

### THE MAYPOLE DANCE

May Day celebrations are not complete without a May Pole! The May Pole itself is a fertility symbol, with the pole representing a strong masculine energy. The feminine is

represented by the beautiful flora decorated crown and the ribbons that wrapped around the pole during the maypole dance.

Following Freyrblot, ask the women to attach the ribbons to the top of the pole and then the menfolk to carry the Maypole "plant" it in a sturdy place already arranged. Divide the group into two groups, those who will dance clockwise and those who will dance counterclockwise. Distribute them along the ribbons evenly. As the group dances, they should go "over" or "under" the person dancing in the opposite direction. The Maypole dance is best done with a good Polka! Once reaching the ends of the ribbons, secure the ends to the pole.

Baldrshof tradition is that those women seeking fertility, asnip a piece of the ribbon ends and take them home with them.


### Words From Our Gothar

"Warrior Faith" in the Modern Age



Asatru is often called a "warrior faith", and there is some truth to this. Our male ancestors often fought with sword, shield, axe, and spear to protect the things that mattered to them, and that still matter to us. They were almost all required to have some sort of martial bearing, and to be able to stare conflict in the eye without taking a single step backward.

We, those warriors' descendants, live in a time where comfort is king for many people, in the deepest and scariest sense of that phrase. Martial prowess is no longer expected from us, or seen as necessary. There are not currently any physical battles to fight; no need to smash through a shield wall, no need to plant some archers in that tree line over there, etc... However, as humans, we have a physical need to exercise that aggression. And as Aryan humans, we have a need to exercise that aggression in a HEALTHY way.



The best options for this are weightlifting, and combat sports. We will never feel the rush of smashing a war axe through someone's shield, but you CAN feel the raw power of lifting iron off of your chest, or from blocking another man's left hook.

This is a call: if you want to call yourself a warrior, get in the gym. Put on the boxing gloves, or the ace bandages around your joints, and get to work. Face that fight. Make yourself solid in a world of mush.

The Soul Complex, a summary



It's an age-old question. It's taken up many pages in many books, it's been pondered by philosophers, social commentators, and religious leaders for centuries. "What is the soul?" Many cultures across this planet have differing viewpoints on this topic. Recently we had a Gothar meeting on the subject. By the time you read this, Alsherjargothi Flavel and Witan Herul will have had a discussion on Victory Never

Sleeps about the Soul and its many parts.

Webster's Dictionary defines it as such,

- : the immaterial essence, animating principle, or actuating cause of an individual life
- : the spiritual principle embodied in human beings, all rational and spiritual beings, or the universe
- : a person's total self
- : an active or essential part
- : a moving spirit
- : the moral and emotional nature of human beings
- : the quality that arouses emotion and sentiment.
- : spiritual or moral force
- : FERVOR

That's the definition, but what do we, as Asatruar define as the soul?

Simply, it's what animates you, makes you unique, it's what makes you...you. It's what makes you human, it's what separates us from animals.

We, in the Asatru Folk Assembly believe that the soul, is broken down into parts. Here in this edition of The Runestone, we will explore the different parts of the Soul Complex, and how each part of the Soul makes us who we are. This will not be exhaustive, but a summary, pulling from *Asatru, A Native Spirituality*, by Founder Stephen McNallen, and *Runelore*, by Edred Thorsson. Over the coming months, we will break down each component of the soul, pulling from different sources. If we were to try to compile all we know here, this will turn into a book. Rather than do that, we'll spread it out over the coming months.

Now that we have defined what the soul is, let's break down the soul, as it is seen in Asatru, in a summarized list.

- 1. Lík, The physical body.
- 2. Ek, the ego.
- 3. Hugr, the logical mind.
- 4. Minní, memory.
- 5. Önd, Vital Breath.
- 6. Hamr, The Projected Self.
- 7. Sál, The Shade Self, that which is hidden.
- 8. Hamingja, The Luck or Personal Spiritual Might.
- 9. Fylgja, or the Fetch, The Primal Essence
- 10. Óðr, or Wode, the Ecstatic State, the combination of Hamr and Sál.

In the coming months, we will do a deeper dive into each component, beginning with the Lik. We will explore exercises for each component, and how to use each for your spiritual journey.


