread pie crust in a pie pan. Add filling to the crust and cover with a second crust. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes or until crust is golden. Good served with something like cottage cheese or sour cream on the side.

This month, we were able to ask if they'd like "a ham or a chicken," as extra provisions were offered to us for Easter dinners. We gave away lots of provisions to 31 families consisting of 106 individuals and saw the success of our program in the smiles and friendly waves as people drove off.

Hexannacht at Óðinshof





Going Back in Time at Sutters Fort



We went to Sutters Fort to learn the origin story of this beautiful piece of history before it is lost forever. From jail cells, and guardrooms, to armories and candle-making and even an old oak tree from Kandern, Baden, Germany, the birthplace of John Sutter, this fort had many different pieces of history happening in it at any given time.





The guards' room, not pictured is a whole set up of a washbasin, grooming tools, and a razor. The bed is made of a very thin mattress that was hand-sewn and stuffed with cotton grown nearby. And the candle-making room. You can see the soot-covered walls and chimney where the melting and shaping of the candles take place. The "table" in the middle is a drying/hardening rack for the candles to cool down and solidify into their shape. This was definitely a very educational moot and was a lot of fun!

A May Day Wedding at Odinshof



From their home in Arizona, Carter Shafer and his fiancée Sloane McFarland had set their sights on Odinshof as the venue for their May first wedding. This was their first trip to Odinshof, chosen by them for our dramatic ritual circle, and by extension, the might and majesty of the Lord of Asgard.



After much rehearsal and fine-tuning, the moment came...The wedding party slowly processed into the ritual circle to the music of Wagner's Lohengrin led by AFA Founder Stephen McNallen, who carried a blazing torch to light the fire in the center of the circle - a fire of holiness, of the might of the blazing sun, and of course, the hearth-fire. Then came the groom, best man, and torchbearers. The bride, whose radiance outshone the ritual fire, was walked in with her father. With her demure smile and wearing a simple embroidered dress of traditional folk design, she was for that moment the incarnation of Europa herself.

The ritual itself had passages of great eloquence inspired by Nietsche and others and much symbolism in the use of fire and torch. Affirmations of honor and duty rang across the circle as Founder McNallen called on the Holy Powers and Ancestors to witness this rite. After the rings were exchanged, Carter removed the floral crown that Sloane wore into the circle and replaced it with a crown of leaves - for she was a mere girl no longer, but a wife, with a new and more exalted role.



Escorted out to the magnificent music of Beethoven, we adjourned to the hall for a wonderful meal worthy of the event, catered by a local chef. While some danced to Stauss waltzes, the McNallens shared information about Asatru to family members who had all just witnessed a wedding very different from the Christian experience.

It was our honor to play such a major role in the lives of this young couple. May they always know the blessings of the Gods! Hail, Mr. and Mrs. Shafer, and may their line be fruitful and happy!


We will be beginning to host other gatherings around Western Montana, and a May event should be announced once the details and location are finalized, so stay tuned!

This was my first time performing and attending such a gathering and I was overwhelmed by the feeling of Love that was present. The happiness and joy of welcoming little Lorelei into the world really struck me with just how amazing life really is.

Our ancestors considered that a baby did not yet have a soul or a place in the family örlög until nine days later when it was named. The naming rite and feast are the events in which the ørlög is laid for the child's entire life; its personal being was tied into the hamingja and luck of the family, clan, and tribe or community. It is at this time that the "Norns," or rather the family's idises, come to speak its wyrd.



In the days leading up to the ceremony, I had fasted and meditated upon Lorelei in order to ask the Norns for their blessings upon her. From the mother Goddess Udr I drew the rune Kenaz, a blessing of inspiration and creativity. From Verdandi the power of Uruz, that she may break through all barriers that may be in her way so that she may gain her goals. The blessing from the Goddess Skuld was Mannaz, the rune of Man. It is with this that she may be enlightened to know the true nature of this world, to learn and live with her fate with an all-encompassing passionate purpose and have a fulfilling and joyful life during her time here in Midgard.

The Goddesses of fate water Ygdrasil the tree of life daily and write into the stars at the moment of birth a person's purpose in this world. We have been blessed with free will to discover this purpose and should choose to work with it. We as parents and as a community must provide guidance to the best of our ability, so that this new soul may discover their fate and learn to live with all the distractions offered up in Midgard. Welcome, Lorelei to your family, your Folk, and this world of Midgard!

