Asatru is Our Birthright

"Asatru is the religion with homework"

"You have to earn your hammer"

"The Gods call who they will"

These are all misleading.

It is of course good to study history, lore, runes, language, and all the other thing that help to inform our faith. It is of course good to act in a way that is noble, brave, kind, and righteous.

It is of course up to the Gods to do as they will, and we can't presume to understand the motive.

However, none of these are the defining characteristics of our faith and religion...

Asatru means "Belief in the Gods" or more literally "Troth to the Aesir", a holy faith in the Aesir. This is faith not only in the sense of "belief" but also in the sense of "trust" or "loyalty". "I have faith in you" means more than "I believe you exist", it means "I believe you will do right" and "I believe you will succeed".

Our ancestors are our direct, physical link to the Aesir. The Aesir are the most ancient blood ancestors of our Folk. We are that same link for our descendants and all their progeny.

The Aesir created the world and gave us life, wit, and vigor. Every Blot we make to the Aesir is a return on this gift, made from the world created for us by the Aesir. Our faith is to continue this gift cycle perpetually. We should always be mindful that the Aesir started the gift cycle and our ancestors -Asatru and otherwise- maintained this gift cycle through the successful lives they led. Our existence is proof of this success. Our children's prosperity and faith are proof of our success.

So do your homework. Prove you are honorable. Listen to the call of the Gods. But always remember that Asatru is the birthright of every single one of our Folk, even if they need to be reminded. Bring them home.

Introducing Witan Svan Herul's recent creation, the Folk Futhark!

This is THE rune set of the Asatru Folk Assembly and our Hofs! If you've seen any of Witan Svan's murals, you may have noticed that he uses runes from all four of the main futharks: Elder, Younger, English, & Armanen. The purpose of this, and of the Folk Futhark in general, was to create a living tradition of runes for our modern Folk.

We are no longer Proto-Germanic, nor Vikings, nor Saxons of the Heptarchy, and we are certainly not all Armanen... We are modern Aryans, with our roots spreading across all of Europa, and we are building a modern tradition of Asatru and rune work. This Futhark holds the same concepts and mysteries of the Elder Futhark runes, but some of the staves themselves are borrowed from the other three rune rows.

With all this being said, I will start writing short lessons on each of the Folk runes, and explaining why Witan Svan chose different staves, if applicable. We will study a few runes a month, starting after Ostara!



Now that we talked about the Folk Futhark and what it means for the AFA and modern Asatru, I'd like to start a rudimentary rune study, beginning with the first three runes.

FEHU- This is the first rune of every main futhark, and often symbolizes cattle or wealth, as cattle WAS wealth for our ancestors. Going beyond that, Fehu can be read as a rune of opportunity and potential. Some have equated it to the potential energy that existed before the Big Bang! This fits well with the idea that the Futhark, when studied in order, tell the story of the Cosmos from the beginning to the rising of Gimle out of the waters.

While the concept and name are the same as the Elder Futhark, the stave has been replaced with the Armanen rune known as FA, which is described as "the primal fire".



URUZ- This is always the second rune of any given rune row. It's also one of the runes that means the same thing in both Elder and Armanen rows, although with added connotations in the Armanen.

As Fehu is potential power, or wealth in cattle, or opportunity waiting to happen, Uruz is the logical next step in the greater story told by the Futhark. Uruz is raw, primordial power, it is the aurochs of our ancestors' days. If Fehu is your potential energy, Uruz is having your fists up. Fehu is energy waiting to be used, Uruz is energy READY to be used. Uruz is having a round in the chamber. Uruz is being centered and grounded and ready to defend or attack.



THURISAZ- The third rune of most rune rows, it is the next step after Uruz.

Where Uruz is having your fists up, or your weapon loaded, Thurisaz is throwing the punch or firing the first round. The point in the middle of the rune represents the APPLICATION of the potential energy represented in the previous two runes.

Thurisaz also represents Pórr, the Warrior Prince of Heaven and Earth. Think of the top of the symbol as Heaven/Asgard, the bottom as Earth/Midgard, and the middle point as Thunor charging forward to unleash the might of Mjolnir on anything that seeks to harm the worlds of Gods and Men.





Day of Remembrance



Alexander Rud Mills was born in Forth, Tasmania, and lived from 1885-1964. He was the guiding light for the foundations of Asatru in Australia.

