Asatru is Our Birthright

"Asatru is the religion with homework"

"You have to earn your hammer"

"The Gods call who they will"

These are all misleading.

It is of course good to study history, lore, runes, language, and all the other thing that help to inform our faith.

It is of course good to act in a way that is noble, brave, kind, and righteous.

It is of course up to the Gods to do as they will, and we can't presume to understand the motive.

However, none of these are the defining characteristics of our faith and religion...

Asatru means "Belief in the Gods" or more literally "Troth to the Aesir", a holy faith in the Aesir. This is faith not only in the sense of "belief" but also in the sense of "trust" or "loyalty". "I have faith in you" means more than "I believe you exist", it means "I believe you will do right" and "I believe you will succeed".

Our ancestors are our direct, physical link to the Aesir. The Aesir are the most ancient blood ancestors of our Folk. We are that same link for our descendants and all their progeny.

The Aesir created the world and gave us life, wit, and vigor. Every Blot we make to the Aesir is a return on this gift, made from the world created for us by the Aesir. Our faith is to continue this gift cycle perpetually. We should always be mindful that the Aesir started the gift cycle and our ancestors -Asatru and otherwise- maintained this gift cycle through the successful lives they led. Our existence is proof of this success. Our children's prosperity and faith are proof of our success.

So do your homework. Prove you are honorable. Listen to the call of the Gods. But always remember that Asatru is the birthright of every single one of our Folk, even if they need to be reminded. Bring them home.

Folk Futhark

The Solf Suthark IN PRRY P: X + I + L C + H: TBMMP & M & E

Introducing Witan Svan Herul's recent creation, the Folk Futhark!

This is THE rune set of the Asatru Folk Assembly and our Hofs! If you've seen any of Witan Svan's murals, you may have noticed that he uses runes from all four of the main futharks: Elder, Younger, English, & Armanen. The purpose of this, and of the Folk Futhark in general, was to create a living tradition of runes for our modern Folk.

We are no longer Proto-Germanic, nor Vikings, nor Saxons of the Heptarchy, and we are certainly not all Armanen... We are modern Aryans, with our roots spreading across all of Europa, and we are building a modern tradition of Asatru and rune work. This Futhark holds the same concepts and mysteries of the Elder Futhark runes, but some of the staves themselves are borrowed from the other three rune rows.

With all this being said, I will start writing short lessons on each of the Folk runes, and explaining why Witan Svan chose different staves, if applicable. We will study a few runes a month, starting after Ostara!



Now that we talked about the Folk Futhark and what it means for the AFA and modern Asatru, I'd like to start a rudimentary rune study, beginning with the first three runes.

FEHU- This is the first rune of every main futhark, and often symbolizes cattle or wealth, as cattle WAS wealth for our ancestors. Going beyond that, Fehu can be read as a rune of opportunity and potential. Some have equated it to the potential energy that existed before the Big Bang! This fits well with the idea that the Futhark, when studied in order, tell the story of the Cosmos from the beginning to the rising of Gimle out of the waters.

While the concept and name are the same as the Elder Futhark, the stave has been replaced with the Armanen rune known as FA, which is described as "the primal fire".



URUZ- This is always the second rune of any given rune row. It's also one of the runes that means the same thing in both Elder and Armanen rows, although with added connotations in the Armanen.

As Fehu is potential power, or wealth in cattle, or opportunity waiting to happen, Uruz is the logical next step in the greater story told by the Futhark. Uruz is raw, primordial power, it is the aurochs of our ancestors' days. If Fehu is your potential energy, Uruz is having your fists up. Fehu is energy waiting to be used, Uruz is energy READY to be used. Uruz is having a round in the chamber. Uruz is being centered and grounded and ready to defend or attack.



THURISAZ- The third rune of most rune rows, it is the next step after Uruz.

Where Uruz is having your fists up, or your weapon loaded, Thurisaz is throwing the punch or firing the first round. The point in the middle of the rune represents the APPLICATION of the potential energy represented in the previous two runes.