When the men returned from their sacrifice they dipped their fingers into the fertility water completing it. The water was placed in hand-painted water bottles for everyone to use throughout the year as offerings to the Gods and Goddesses for those times in our lives when we need more fertility and vigor.

Bløt was held with sumble after. We enjoyed many hours of sunshine, food, and frith. It was a great day. We look forward to next year.


The amount of love and positive energy present was phenomenal.





Pennsylvania Sigrblot



At the beginning of our journey, we debated going on our hike or not as the weather was questionable but, we the group ruled to proceed. We started our trek off along Dead Man's Hallow Trail in a single file line as we rung bells to awaken the gods and to help chase away any negativity on the paths ahead.



When you think of a hike in nature you are probably used to the sounds of birds and trees rustling but we wanted a different experience for this hike. We wanted to invite strength, endurance, and spiritual awakening to prove to Wotan that we are capable, so we had certain folkish music being played to try and help us release some of our internalized strength, allowing the music to tap in and pull something out of our subconscious. In addition to the music, Christine Dumas did drum work for us to direct the intensity of our energy and to help us focus on our mission ahead as well as a form of protection. You could feel a ripple of rings vibrating from the trees as she played, creating a protective barrier to our folk.



Upon each steep incline that we approached, we hailed Wotan and kept moving. Our first stop was at The Well Trees. This tree has three trunks that stem from one base and in the center is a well of water. I encouraged folk to dip anything they'd like consecrated into the well, but to proceed with caution as the energy that came from within symbolized great power. One of the unique things about this trail is that the switchback paths create sig runes back and forth, as it's surrounded around lush greenery and tall treetop canopies. Really allows you to find a meditative rhythm. About halfway into our hike, we were hit with extreme rain, wind, and hail. We were

too far in to turn back, and so we pressed on, drum and all as we moved with purpose, persevering through those miserable moments, with the thoughts in mind, that far worse is ahead and that our ancestors had far greater struggles.



As we reached our Second destination the rain finally lightened up, and we came to The Enchanted Staircase which is a stone staircase that cascades down around the trees leading to a Y in the trail. Left is the bridge, and right is the ruins of a building that once stood erect. We detoured through the ruins in a circle. I explained to the folk that what once belonged to nature, was overthrown by infostructure, to then fall to its demise, allowing for nature to reclaim what was theirs once again, demonstrating the significance of natural order. Many of our folk, could feel the heaviness the ruins gave off in energy, and the drumming became louder and louder, and we carried on back to the bridge. Stepping across the bridge felt as if we had reached a checkpoint and we were moving on to the next level because the rays of Sunna decided to grace us finally as if we'd earned it.

Our fourth stop was at the Sycamore 3, or the Sycamore Norns, again a single base trunk that split into 3. This beauty surely was the width of at least 9 wide men, and taller than I could tell, but provided a lovely photo opportunity for folks to stand tall with or to seek wisdom from yet again. As we crossed cricks and stones and trekked on through the mud, we approached our final incline, passing the oath tree which holds secrets and oaths to the forest and to those who wished to do so.





At the top of the peak, was a large stone table, that formed a cliff. The men poured a libation to Wotan for strength and victory. The stone itself is truly special, as the underside of it has a natural hole, yet again providing another opportunity for oaths to be made.




The trail back down led us to a grove of trees in the center of the woods, where we held blot. Everyone was asked to place their phones in a basket to allow for a more

intentional and more connected experience with their folk and our gods. The basket was then placed outside of the circle. I lead blot for our group with the help of Mike Melillo as co-officiant, but several of the folk in attendance had a role within blot, helping encourage the awakening of victory and the divine within themselves. The Gods were absolutely with us, you not only could feel them, but signs revealed their presence. The offering bowl of mead was spilled into the soil of the groove by a force other than of folk, and then hail and rain came down upon us once again as words of wisdom were spoken louder and louder. We ended our blot by guldring Sowilo, offering up our weaknesses and manifesting through the vision of victory we wish to see for our folk. As we trekked back up the hill to our vehicles, we stopped one last time at two trees that faced each other. Each base was wide enough to crawl and hide within the trunk. The symbolism reminded me of being born from the tree as there were 2, Ash and Embla.



