Hail the Friendly Vaetter, spirits of this land and place! We ask you to look upon us in worship, see our deeds!

Hail the Vaetter!

Hail Freyr!
We ask you to join us here,
Witness our devotion,
Hear our praise,
Receive our gifts!

Folk, prepare your gifts for Freyr. From your heart to your hand, and from your hand to the horn, give the best and brightest of yourselves to him.

Ask your hornbearer to collect the gifts of the Folk

"Freyr! The horn is heavy with the gifts of your Folk.

If you find them worthy, take them from us now.

Hail Freyr!"

Hold the horn high and await the acceptance of Freyr.

Pour the gifts into the bowl.

Refill the horn.

We ask, should you to bless the gathered Folk.

THE MAYPOLE DANCE

May Day celebrations are not complete without a May Pole! The May Pole itself is a fertility symbol, with the pole representing a strong masculine energy. The feminine is represented by the beautiful flora decorated crown and the ribbons that wrapped around the pole during the maypole dance.

Following Freyrblot, ask the women to attach the ribbons to the top of the pole and then the menfolk to carry the Maypole "plant" it in a sturdy place already arranged. Divide the group into two groups, those who will dance clockwise and those who will dance counterclockwise. Distribute them along the ribbons evenly. As the group dances, they should go "over" or "under" the person dancing in the opposite direction. The Maypole dance is best done with a good Polka! Once reaching the ends of the ribbons, secure the ends to the pole.

Baldrshof tradition is that those women seeking fertility, asnip a piece of the ribbon ends and take them home with them.


Words from our Gothar

"Warrior Faith" in the Modern Age



Asatru is often called a "warrior faith", and there is some truth to this. Our male ancestors often fought with sword, shield, axe, and spear to protect the things that mattered to them, and that still matter to us. They were almost all required to have some sort of martial bearing, and to be able to stare conflict in the eye without taking a single step backward.

We, those warriors' descendants, live in a time where comfort is king for many people, in the deepest and scariest sense of that phrase. Martial prowess is no longer expected from us, or seen as necessary. There are not currently any physical battles to fight; no need to smash through a shield wall, no need to plant some archers in that tree line over there, etc... However, as humans, we have a physical need to exercise that aggression. And as Aryan humans, we have a need to exercise that aggression in a HEALTHY way.



The best options for this are weightlifting, and combat sports. We will never feel the rush of smashing a war axe through someone's shield, but you CAN feel the raw power of lifting iron off of your chest, or from blocking another man's left hook.

This is a call: if you want to call yourself a warrior, get in the gym. Put on the boxing gloves, or the ace bandages around your joints, and get to work. Face that fight. Make yourself solid in a world of mush.

The Soul Complex, a summary



It's an age-old question. It's taken up many pages in many books, it's been pondered by philosophers, social commentators, and religious leaders for centuries. "What is the soul?" Many cultures across this planet have differing viewpoints on this topic. Recently we had a Gothar meeting on the subject. By the time you read this, Alsherjargothi Flavel and Witan Herul will have had a discussion on Victory Never Sleeps about the Soul and its many parts.

Webster's Dictionary defines it as such,

- : the immaterial essence, animating principle, or actuating cause of an individual life
- : the spiritual principle embodied in human beings, all rational and spiritual beings, or the universe
- : a person's total self
- : an active or essential part
- : a moving spirit
- : the moral and emotional nature of human beings
- : the quality that arouses emotion and sentiment.
- : spiritual or moral force
- : FERVOR

That's the definition, but what do we, as Asatruar define as the soul?

Simply, it's what animates you, makes you unique, it's what makes you...you. It's what makes you human, it's what separates us from animals.

We, in the Asatru Folk Assembly believe that the soul, is broken down into parts. Here in this edition of The Runestone, we will explore the different parts of the Soul Complex, and how each part of the Soul makes us who we are. This will not be exhaustive, but a summary, pulling from *Asatru*, *A Native Spirituality*, by Founder Stephen McNallen, and *Runelore*, by Edred Thorsson. Over the coming months, we will break down each component of the soul, pulling from different sources. If we were to try to compile all we know here, this will turn into a book. Rather than do that, we'll spread it out over the coming months.