Thurisaz also represents Þórr, the Warrior Prince of Heaven and Earth. Think of the top of the symbol as Heaven/Asgard, the bottom as Earth/Midgard, and the middle point as Thunor charging forward to unleash the might of Mjolnir on anything that seeks to harm the worlds of Gods and Men.

Keep a look out in the AFA parenting group for announcements about conference calls for volunteers.



Day of Remembrance

Alexander Rud Mills



Alexander Rud Mills was born in Forth, Tasmania, and lived from 1885-1964. He was the guiding light for the foundations of Asatru in Australia.

In 1933 Rud Mills began writing books about our faith and in 1936 he founded the Anglecyn Church of Odin. Mills was able to build a solid Asatru community, but during the turbulent times of the Second World war, Rud Mills was bitterly persecuted by his government, and the community that he built was suppressed. With no evidence against him of illegal activity, Alexander Rud Mills was imprisoned. It was nearly a decade before Mills was released and despite all of his efforts, he was unable to revive

his church to its former glory.

All was not lost, however. Alexander Rud Mills's many publications and his passion lived on and inspired a new generation. In the 1970s a group of Odinist Students at the University of Melbourne campaigned to have Odinism recognized as a formal religion in Australia, hoping to be able to protect the faith from the same persecution that Mills suffered. It took almost two decades, but by the early '90s, Odinism was granted religious status in Australia. Alexander Rud Mills's vision also, notably, inspired Else Christensen, who was a leading voice of Asatru in North America.

So, what can we learn from this story?

Alexander Rud Mills didn't live to see the culmination of all of his hard work. When he died Odinism and Asatru were still a repressed faith in his homeland. Even without reward and recognition, he worked until his death, to try and revive the ancient folkway. And he did succeed. Could he have ever imagined how far-reaching his influence would be while he lived? Despite being imprisoned and persecuted for his beliefs, Alexander continued. Even without knowing that his hard work would bear fruit, he continued. He didn't give up in the face of a thankless, and dauntless task. He didn't let his ego or his own self-importance stop him from doing what he believed he needed to do. There were no rewards. There were no praises. There was nothing in it for him except the knowledge and the belief that he was doing the right thing for his folk.

Take from this story the need to remember that the bigger picture, even when we can't see it, is so much more important than just ourselves. We do what we are doing for our children and for their children so that when we are gone they have a foundation strong enough to hold them up and help them build better and stronger.

Sigurblot



Sigurblót literally means 'Victory Blot' and was celebrated by our ancestors in the early summer months. On the one hand, our ancestors were celebrating their victory over the harsh winter. Life had won. On the other hand, our ancestors performed blot to ask for victory. With the warm weather and the completion of the planting time the men often

turned their minds to the duty of man. War. Practically speaking, summer was the better time to organize new campaigns and set sail.

In our modern times, the vast majority of us are not familiar with war in a personal way. We do, however, all have our struggles. Sigurblót is a time to refocus. It is the time we can use to reorganize our priorities, figure out the steps we need to take in order to reach our ultimate goals, and break free from those that we struggle with.

One great way to celebrate Sigurblót is to offer a meal or some other item you spent time making thanks for the victory of life. Another option is to sacrifice a bladed weapon to the fire. A nice knife, for example, the blade dulled in battle so that it cannot be used against you (this is symbolic, of course), offered to the fire is a great way to ask our Gods for victory during the coming winter.

Ancestral Food and Culture

Callahan Colcannon



Colcannon is a traditional Irish dish of mashed potatoes and cabbage. Each family has its own recipe that is usually passed from one generation to another.

The Callahan family saves colcannon for special holidays or events and is served at

funerals, Winternights, and Yule.