We retreated to my house for some hot food and further frith. I served Up Konigsberger Klopse (German Meatballs with cream sauce), Barley bacon kale and mushroom porridge, and salad. Another folk member also brought her famous and quite lovely bacon fat cookies. The final event of the evening was a house cleansing shared by sister folk. They helped lift the presence and energy within my home. Although there were struggles along the hike, we completed it together. I am proud of every single person who made it out and pushed themselves.





Runic Yoga Part 6 LAF



Last month we discussed an important part of the journey, the SIG and TYR Rune. This month I would like to slow it down a little and discuss One. As I had mentioned we have lives and have to live in this world also. Sometimes too short of a practice breeds little results and sometimes too long has a similar effect. We are all different and have to find what works for us so I can only give advice on what has worked for

Before we go any further though I would like to give a glimpse into a practice that I do to start out any Runic Yoga routine. I do nothing till this is done. Hopefully, it will put you in the right frame of mind as it does for me. As always, adjust to what works for you. This is a framework.

- 1. Stand in the IS rune position. Close your eyes and picture yourself out in space.
- 2. Now put your left hand on your solar plexus area. Now raise your right and carve yourself out of this place, turning clockwise. Your Ritual Hammer is good for this for obvious reasons.
- 3. Once done, say a few words like "I am protected from all that is contrary, none may enter this place" or something along those lines. Put your Hammer down at this juncture. Of course, a fist can be used too.
- 4. Now close your eyes and what you carved out is now the center of the universe, you are it, outside of space-time. Imagine a Black Sun or Universe now turning counterclockwise. While doing this you begin your breathing. At this point in your development, you should be able to sense very easily the above and below Vril stream. It will be very obvious.
- 5. Do this for a few breaths and then begin singing (eeeeeee). Change the sound from a high tone to a low. The key here is as doing it you are also letting the outer universe know (also the inner) that you are in control, the center of it All. Think of it as a vibration being sent out. Kind of like a warning of who is in charge. Do this a few times. Finished with 3 breaths or so by saying nothing just breath and energy movement.
- 6. You will now be ready to begin your work. To finish, say a few words like "My Axis is Straight, I control it All. As I grow, may I do good things for others and may I always fight this battle on two fronts with two swords" or something along those lines.

This is also a good time before beginning your Runic Yoga practice to do any accessory exercises. These are things like alternate nostril breathing, Rune pulls, or my personal favorite staring at the HAGAL Rune with a dot in the center. I have discussed this latter practice on MeWe and its benefits. I highly recommend it. It will reveal much. Lastly, I think it would be wise for anyone doing Armanen Rune Yoga to learn the Armanen Cosmic Tree. It is different from what we see in Asatru. I am not saying one is right or wrong but it will give a better understanding of where the energies are coming from and their characteristics.

Now let's talk about breaking up the exercises. The First 5, IS, KA, MAN, UR, and CROSS are extremely beneficial to keep together in one session. In a way you can

almost not count IS because you are doing it before any practice anyway. Almost all of this revolves in some way or another with it. It IS important as we know. NOT, EH, SIG, TYR, LAF would be the remainder. So in this context, you'll be doing the LAF rune exercise 14 times in a month or so. To do all of this with accessory exercises takes about an hour. Sometimes longer but what you receive is well worth the sacrifice. Next month with OS we'll break it into 3-day intervals but more on that later.

LAF RUNE

- 1. Face North and begin your IS rune stance breathing as always.
- 2. Raise your hands like the picture provided to form the LAF rune.
- 3. Now picture yourself pulling energy into your fingertips, up to your head, and then down all the way to your feet as you continue breathing. You may feel like a breeze running over you. Pay attention to it. Periodically sing (laaaaffff).
- 4. Do this for as long as you can. As mentioned in previous articles the longer the better.
- 5. Once complete, put your arms down. Notice how light you may feel. Think about the fact that you have a clear vision now, that everything you have been through in life, bad or good, wrong or right, has brought you here to where you find yourself. Lastly, you know how to use your emotions wisely. To sum up, gratitude and positive thoughts as we should already be doing in any Runic Yoga practice.