Each component makes up the whole, and we will also explore how each part interplays with some or all of the others.







# Day of Remembrance

### Else Christensen



Originally born in Denmark, Else Christensen (nee Ochsner) was one of the leading figures in the modern Asastu movement. As a young woman, she left her hometown of Esbjerg in favor of Copenhagen. It was during her time in Copenhagen that Else awoke to the ideas of National Socialism in the midst of right-wing and left-wing radical struggles. She met and married Aage Alex Christensen, and together they were members of the Danish Workers Party.

Both she and her husband were imprisoned after the German invasion of Denmark in 1940 for their involvement with elements of the National Workers Party. After their release from prison Else and her husband emigrated to Canada, via England.

Even from Canada, Else continued to nurture her desire to find a place for her own people. It was during this time, while she was reaching out to far-right activists across North America that she first discovered Odinism in a pamphlet titled Call of Our Ancient Nordic Religion, by Alexander Rud Mills. This was the beginning of Else's dedication to the revival of the worship of the Norse Gods. Her understanding of our relationship with the Gods was heavily influenced by the idea that the Gods were encoded in the collective unconscious of the Aryan race.

In 1969 Else Christensen founded the Odinist Fellowship. Until her death in 2005, Else worked tirelessly for her folk, spreading the word of our faith and our Gods to all who would listen. She founded a prison outreach program that proved to be instrumental to

many men. She wrote and published many publications. Her efforts saw her recognized as the Folk- Mother to Asatruar everywhere.

So, what can we learn from this story?

We don't always know where our stories end. We can't always see the ramifications of our thoughts when put into action. Else was just one single woman. She was a woman who believed in unpopular ideas in a time when those ideas were definitively unpopular. Despite being imprisoned for those beliefs she did not give up.

Our current times are, in many ways, similar to the ones that Else dealt with. They are turbulent and wrought with anger on all sides. We stand at the precipice of a new world, but we have no way of knowing which way the tides will turn. Else didn't turn and run. She stood and faced the future. In doing so she became one of the most important women in the Asatru movement to date.

When things are hard, when public opinion would have you conform, just remember. Your story hasn't reached its end yet, and only you can control the direction the story takes.

Stand strong.

Stand with Else.

Women decorated their windows and doors with flowers and wove them into their hair.

We have survived the harsh months when stagnation is so easy a thing to fall into. When the celebration is done, the real hard work begins. The plan that was set into motion at Charming of the Plow will now begin the active stage. Those seeds that you planted, or that project that you planned at Ostara, will now need real tending to. Mayday marks the beginning. It marks the start of growth.

We can't wait to see you around the campfire! Don't wait!



Freyr's Harvest Feast in Montana | September 22nd-24th



Freyr's Harvest Feast is the time to honor the Gods after a productive year's Harvest. On September 22nd through the 24th, we gather together for a weekend filled with activities that honor the three Vanir deities Njord, Freyr, and Freya.

During the course of the weekend, the folk gathers together for three blots using mead donated by Heinlein's Hollow Meadery.

In addition to blot, we see the display of Freyr's Proposal on stage (stage under construction), the viking games tournament with a prize to be revealed at the feast as well as access to the Drengr Dinner where all previous years' champions are invited out the day before the event.

In addition to brawn, the brain is tested in our Hnefatafl competition. While this competition is less fierce the bragging rights are still pretty good. Guests can also test their luck at a game of Orlog.

While there are plenty of contests, we still have plenty of time for several workshops, and speeches by guest speakers. Craftsmen will also bring their wares out to sell and authors to sign their books. An AFA benefiting auction will provide ample opportunities to walk away with a bag full of spoils.

The whole event is hosted on a private 20-acre ranch in a very low-population area. It's on the river and away from prying eyes. So not only do you get to enjoy a full event you can take in the beauty of rural Montana, enjoy the river and see what an AFA homestead looks like. An optional tour and sumbel will be held in the early morning for those wanting to see inside a proper meadery.

Lodging is straightforward as well. Bring an RV or tent and camp under the beautiful stars. Trust us when we say there's more of them visible than wherever you're coming from and on lucky nights the Northern Lights can be seen.

For those who want less rustic accommodations, there are numerous hotels and motels within a reasonable driving distance. In a few more years we will have cabins available too!