In 1933 Rud Mills began writing books about our faith and in 1936 he founded the Anglecyn Church of Odin. Mills was able to build a solid Asatru community, but during the turbulent times of the Second World war, Rud Mills was bitterly persecuted by his government, and the community that he built was suppressed. With no evidence against him of illegal activity, Alexander Rud Mills was imprisoned. It was nearly a decade before Mills was released and despite all of his efforts, he was unable to revive his church to its former glory.

All was not lost, however. Alexander Rud Mills's many publications and his passion lived on and inspired a new generation. In the 1970s a group of Odinist Students at the University of Melbourne campaigned to have Odinism recognized as a formal religion in Australia, hoping to be able to protect the faith from the same persecution that Mills suffered. It took almost two decades, but by the early '90s, Odinism was granted religious status in Australia.

Alexander Rud Mills's vision also, notably, inspired Else Christensen, who was a leading voice of Asatru in North America.

So, what can we learn from this story?

Alexander Rud Mills didn't live to see the culmination of all of his hard work. When he died Odinism and Asatru were still a repressed faith in his homeland. Even without reward and recognition, he worked until his death, to try and revive the ancient folkway. And he did succeed. Could he have ever imagined how far-reaching his influence would be while he lived? Despite being imprisoned and persecuted for his beliefs, Alexander continued. Even without knowing that his hard work would bear fruit, he continued. He didn't give up in the face of a thankless, and dauntless task. He didn't let his ego or his own self-importance stop him from doing what he believed he needed to do. There were no rewards. There were no praises. There was nothing in it for him except the knowledge and the belief that he was doing the right thing for his folk.

Take from this story the need to remember that the bigger picture, even when we can't see it, is so much more important than just ourselves. We do what we are doing for our children and for their children so that when we are gone they have a foundation strong enough to hold them up and help them build better and stronger.

Sigurblot



Sigurblót literally means 'Victory Blot' and was celebrated by our ancestors in the early summer months. On the one hand, our ancestors were celebrating their victory over the harsh winter. Life had won. On the other hand, our ancestors performed blot to ask for victory. With the warm weather and the completion of the planting time the men often turned their minds to the duty of man. War. Practically speaking, summer was the better time to organize new campaigns and set sail.

In our modern times, the vast majority of us are not familiar with war in a personal way. We do, however, all have our struggles. Sigurblót is a time to refocus. It is the time we can use to reorganize our priorities, figure out the steps we need to take in order to reach our ultimate goals, and break free from those that we struggle with.

One great way to celebrate Sigurblót is to offer a meal or some other item you spent time making thanks for the victory of life. Another option is to sacrifice a bladed weapon to the fire. A nice knife, for example, the blade dulled in battle so that it cannot be used against you (this is symbolic, of course), offered to the fire is a great way to ask our Gods for victory during the coming winter.

Ancestral Food and Culture

Callahann Colcannon



Colcannon is a traditional Irish dish of mashed potatoes and cabbage. Each family has its own recipe that is usually passed from one generation to another.

The Callahan family saves colcannon for special holidays or events and is served at funerals, Winternights, and Yule.

Ingredients

- *2 pounds of russet potatoes, peeled and chopped for boiling
- *2 leeks, washed and chopped (white and light green parts only)
- *1/2 head of cabbage
- *1 stick of butter
- *1 cup heavy cream
- *1 garlic clove, minced
- *3 strips of bacon
- *Green onions for garnish

Instructions:

- *Boil potatoes until tender, about 15-20 min. Drain well and return to pot.
- *Fry bacon and drain, save the drippings. Crumble bacon into small pieces.
- *Using the bacon drippings, add cabbage to the pan. Cook on medium-high heat until cabbage just starts to brown, about 7-9 min.
- *Add leeks to the cabbage and cook until leeks seem tender, about 5 min
- *Add garlic and cook about 1 minute more and remove from heat.
- *Mix potatoes, butter, and heavy cream. Whip with a mixer until creamy. Slowly add more cream if needed for a creamier consistency.
- *Fold bacon and cooked vegetables into potatoes.
- *Garnish with green onion






Heat of Sun, Heat of Battle

We held an auction, in which all proceeds were donated to FreysHof. Many of the pieces in the auction were made by members. We are thankful for everyone who contributed to our auction!




As the sun set and the sky became dark, we all settled around the ritual circle for Sumbel. As we closed Sumbel, the Wicker Man was set a flame.