Ingredients

- *2 pounds of russet potatoes, peeled and chopped for boiling
- *2 leeks, washed and chopped (white and light green parts only)
- *1/2 head of cabbage
- *1 stick of butter
- *1 cup heavy cream
- *1 garlic clove, minced
- *3 strips of bacon
- *Green onions for garnish

Instructions:


- *Boil potatoes until tender, about 15-20 min. Drain well and return to pot.
- *Fry bacon and drain, save the drippings. Crumble bacon into small pieces.
- *Using the bacon drippings, add cabbage to the pan. Cook on medium-high heat until cabbage just starts to brown, about 7-9 min.
- *Add leeks to the cabbage and cook until leeks seem tender, about 5 min
- *Add garlic and cook about 1 minute more and remove from heat.
- *Mix potatoes, butter, and heavy cream. Whip with a mixer until creamy. Slowly add more cream if needed for a creamier consistency.
- *Fold bacon and cooked vegetables to potatoes.
- *Garnish with green onion
- *Salt and pepper to taste
- *Garnish with green onions
- *Serve warm

Midsummer at Odinshof



You'll be hearing lots of the details about Midsummer 2022 from our Folkbuilders in this Runestone newsletter. All agreed that it was one of our best to date. The weather was balmy, but not hot – and even gave us a rain shower on Saturday. The following summary gives you an idea of what was happening:



This year's Viking Games were planned by Mason Johnson, Folkbuilder from Washington. Individual participants - men, women, and children, could participate in the obstacle course that included archery, boulder carrying, and ax blows at foes, represented by standing logs. Short videos of this mayhem have been posted on social media.



Other event features included fire dancing by Krystal Podbreger and Jay Le'Vie. Auctioneer Connor Norris had us bidding on over 80 items (!) which brought in proceeds essential to Odinshof's upkeep. Zach and Alyce Gable, volunteer firefighters from the scorched hills of Berry Creek, gave us a deep look at CPR as a life-saving technique. Live music was provided by Paul Stevens on guitar and by Tanner Thayer, who played "oldies" on our hof-piano.

Each AFA Hof honors a historic person who contributed to the revival of the old religion. For us, our esteemed personage is Meister Guido Von List (1848 – 1919), from Austria. Following a presentation by Connor Norris about his life, a shrine dedicated to Von List was hung on the wall next to the Odin mural.



Our Alsherjargothi's Odin Blot on Friday night was intense, proven by the blue energy that followed him around the fire, as captured by multiple cameras. Gothi Daniel Young from South Carolina led us in the Midsummer Blot to Baldr, in which a beribboned sun wheel infused with personal intentions was set ablaze. Gothi Young shared the importance of Baldr's role, his death, and rebirth in the family of the Aesir, even as the Sun itself was reaching its fullness and preparing for the long journey into winter.

The Wayfarer's Blot led by Gythia Sheila McNallen, with husband Stephen, reminded us to use "right action" as we galdrd Raido. Then came the blessing of individual mjollnirs before leaving Odinshof for the trip home.



Unique to this Midsummer event was a panel discussion featuring five of our Folkbuilders. The general topic was applying Asatru principles in our lives, with examples of successes and challenges. Participants were Folkbuilders Sierra Chapman, Heather Young, Rachel Johnson, Mason Johnson, and Sam Ramsey.



You've all seen the magnificent Odin mural inside our hall, painted with great passion by Witan Svan Herul last October. To make sure that all clearly understand this is Odin's-hof, a sacred center for our Folk, a dais and altar to Odin are now installed below the mural. Our first ceremonies of the Folk took place on Saturday. This included honoring Sam Ramsey of Arizona, who took his official Folkbuilder oath. There was also a baby-naming - in fact, two baby-namings - for the twin sons of Krystal Flatley. Matt Flavel brought forth a strong spirit as he spoke Nornir words to each of those wee

boys.