So that's lodging but everyone's got to eat right? Well, we got you covered as well. The meals are all plentiful and delicious, none more so than the feast itself. Last year we filled the dining hall with food and refreshments and this year we aim to provide just as much good fare. Five to ten gallons of mead will be provided for the feast according to turnout and the couples dance that follows is always great fun.

Remember to dress your best at the feast and dance but it won't all be formal. For the first blot, we go into the water to honor Njord. Ladies especially, make sure that you wear clothes that you're not only comfortable getting wet but are also modest when wet.

While the prospect of getting into the water in September might be daunting to some, the month has a wonderful climate. It has a high of 70 and a low of 50 with a nice midday breeze.

The truth is unless you come out you won't know what you're missing so don't make that mistake and come out to Freyr's Harvest Feast.



# Cooking for our Folk



Cooking from the Heart. One of the first chefs I worked for told me that there are two main rules to cooking.

- 1. ALWAYS cook from the heart!
- 2. You must know the why of the rule before you can think about breaking it.

To this day, I still believe that number one is the most important; but two is the most valuable lesson. So, for example: why would you add flour to the mix when are you making Fried Potato balls? It doesn't add anything to the dish overall and in fact, it takes away flavor and disrupts texture. The reason is that what flour takes away: is moisture. It adds to the binder and liquid consumption.

So, what does this mean for the folk? Plan and simply don't take shortcuts. Whenever I pick up the knife and began cooking for the folk, I think of it as channeling the ancestors. Cooking reminds me of that age-old musing "I don't measure seasoning; I wait for the tap on the shoulder from the ancestors to tell me that's enough."

When you cook from the heart, people can tell. Don't cook out of spite or obligation. Cook for the folk because you want to! Find new recipes. Test them. Make them better. And when your heart tells you it is right...time to serve. If you have never made

cookies from scratch...make them. Why not? Use the best ingredients you can afford (don't take out a second mortgage for this) but be proud to feed the folk.

# **Ancestral Food and Culture**

Good Mornings Start with Fresh Bagels and Coffee



In America we may associate bagels with New York City, but they have a long and storied Aryan past. They are believed to have originally been invented in German monasteries during the Middle Ages, much like their cousins the pretzel. They were brought from Germany into Poland by peasant farm workers. They have become a staple food in the country going by the name obwarzanek and are found in most Central European countries. In America today, bagels are found everywhere in grocery stores, cafes, and drive thrus, but for me, nothing beats homemade. They're simple and once you get a knack for it, they're very easy to make.

#### For the dough:

1 and 1/2 C warm water

4 tsp yeast

4 C flour

1 Tbsp honey

2 tsp salt

### Eggwash:

1 egg, beaten

2 Tbsp water

For Boiling:

2 Quarts water

1/4 Cup honey

Any bagel seasoning you might like on top (everything, onion/garlic salt, coarse sea salt, sesame seeds)

Add yeast, warm water and honey to a mixing bowl or stand mixer, allow yeast time to activate and foam (5-7 minutes)

Mix in flour and salt, forming stiff, dry dough

Knead for 5-7 minutes or until smooth and stiff

Allow the dough to rest in a clean, covered dish for an hour or until doubled in size

Preheat oven to 425°F

Line two baking sheets with parchment paper

Put the water and honey for boiling on the stove at medium heat allowing it to warm as you shape the bagels

Divide dough into 8 equal sized parts and form each into a ball

To form the bagel shape, slightly flatten each ball and poke your finger through the center of it. Gently stretch from both sides until the hole in the center reaches around 2 inches.

Allow each bagel a few minutes to rest before boiling

When the water reaches boiling, place two bagels at a time in and allow them to boil 2-3 minutes. They should float when they're done.

Set each bagel on the parchment as it's removed from the water to give them time to cool off.

Once your bagels have had time to cool, gently dip the top side only in the egg wash then dust with seasoning.

Bake 20-25 minutes, until golden brown.

It's important to give your bagels a bit to rest out of the oven to allow them to become chewy and delicious. I usually let them sit for 15-20 minutes before cutting into one.

Serve with butter, cream cheese, jam, as a breakfast sandwich or with soup. They're delicious however you choose to enjoy.