Now let's go over the transformational aspect here and a few other thoughts. LAF has much to do with Örlög. The top of the Well so to speak. The realm of form, the Astral world or body. What is thought.....happens just like that. There is no time or restriction. "Then" is the same as "Now" or "What should be" and vice versa. It gives us the vision to see clearly, to see it All. Hence "I can name the divine names of all the Gods and Elven kind I know as well as any". It is also the place of emotion and that is important here. LAF allows us to use our emotions positively. When we think back for a moment to the TYR rune and the Two selves now One, reborn in matter, a play if you will start to take place. Water, Emotion are linked to the Feminine but sometimes as we know emotion can be a hindrance to Her. She can lash out uncontrollably in ways where generally He won't. This is of course in no way putting down women. Trust that we Men admire that fire, that passion that you have. It is special and beautiful. A mystery that we all want to know. Nonetheless with the Two now together, reborn here the Hero puts it to good use. Whether anger or joy it's directed under his Will. It's channeled to create what he envisions whether in the mind or elsewhere. There is more to come though. In OS She will give. We'll see this play continue back and forth, side to side until we get to HAGAL.

I hope the above will give you a few keys along the way. I would like to close with one last important aspect of Armanen Rune Yoga. It has been said that Man is standing on his head. That is because his poles are reversed. What is up is actually down and what is down is actually up. The path to Hyperborea if you will is not North but South. With that in mind and if you followed along in doing these practices we started with IS, the Ich, the Will. Without that nothing else can take place. You will not master any other aspect of yourself or out if that isn't guiding you first. As we progressed through the Runes you may have noticed that what you feel in your body is affecting the upper regions and progressively working its way down with each new Rune. This is not all the time but you can see what is taking place. LAF is a perfect example. That comes from below and is more subtle. The Wheel is being turned back to the Origin. This is not the easiest concept to grasp but it was designed to work this way. It will make much more sense in next month's OS Rune description and especially in FA, the Root when the 2 Suns mix.

Your AFA Gothar

There are exactly 14 ordained Gothar in the Asatru Folk Assembly, including our Witan and Alsherjargothi. To become an ordained priest or priestess of the AFA, one must first serve the church as a Folkbuilder. This process includes an apprenticeship, and after a time, we are then oathed as full folkbuilders. Oathed folkbuilders can apply for our Clergy Training, and if accepted, they undergo academic study and for a period of time, we must show that we can apply what we learned in a functional and effective way. If accepted by the Alsherjargothi, Witan, and ordained Gothar, then we are ordained. This is a beautiful ceremony and is the highest honor to achieve and receive.

The Gothar has many functions, but what are those functions? And how can the average member take advantage of these functions?

First and foremost, the primary function of our priesthood is being spiritual leaders to the Folk. It is our job to be a bridge between our Folk and our Gods. That includes leading rituals, both Blot, and Sumbel. As Gothar, we provide spiritual advice and perform threshold ceremonies. These include baby naming, man or woman making, weddings, and funeral rites. This is not an exhaustive list by any means. We provide other important functions.

One such function is that we provide counseling to our membership. Whether it's dealing with personal loss, the passing of a family member or friend, marriage

counseling, or personal struggles, your Gothar are here to help. As a Folk, we are told to harden our chins and pull ourselves up by the bootstraps. This can be sound advice but it doesn't mean that we cannot reach out for help. Who better to ask than your Gothar? It's what we are here for. To guide the folk.

If you or someone close to you is struggling, be it an addiction, a divorce, the death of a loved one, or any of life's struggles, reach out to us! It can sometimes be difficult to reach out for help when we are struggling. Some may be embarrassed. Don't be. Lean on us for help, we are here for you.

Sima: Finnish May Day Brew



When the Finns celebrate May Day, they like to do so with a beverage that they call "Sima". It is a fermented drink that is consumed before all the sugar in it has been consumed by the yeast. Fresh, fruity flavor with a bit of sparkle to it!



Here is how you make it!
Ingredients:
Half a cup brown sugar (alternatively half brown and half white sugar)
Juice and grated zest of one lemon
5 raisins (these are important!)
0,03 oz yeast

Put the sugar into a large pot and add 3 cups and a quarter of water. Bring to boil, then remove from heat and leave to cool until room temperature.

Add the lemon juice and zest and raisins. Dissolve the yeast in a tablespoon of the liquid. Whisk it into the mixture.

Pour mixture into a sterilized container, cover, and leave at room temperature for 24 hours.

Stir the Sima, then decant into sterilized bottles, then seal them tightly. Leave them another 24 hours at room temperature. Here is where the raisins enter the picture. They will ferment in the drink as well, and as they fill up with CO2, they will float up to the

surface. This is when you know the Sima is ready! Refrigerate for 2 days before drinking. Burping them might be wise, as the gas inside will build up quickly!

Even though it might look like muddy water one could find in a ditch, it is actually pretty tasty. Trust me!