Offerings for Southern Ohio Midsummer Blot



I was tasked with the honor of making this year's offerings for our summer solstice celebration and couldn't have been prouder of how they turned out. Offerings should never be an afterthought, but rather something that your energy is poured into or is something that is true in its nature such as a gift. I knew that I wanted to make something from all-natural materials, that came from nature.



I decided to make a suncross out of wild-harvested vines. I began by soaking them in water for several hours and then when they were ready, I hand-wrapped them into a circle and wove two pieces into the center. I envisioned the rebirth of our souls becoming closer and closer to the white light that we can strive towards, true Aryan souls not only by natural existence but from our actions and deeds.



Then for Baldrs offering, I had intended to create Sowilo within a wreath from the same vines, but It was not working out at all. I went to bed that night and dreamt of a long boat being offered to Baldr, woven with love and sacrifice of things to remove from our life and a way to honor him, symbolizing his funeral pyre it burned so big and so many tears were shed of those standing near for him, as they understood he would return. When I woke, I began to work on this long boat immediately. It was constructed of the same vines and woven with twine to create the boat portion. A sail with a suncross on it made of fabric was attached with sticks and twine. I struggled to keep this held together. As I'd move on to one the next part, the previous would come apart. I became frustrated but understood that it had to be completed. Upon the 9th time, no exaggeration, it looked different than the other times, I tried something new to shape it and it finally worked. While weaving the final section, a sharp thorn had cut my finger by accident and my blood shed upon the frame of the boat. I began to cry as I took it as a true sign that our offering would be accepted.

The morning of Blot, Christine, and another lady folk helped me weave fresh flowers into the offerings while discussing elements of Asatru and telling the tales of Sunna and Baldr while we listened to folkish music. Christine

was weaving flowers into the offering for Sunna and she was stuck by a sharp thorn as well. Needless to say, we took this as an acceptance of our offering as well. Once they were done, Christine carried them to the outside alter. Christine left papers and writing tools for folks to write things on that they wanted to offer as a sacrifice of oneself to Baldr. Folks were asked to then place the papers within the boat once they were done. The idea was to burn an old part of yourself and be reborn into a better version of yourself.



Just before blot, Christine, Mary Jane, and I went to a private location and we braided strands of beautiful golden yarn and a lock of our own hair into the solar wheel for Sunna as a sacrifice as we galdred three runes that we pulled to symbolize the 3 Norns. We each pulled a rune one at a time. Jera, Sowilo, Uruz was our gift. The weaving was actually more difficult than we thought it would be, but we took that as a sign of real life. Obstacles come up even when you plan for the best and you must work through them and overcome not getting hung up on a snagged thread. Originally Christine was going to offer the offerings into the fire to our Gods, but during our private ritual she asked both of us to do this instead. Maryjane to offer to Sunna and myself to offer to Baldr. I felt truly honored and surprised. I learned from this that when we release the need to control everything, things work out even better than we could have hoped for. A part of me wanted to offer them prior to her extending this honor to us because my love went into making them, but I reflected and took a step back, realizing that it is for us all and not about me and so allowing the officiant to offer them is a true honor. Words cannot describe the bond and trust that was formed during this ritual. I won't speak about blot here as someone else is writing that part out, but I want to share one thing I did experience. As it was time to offer Baldrs offering, as I picked it up, I could immediately feel the burdens and the heaviness that had been placed into the boat by others. All of the things our folk was ready to move on from. Upon placing Baldrs offering into the fire, I could not help but cry as I watched it go up in flames. I could feel the deep emotional releases being removed from our folk standing in blot. It was all very heavy, powerful, and awakening all at the same time. I am truly proud of our folk, to have been able to stand proud and tall with them all as we honored our Gods on this day.

Rune Presentation at Midsummer




Later in the evening, we were originally supposed to have a guest do a rune workshop presentation. Unfortunately, they were unable to attend and so the offer was extended to me to do a presentation on them. I went over different techniques that were my own and ones that I know of others to do. I opened the floor up to our folk to share their techniques and for any questions, they may have had. This was an awesome way to get folks discussing and talking more in-depth among as all. One thing I did stress though is that many like to jump into the esoteric nature of runes, and so I reminded folks to ease with caution as the energy and power within them can deliver things you may not be ready for or expect as they are still unknown in many ways and to ease with caution and respect.