### Ingredients

- 2 English Cucumbers
- ½ C sour cream
- 1 Tbsp white vinegar

- 1 tsp sugar
- 1 Tbsp fresh dill chopped
- ½ tsp salt
- black pepper to taste


#### Instructions

- 1. Peel the cucumbers if desired and thinly slice them with a mandolin slicer. The thinner the better! Put them in a large salad bowl.
- 2. In a medium bowl, whisk together sour cream, vinegar, sugar, and dill. Salt and pepper to taste.
- 3. Pour dressing over cucumber slices and toss until combined.
- 4. Cover and refrigerate at least 4 hours or overnight.
- 5. Serve with a slotted spoon.

## **Food Pantry at Odinshof**

Even with limited, and somewhat odd offerings due to current shortages, families went home with two full bags plus eggs and ground-turkey. During the summer months, we should be able to expand with homegrown produce from the community. That is our goal.

All of our volunteers revel in the work and have built such efficiency that they're already loading cars while I take down the information. This is also becoming multigenerational with our young children assisting their parents as we build new traditions at each hof. Hail the doers!

#### Hexennacht at Odinshof




The day was surprisingly clear, which drew us outdoors for lunch and other activities. In setting up the hall, we used black chair covers with matching tablecloths, to better connect with the mysterious side of Lady Freyja. Our Alsherjargothi arrived on time to lead us in Greeting to the Gods which was followed by our traditional acknowledgement of hallowing Óðinn in his hall. Following our personal greetings to the One-Eyed One, people settled into the chairs to hear about AFA news. Matt proudly described the development of Sigrheim as our future headquarters, with our first resident preparing the site for her home. I read this lady's message to me where she described her joy in finding her way back to the AFA after an eight-year hiatus. She was at a point of tying up loose ends and starting anew. Synchronicity brought her back with the ability to forge ahead and help build the future of the AFA.

I began my Hexennacht presentation on seiðr-workers and seeresses in our lore, to include the young volva in Greenland who shared knowledge of women's magic with a Christianized community. My tale was interrupted though, when we did our farewells to the Maurer family who made this one last trip to the Hof before leaving for Montana the next day.



By the outdoor fire circle, a crowd gathered to watch the ancient technique of kindling a need-fire by using a small bow to generate heat from friction. Our ancestors certainly had patience and skills to be able to master that. It was a learning experience that will require more practice, for sure.



One of the unique Hexennacht activities was the making of "Nine Herb bundles" taught by Folkbuilder Ashley Stockton. After wrapping these small stems with raffia and setting them aside for later, the women gathered around the large table to share their thoughts and build bonds with their sisters. Like last month, all agreed completion of this small act adds much to the well-being of our Óðinshof Folk.



Folkbuilder Sierra Chapman had been multi-tasking in the kitchen all day. After a fabulous dinner, the donation jar was passed around and filled with generous contributions. (Thank you, dear Folk!)



Now for the Hexennacht ritual, a Blót to Freya that I had the honor leading. At this time of year, the veil is again thin as it is at Winter Nights. Rather than the inward look in October, it was time for the outward push of our effort and Will. We called on the Gods, the Ancestors and the Landvættr. We offered our love and loyalty to Freya and the Disir, our Mothers-past. Fresh flowers were placed in the fire to the music of tinkling bells. Gifts from our holy Vanadís were received in spring water, sprinkled on the Folk and the wooden runes that each person would take. At the close of the blot, Ashley came forth with a homemade broom from thick branches of pine. The bundles of magical herbs were tossed into the fire. Upon leaving the circle, each person was swept with a gust of sacred smoke for purification and protection, in the ways of our Ancestors blessing farm animals returning to vernal pastures. The runes were given. The runes were read. And now it was time to make those runes live within us.

The day had not been dark and mysterious. It felt like the opening of Spring as the Folk came together in joy and anticipation of the months ahead.



In days of old, the Nine Herbs spell went like this.

"Be they wound to witch's bane,
In the fire a hag's hate, wains.
An Englishman's foot is bushel bound,
there a swine's snout will be found.
Let the tongue of a toad cover thee
and sprinkle thyself with the dew of the sea.
A tuft of hair from the old man's head,
twined round tight the old wood bed.
Valerian turns away the evilest eye,

and so too must the nymph's spur die.