Introduction

I joined the Asatru Folk Assembly at the end of a long journey of self-discovery, and at the beginning of my adventure out into the real world. As I read more, I felt myself being physically touched by an unexplainable force, and a burden was lifted. I immediately felt lighter, as if a condition I didn't know I had was healed. Despite all my belief in using empirical evidence to find truth and avoiding supernatural or theological explanations for the world, I found myself having a religious and spiritual experience. From that day, I resolved to learn more about our Gods, but I also had to learn about myself. I learned about the existence of the AFA back then in 2008 and was highly impressed by what I saw from them but didn't yet possess the sufficient willpower to join.

The Importance of Our Sacred Texts: Introduction to Hávamál Study



Our ancestral religion is first and foremost one of practice. We are the doers. Members of the Asatru Folk Assembly perform the rites as is our duty to honor and commune with our Gods, Goddesses, and ancestors, in the manner that has been passed down to us over millennia. While other religions place a great emphasis on their scriptural tradition, even to the point of relying upon it solely for spiritual authority, Asatru does not. In fact, historically speaking, our textual sources come comparatively late in the timeline of our religion, as traditionally our lore was passed down orally by poets and holy men, rather than through old tomes and their scribes. This however does not mean that there is no place for our sacred texts.

First though, a disclaimer: I am not a Góði and I will not presume to speak with the authority of one. I rely first and foremost on our Goðar for spiritual authority, and I suggest my readers do the same. All I can share is my opinion on how this particular practice has deepened my experience with our religion.

Before the advent of the Asatru Folk Assembly and our clergy, a common phrase one might hear when first investigating Asatru is that it is "a religion with homework", referring to the fact that absent a priesthood of Goðar to come to for spiritual education, the modern Asatruar was lost in the proverbial weeds on how to live as an Asatruar, with a multitude of books one could read on the subject of "Germanic paganism" but little direction to go off of. The vast majority of literature on the topic of Asatru that one might commonly find on store shelves can be described as introductory books, with very few that I would personally consider to be spiritually enriching. While there may be no shortage of purported commentaries on our ancestral religion, there are scant few

primary sources: texts that are considered a sort of starting point for all information on what our ancestors actually knew of our lore and how to live their lives.

Chief among our spiritual literature is of course the Poetic Edda or "Elder" Edda, which will be the text primarily addressed in this piece, with one important poem in particular. The Poetic Edda can be considered the gold standard of our lore, and contrary to popular belief, there is no scholarly evidence that the Poetic Edda was corrupted by Christian writers, or even composed post-Christianization. By all accounts, the Poetic Edda is of wholly Asatru provenance. This misconception stems from confusing the Poetic Edda with the Prose Edda, which of course was written by Snorri Sturluson after the Christianization of Iceland. That is not to say that Snorri's "Younger" Edda is to be considered unreliable, just that the Elder Edda can be regarded as the most reliable. One might reflexively compare the Poetic Edda to the Christian Bible, but this is not really an accurate comparison. If anything, the Poetic Edda is perhaps more akin to the work of the ancient poet Hesiod, who records the origins of the Greek Gods in his epic poem the Theogony.

Of the Poetic Edda, there is one poem in particular that I wish to highlight, as it will be the subject of my monthly articles going forward, that being the Hávamál or Words of the High One. The "High One" in question is of course Óðinn, the one-eyed King of the Aesir, knower of all wisdom and Drighten of warriors. I need not introduce the God Óðinn to my audience, but the context of how Óðinn relates to the Hávamál is important, as these are His own words, imparting to us His people, the Folk, the knowledge and wisdom that He has acquired through His wandering of the world under the guise. As such, the Hávamál can be considered incredibly important to the practice of our faith and daily life as Asatruar, invaluable even. That the words of the Highest of the Gods can be at our fingertips is quite extraordinary.

The Hávamál consists of 166 verses of what can be described as proverbs: advice and wisdom that can help one to live a good and hopefully long, healthy life. In it are glimpses of Óðinn's adventures, but it is mostly focused on best practices for living well. There are however deeper, esoteric levels of understanding to the poetic verses which require meditation, and that is where my practical recommendation comes in.