PA Remembrance Dinner



A small, yet consistent group here in PA, held a dinner of remembrance to honor King Athanaric and Sigurd the Volsung. We read the tales and lore behind each one, and then discussed how we could relate these stories to today. We spoke about what fears or hesitations we personally wanted to work on as a testament to honor the brave ones before us. We had a home-cooked meal of beef tongue roast, mashed potatoes, and green beans from our garden. We spoke about the future and what is to come for our folk and enjoyed each other's company as the sunset.





Armanen Rune Yoga Part 8/FA



"Weak thinking, weak acting Lies there, where the masses simmer Since we walk in the Sun, It's powers renew us"

Meister Siegfried Adolf Kummer

Above is perhaps one of my favorite quotes. A reminder that we are better than that and to rise above the "lower ones" in this age. To remember who we are, Sons of the Sun. It is a great duty that lies on our shoulders alone. We must walk with the Sun and bring out that Hidden Sun within ourselves and in a way that is what FA will do for us.

We can think of Fa as the center of the Black Sun. The original flame that stands outside of this universe but also the start of it when HE enters. The causeless cause. In our journey so far, we have worked our way back. Not so much outside but into ourselves. To awaken that spark once and for all that has been asleep too long. Our confidence has grown, and we now do not see a difference between the runes "out there" or the runes "within". We know we are

made up of these energies. We are the Runes.

Before going any further we need to clear up a few things. In Armanism, All Father is not Wotan. All Father is the Original One and Wotan came after but is One with the Father. That is due to all his pursuits and winning them. This will hopefully become a little clearer once the Hagal Rune is explained. I want to make this extremely clear though. Wotan is still our Supreme Guide and God in all of this. Every myth and every lesson He has left us is for us to use. That's why they are there. So that one day his descendants, the right ones at the right time pick them up. Enough said here for now let's move into the actual practice of Fa.

Note: As with all Rune Yoga practices, doing them outside in the direct sunlight, moonlight, or on certain days (solstices, new or full moons) will have a greater effect. Fa especially should be practiced in this way. Also, it is wise to stay with this Rune practice for at least a month. I would suggest at this point doing Is, Ka, Man, Ur, and Cross one day. Not, Eh, Sig, Tyr the next, and Laf, Os, and Fa for day 3.

Stand in the IS rune Stance facing North. Take 5 to 7 deep breaths. Feel the energy entering you from above and below.

Now face the Sun-like in the picture provided forming the Fa Rune (similar to Ka but Left arm raised)

In the mind's eye imagine pulling the Sun's energy into yourself as you breathe in. This can be done somewhat aggressively. Imagine it or feel it going down your body, especially to the groin area.

As you breathe out aggressively, picture yourself sending it back to its source, the Sun. This can and will be a little challenging at first. At this point in time, we haven't really sent out our energy. It just takes time and practice.

Do this for as long as you can and once complete face North again. I generally like to just think to myself "I am home" or "I am one with HE" or something along those lines.

To add, as we know when we greet the Sun we also are greeting an Age that was lost, the Hidden Sun, the Black Sun. We can imagine it behind the actual Sun. Sometimes in this practice, I picture with my eyes closed and the Black Sun above. A green vapor making its way down into me to my hidden Sun in the groin area. What comes out is the same in color. This can be thought of as the Inner Earth where Baldur awaits his return. Maybe in some way, we can bring Him out in ourselves. There is some esoteric symbolism here, but I hope that this will lead to new thinking on your part.

Another very important practice which in a way correlates to awakening the powers in us is to do the Fa Rune practice at night under the new moon. All the perimeters are the same except the time it takes. 3 seven-minute rounds of being in the Fa position. I would suggest keeping your eyes open during this and locked ahead. Essentially, our occult powers are awakening and rising with the Moon as the Hero Prince rises out of the Inner Earth. Try to go right to sleep after this.

To close I would like to discuss some of the transformation aspects as I see it. At this point, the creative part of ourselves is revealed. We create our own reality. We are one with the center again or better stated we are the center. Doubt and fear have vanished. We are eternally ARising. We started all of this as an I. We knew we had power within ourselves and took on the search of becoming so that we may return home again, Immortalized. We were separated from HE long ago and are now with HE again. The circle is complete. We always walk with HIM at this stage. We

stand outside of it all, viewing the world entirely differently. When we decide to enter, to act, we do it with wisdom as HE would. The God part of us, long in slumber is no more. The Hero is now One with the Father. But there is still more. *



Baby Naming and Wedding



RETURN, RENEWAL, RESURGENCE



This Saturday at the Hof, on the 28th, two members of leadership, Gothi Daniel and Folkbuilder Heather Young decided that they would renew their marriage vows, before the Gods and folk, after 25yrs of betrothal. A joyous and wonderful occasion that was beautiful and perfect coinciding with the holy tide of MayDay.