You get at least one other person, sit down with them, brew some (or a lot of) coffee, put out some pastries or cookies (or both), sit down, and enjoy each other's company. Simple is it not? The Ninth of every month is Odin World Prayer Day. Mark it!



Hexxennacht at Baldrshof



Flanked from behind, he is shot down by a sentry.


His final wail is heard throughout the wood, alerting all of his demise.

For my part, I was asked to give a talk, and, at the risk of this article going a little long, I am including the text thereof below:

Today I would like to review the 9 noble values and specifically focus on one of them. First, let's go through what the 9 noble values as interpreted by the AFA are:

- 1. Strength is better than weakness.
- 2. Courage is better than cowardice.
- 3. Joy is better than guilt.
- 4. Honor is better than dishonor.
- 5. Freedom is better than slavery.
- 6. Kinship is better than alienation.
- 7. Realism is better than dogmatism.
- 8. Vigor is better than lifelessness.
- 9. Ancestry is better than universalism.

The item for our discussion today will be #5, Freedom is better than Slavery.

If you ask anyone "Do you value freedom?", very few would answer in the negative. However, many of those same people are far from free. They have either embraced or are trapped in some level of restriction, or servitude. Many do not even realize the extent to which they are 'un-free'.

What is Freedom? Freedom means you are able to do and think what you want, within

the confines of responsibilities you have accepted of your own will. The acceptance of those responsibilities is similar to an oath, a sacred obligation once taken in Asatru morality. Those responsibilities do, indeed, impinge on our personal liberties, but, one must remember that we have taken them on willingly or due to actions we took willingly. Examples would include marriage, having children, or honoring a contract.

Opposed to freedom is slavery. A slave is not their own person. The parameters of what they do and think are defined by someone else. The choices we make, and the actions we take, can all add links to the chains that bind us.

The nature of our current social order can create circumstances that force us, sometimes against our own preference, into accepting obligations that we would not take on otherwise. The machinations of the societal elite have engineered economic conditions to force both parents in many families to participate in the workforce; wages are stagnant (attributable to policies that have increased the workforce, such as immigration and constant propaganda denigrating the role of homemaker and glamorizing women taking on jobs outside the home); debt from consumerism, fostered by the constant bombardment of the populace with advertising (both overt and subtle) is a great weapon the elite use to keep people indentured. These circumstances make it difficult, but not impossible, to maximize one's personal freedom.

Let's break down different types of freedom:

Personal Freedom

So many of us sacrifice our personal freedom for what really amounts to very little. A lot of this overlaps with Economic Freedom, especially in the consumerist paradigm that all Western societies embrace. But there is also the freedom we sacrifice for the sake of others. Do you ever worry about what others are thinking of you? Do you alter your words or activities in order to ensure their approval? These are not things a free person should fret over. I am not talking about behaving with a basic level of decorum and decency or treating others with the respect they deserve. What is referred to here is shaping one's actions or words based on the arbitrary standards defined by other individuals. Standards-based not on nature or Divine Law, but on the whims and perceptions of other people.

Be aware when you are being penned in by the expectations of others. Refuse to conform to them, unless there is a direct benefit to yourself that cannot be seized via other means.

Now, I want to reiterate here what I noted at the beginning of this talk – if your willing

actions or agreement to a situation obligate you to responsibilities that may curtail your freedom, these must be fulfilled. The best example of such a situation is children. If you father or give birth to a child, that child's care is your responsibility. You created them, whether you planned to or not, and you owe them. Would you be freer if you said "Screw it", and walked away? Yes. You would also be without honor – a niding.

Another way in which many people sacrifice their freedom is through addiction. Addiction takes many forms – substances (drugs, alcohol, food); 'stuff' – a compulsion to acquire things we want, but do not necessarily need; we can even be addicted to other people. Overcoming addictions of any kind can be difficult, and requires an exercise of the will. If you recognize addictive behavior in yourself and analyze it, you must come to an understanding that it diminishes your personal freedom and growth, and fight to overcome it.

Economic Freedom

The man does not know, the one who knows nothing,

Money makes monkeys of men.

Havamal, 75

This is the area where people most have their freedom encroached upon, and from which further encroachments on personal freedom originate. As alluded to above, the system is designed to economically chain us. New 'needs' are invented every day, and the herd scrambles to procure the latest gadget or product. The clever, manipulative advertising tells us that this or that product will make our life easier, more glamorous, and sexier. As the false needs accumulate, they offer us "credit", little magic cards, which allow people to purchase things they do not even have money for. The debt builds, strengthening the fetters that erode our personal freedom.