Part of my own religious practice has been to actively study a verse of the Hávamál every morning upon waking. There are numerous translations of the Poetic Edda and it should be the one book every Asatruar has in his or her library. I recommend keeping a journal of your thoughts on each verse, and upon successive readings, you may discover that your understanding of a given verse will deepen. This can be part of a spiritual practice that vivifies your connection to our ancestral religion in a new way,

and over time it can develop your relationship to the divine, helping to guide your actions in Midgard.

Starting the 9th of July 2022, I will be hosting monthly Hávamál studies in my local area, and I invite others to join in study at home as well. I encourage everyone to read and take notes on each verse, and if you have any thoughts, please feel free to share them with me via email. I will be publishing my notes in the Runestone every month, so I hope you will look forward to that.

Through the study of the Hávamál and the lessons therein, one can work to live a life that can be said to be "True to the Gods", or in other words, Asatru!


Builder Heather Young from the Carolinas.

Some call it a temple; others a church; but for all, it's always a hof to one of our Gods. This past month, the Asatru Folk Assembly acquired its fourth temple, Njordshof in White Springs, Florida. This last one was built as a church, but in contrast to the classic steepled structures in North Carolina and Minnesota, it has simple, twentieth-century lines. Regardless of how they look, they are all holy sites dedicated to our Gods. This is where our folk gather, but also where they will build the continuity as descendants of our Gods and Ancestors – with purpose, love, and unity that will carry us into the 22nd century.

There is one other hof, though. It was a dance hall, a karate studio, a youth center, and a Christian school. Mostly, it was known for being the old Grange Hall. But all that was in the cosmic wyrd that would bring us to this point today.



We had been celebrating the 20th anniversary of the AFA, complete with cake and champagne with eighty or so members. Steve's book, "Asatru – A Native European Spirituality" was unveiled for the first time. But there was a residual sense of power and promise as we packed up our belongings. Stephen McNallen, our Alsherjargothi at the time, had inducted us into a new year of "transformation."

New things were already manifesting. The week before, Gothi Thorgrun Odden, met with a realtor about a building site for a hof. She was curious about our plans, so he described our goals and the fact that our organization was growing and needed a "place of our own." She had a place in mind and made sure that it could be accessed on our way home from Midsummer. The same day as our Wayfarer's Blot, three cars pulled into the gravel parking lot of the old Grange Hall. That moment changed everything.

The dark red building with white trim and paned windows called to us. It felt like a sanctuary when we went inside. Cool, despite the warm June day. Quiet, still, waiting...

It offered more than we could ever imagine. A 40x60 foot hall, a commercial kitchen with a gas range, and all the pots, pans, and bowls we could ever use. Two restrooms and an office area for books, computers, desks,s and all that could make this place function as the center for the AFA.



And then we went out the back door. Pine trees shaded a half-circle of massive picnic tables. But Steve's attention went to a rock, standing four feet high and situated between two stately pine trees. It would have been "natural" in Ireland as it clearly gave the appearance of a stall ready for ritual use.

In only thirty minutes, we came to the conclusion that this place was "meant to be." We were smack-dab in an unincorporated hillbilly community called Brownsville, a town we'd never heard of. Strangely, we knew this all had been laid out for us. It was time for us to make the next move. Raido was called and commitment made. In the dappled late afternoon sunlight, we stood around that rock. A drinking horn was slowly filled with mead and passed one by one, so each of us could pledge this as "the first hof of the AFA."



As much as we enjoy our monthly gatherings at Odinshof, it's beneficial to meet more often. Our first such gathering in a very long time was at a popular park in Nevada County. We chose a Friday evening for this casual, laid-back picnic dinner. All agreed to continue planning these. Stay tuned for announcements of these local meetups in the Gold Country.

MidSummer at Odinshof, the NordVestri Kindred put on the Viking games for adults and children.