Though it is also important to consider the whole deeper meaning behind this recent occasion. Many folks who have come to Asatru didn't come into the faith by being raised in it. We have come over the chasm from other, or lack of, religions. So many of us have come to faith, after the fact on many sacred threshold celebrations that are intrinsic in our faith culture. Marriage, name fastenings, Man and Woman Making are all truly powerful ceremonies that are testaments that you are a part of the Folk, that you have community, and that you are in fact home.

The weather was perfect! The cool breezes and Sunna's summer heat were blunted by them, under, all benchmarks of making a great day. Folk began arriving and mirthfully talking as the hall was decorated in glassware, and beautiful, sweet-smelling dried flower bouquets. The bride and Bridesmaids then got into a whirlwind prepping, getting on dresses and makeup. Meanwhile, the Groom and sword-bearer and his men were getting dressed in the back of the temple. The Gothar prepared the Ve and the Harrow for the ceremony. Candles were lit and the mead was staged for use. A silken walkway path stretched the breadth of the Hof to the dais of Thor from the door. Bundles of dried lavender were bedecked upon the pews and silk petals were strewn along the walk path.

When everything was set in Ve, the Gothar gathered the Folk in Rumph Hall and led a procession from there to the Ve. Once they were seated the process of the wedding was explained as to what our ceremony consists of two completions. Three oaths were to be witnessed by the Folk as the Couple first were to take an oath, after the invocation

of the Gods and Goddesses, over a brimming horn filled with sacral mead. A sacred promise to the Gods that the words they were about to speak were to be witnessed openly before the Holy powers. Secondly, the lady of the couple was to present a weapon to the husband. A symbol of the husband's role as protector of the family and also a symbol of his need to be the strength and the will of the family and attain the path that works best to the family's success. The man of the couple then gives the lady a set of keys. Tying it upon her wrist, he acknowledges that she is the keeper of the home. She is the source of warmth and love from the hearth and within the hearts of the family itself. A symbol of her role as a creator and caregiver as well as an adjudicator of all things coming into and out of the home. Lastly, the rings are taken by each and as they place the ring upon the finger of their spouse, they recite personal vows that they prepared ahead of time. Once they have recited this, the Oath ring is grabbed by both, and they swear before all present that their words were spoken with truth and severity. The Gothi then binds their hands and together they galvanize their oaths in the Well of Wyrd by submersing their bound hands into the Hlaut Bowl upon the Harrow. This is symbolic of the binding of their fate together through all the joys and trials they may face.

Daniel Young entered the hall with his wedding party with many good folk and friends standing beside him to support him in his oaths. Soon thereafter the bridesmaids came in swathed in lavender and silken dresses and bearing the blade to be given to the groom. They took their places, and everyone stood ready as Heather Young came in. She was escorted to the Dias of Thor by her close friend and kinsman Craig Flynn, and she finally stood adjacent to her husband of twenty-five years to renew her vows. They both supped from the Horn before the Gods, took their oaths over the blade and keys, and spoke beautiful and wise words chosen carefully and honed by years of already trothful love to each other. They exemplified both a new start and the achievement of being together for many years, at the same time. After binding their hands by ring and by cloth, they kissed and presented before the gathered folk and their standing ovation. As they walked out arm in arm it came to full realization that vow renewals are a testament to our success, an event of achievement. Many of us got married before we became True to the Aesir. So, for many folks the deep desire to fully bring their life before the Gods and to incorporate the culture of our faith fully into all aspects of their lives now in the present as they live. This resurgence and desire come from us having a fully functioning religious culture and temples, our holy houses available to conduct these reconnective moments. We have crossed a victory mark by the attainment of Temples in dedication to the Gods and these bright moments are a much-deserved affirmation of our accomplishments in this harsh day and age. We know that we are all bound in Frith and Daniel and Heather in oath and love, and it is known that in the Houses of the Gods, we walk forth together, never to walk forth alone.