We use the money we do not have to buy things we do not need, and then must toil at jobs we do not love to pay our debt. The problem is pervasive, as it is planned to be. In 2020, the total consumer debt owed by the American people is \$3.9 trillion dollars. The average credit card balance for households is over \$9,000. This takes into account credit cards only. If we add other forms of debt – mortgages, car payments, student loans – then the average household owes over \$130,000. A nation of serfs and slaves.

The first step in freeing oneself from this deliberate and sinister trap is to recognize it for what it is. They – the people that own this society – want you in debt, and they have set things up to accomplish just that. They want good, subservient, and quietly desperate consumers. When you see advertisements, hear of some item you find appealing, then bear this in mind – they want me to want this so that I give them my wealth. The wealth (it may be small, or large) represents time and effort from your life.

Defy the temptations to buy what you do not need, pay those debts you may have, and incur no more. By doing this, you will be able, over time, to accumulate sufficient wealth to have greater economic, and, hence, personal, freedom. You will no longer be their monkey.

Spiritual Freedom

This is the most personal form of freedom, as it (or its absence) impacts the health of our very soul. If you accept a theology based on fear, that demeans you as intrinsically flawed, or prone to evil, from birth, you are a spiritual slave. You accept as a master a deity that despises you and is ever vigilant for violations of rules that will condemn you to eternal torment. Like an abusive husband or parent, that deity may proclaim his love for you, but yet the abuse, the debasement, continues. You are assimilating a thought system in which you have no value. The only value you may claim is that bestowed upon you by your abuser.

Our ancestral religion is free from such spiritual impoverishment. The Gods did not create us to be groveling, miserable skraelings. We are Their spiritual children, with Their divinity imbued within us. Created 'good' from birth, with emulation of the Gods, and working to fulfill Their Divine Will through our actions, as our purpose here in Midgard. Where negative theologies maintain a god only transcendent, apart, and judgmental, the European faith posits Gods both immanent (in Nature and ourselves) and transcendent – in that they own a higher level of consciousness.

Friedrich Nietzsche said, "The free man is a warrior." Gaining freedom, in the spiritual, personal, or economic sense, does require courage, will, and determination fit for a warrior. Think of your struggle to be free as a battle. You are, to steal a phrase, an 'Army of One' in the war for your own liberty.





The Gift Cycle



The most prominent moment in blot to our gods and goddesses is that of the gift cycle.

We take of ourselves the best and brightest that we have to give and put those gifts into the horn and offer it to our gods. In turn, we ask for the gifts and blessings of the Aesir to be bestowed upon us. This exchange is the most obvious and common version of the gift cycle that we all witness and experience.

Today, I'd like to touch on other "gifts" for our gods.

The gift cycle between your family and your gods is also important. Items such as incense, alcohol, baked goods, flowers, and other gifts dedicated to or created specifically for the gods can be placed on the family altar at the house. Buy or gather for Freya a bouquet of flowers, ask your child to draw Thor a picture, write a poem for Bragi, bake an item specifically for Frigga, dedicate a beautiful candle holder and candle for Baldr, leave an offering of mead for Odin.

During the Wayfarer Blot held at Baldrshof following the most recent work weekend, I reminded those present that the time they spent at their Hof, every drop of sweat shed, the money they spent to travel and stay the weekend, the tools and supplies that they donated were all gifts to Baldr. The work weekend was a sacrifice of time, money, skill, and physical strength. These gifts do not go unnoticed by the gods to which these beautiful Hofs have been dedicated!

If you can and are willing, contact your local Hof managers or Gothar and donate your time to the improvement of a Hof near you. Also, there are always items that are needed in the Hofs, ranging from tools to paper supplies, food for events, or gifts for the gods themselves.

Hoftollar and donations to your church are a way to enter into the gift cycle with the gods. You are helping, through these donations, to support and maintain the Hofs dedicated in their names and also to help the Folk in need who worship them.

All of these things are appreciated, and the generosity of the Folk has been amazing. Thank you to everyone who supports the Asatru Folk Assembly!






Oklahoma

Spring Cleaning - Fridr Folk Kindred






The creekside really needed a clean up as you can see from the huge garbage bag of trash we collected. Really proud to be making such a positive impact in our community!