Lastly Thor's helper must be a strong rod,
and on the gray road your prayers, well shod."



## California

My Experience



When I first joined the AFA two years ago, February of 2021, I had no idea what i was honestly signing up for. I knew that it was a religious organization honoring "the Old Gods and Goddesses" but other than that I didn't have much more to go on than what I read online. Obviously, what I read did not dissuade me as i still decided to join, but what i read online was nothing like what i experienced when my feet first touched the ground at Odinshof. I honestly expected it to be a bunch of lonely dudes hanging around a run-down building drinking and fighting, as that's what was described to me online by the articles I read. And while I knew those articles were hit pieces wrote by

someone riddled with white guilt and self-hatred because that's what mainstream media tells them they need to feel, i still took them with an err of caution and decided not to bring my son, as i pulled into that gravel driveway to a beautifully painted and maintained rustic building with a large hand carved sign in the front, I saw a group of people handing food out to the community in the town, not just to white people, not just to straight people, not just to nuclear families, but to anyone who needed food, turning no one away, even folks who didn't typically look like people who may need food from a food bank. All while having a smiling face. I parked my car and made my way up the steps of the great hall feeling a spiritual force beginning to charge my body; almost as if electricity was pulsating throughout my body. As i opened the double doors into the hall, the smell of a warm homecooked meal made with love filled the air, and the tables in the hall decorated elegantly with an obvious feminine touch let me know this was not just a back yard shin dig thrown together by a bunch of lonely men. I walked into the hall and stopped to look around, taking in all the curious flags hung upon the wall, the Hof Flags above the stage, with a wall tapestry behind it depicting Odin, Frigga, Baldur, Nana, Frey and Freyja, i smiled with a sense of ease, i could feel a comforting hand on my shoulder. i turned around and it was none other than Founder Stephen McNallen. Suddenly, my more-than risqué political shirt I had on seemed out of place and I was nervous as all get out. which was a strange feeling for me as it takes a lot for me to get nervous, yet here was a man, that not just I but many others view as a hero and a mentor, standing in front of me, asking me questions to try and feel me out, see what i was about. safe to say i made a decent enough impression because here i am 2 years later writing my article for the runestone. it only took me less than 2 months to know that i wanted to become a folkbuilder and to dedicate my time and my life to the AFA. The AFA came into my life when i was at a very dark point and the only way i know how to repay that debt is by devoting myself to it and ensuring that those who join feel as if they have come home. Now two years later I am the Odinshof District and Hof Historian. I help run the Odinshof.org Website, I folkbuild for California, Nevada, And Hawaii and I run the Odinshof Adopt-A-Highway with Gythia Sheila McNallen. The AFA takes approximately 8 hours of my life a day, from updating the website, communicating with Folk, planning for events, answering emails, helping any way I can and i would not have it any other way!





# Forward to Victory




It's been a busy month for our family and indeed all of Fólkvangr as the planting season is in full swing.

We have half of this year's plants in the ground and are growing steadily. At the end of the year, we will have utilized three to four acres for crops and put ourselves closer to complete self-sufficiency.

Along those lines, Fólkvangr now has a new kindred aquaponics set up that will be operational in the spring providing us fresh fish and berries year-round.

Fruit is going to be a big leap forward this year as we are compiling our list of fruit trees, berry bushes and grapes to plant. While we are a tad bit behind on them this year the benefits of putting them in are self-evident.





So is the benefits of the meadery being constructed. As owner, it will provide me with the wonderful opportunity to hire members of the folk providing room and board as well as income while they establish themselves in the area. Our work on the meadery is the first big step towards a small community and it goes well. The roofing has been ordered and I'm working on the nonstructural walls inside too. It won't be long, and our mead will be flowing.

And flow it will because we will be donating five to ten gallons of it for this year's Freyr's Harvest Feast. The feast is held over a three-day festival where games, workshops, competitions, and reenactment of the sagas take place. As always, we hold three blots honoring Njord, Freyr and Freya. We've even bumped up the number of speakers, including some of the AFA's own authors. It's always a fantastic time with great food and company. 

# Montana Happenings




April has been a hectic month, with weather ranging from snow and wind to 70 degrees, and back again. No major events took place, but instead, a few smaller happenings.