Now that we have defined what the soul is, let's break down the soul, as it is seen in Asatru, in a summarized list.

- 1. Lík, The physical body.
- 2. Ek, the ego.
- 3. Hugr, the logical mind.
- 4. Minní, memory.
- 5. Önd, Vital Breath.
- 6. Hamr, The Projected Self.
- 7. Sál, The Shade Self, that which is hidden.
- 8. Hamingja, The Luck or Personal Spiritual Might.
- 9. Fylgja, or the Fetch, The Primal Essence
- 10. Óðr, or Wode, the Ecstatic State, the combination of Hamr and Sál.

In the coming months, we will do a deeper dive into each component, beginning with the Lik. We will explore exercises for each component, and how to use each for your spiritual journey.


Each component makes up the whole, and we will also explore how each part interplays with some or all of the others.





Else Christensen



Originally born in Denmark, Else Christensen (nee Ochsner) was one of the leading figures in the modern Asastu movement. As a young woman, she left her hometown of Esbjerg in favor of Copenhagen. It was during her time in Copenhagen that Else awoke to the ideas of National Socialism in the midst of right-wing and left-wing radical struggles. She met and married Aage Alex Christensen, and together they were members of the Danish Workers Party.

Both she and her husband were imprisoned after the German invasion of Denmark in 1940 for their involvement with elements of the National Workers Party. After their release from prison Else and her husband emigrated to Canada, via England.

Even from Canada, Else continued to nurture her desire to find a place for her own people. It was during this time, while she was reaching out to far-right activists across North America that she first discovered Odinism in a pamphlet titled Call of Our Ancient Nordic Religion, by Alexander Rud Mills. This was the beginning of Else's dedication to the revival of the worship of the Norse Gods. Her understanding of our relationship with the Gods was heavily influenced by the idea that the Gods were encoded in the collective unconscious of the Aryan race.

In 1969 Else Christensen founded the Odinist Fellowship. Until her death in 2005, Else worked tirelessly for her folk, spreading the word of our faith and our Gods to all who would listen. She founded a prison outreach program that proved to be instrumental to

many men. She wrote and published many publications. Her efforts saw her recognized as the Folk- Mother to Asatruar everywhere.

So, what can we learn from this story?

We don't always know where our stories end. We can't always see the ramifications of our thoughts when put into action. Else was just one single woman. She was a woman who believed in unpopular ideas in a time when those ideas were definitively unpopular. Despite being imprisoned for those beliefs she did not give up.

Our current times are, in many ways, similar to the ones that Else dealt with. They are turbulent and wrought with anger on all sides. We stand at the precipice of a new world, but we have no way of knowing which way the tides will turn. Else didn't turn and run. She stood and faced the future. In doing so she became one of the most important women in the Asatru movement to date.

When things are hard, when public opinion would have you conform, just remember. Your story hasn't reached its end yet, and only you can control the direction the story takes.

Stand strong.

Stand with Else.

On May Day, sometimes called Sumermál, big celebrations were held both to celebrate the end of the harder days of winter and to bless themselves and their crops for a fertile and productive year. Men and women leapt over fires together or alone, wishing for fertility in the coming year. The maypole was raised and around it, people danced and wove their ribbons. Women decorated their windows and doors with flowers and wove them into their hair.

Mayday is the coming together of men and women to celebrate life. We use this time to celebrate all the good things that we have, all of the things that we have worked hard for. We have survived the harsh months when stagnation is so easy a thing to fall into. When the celebration is done, the real hard work begins. The plan that was set into motion at Charming of the Plow will now begin the active stage. Those seeds that you planted, or that project that you planned at Ostara, will now need real tending to. Mayday marks the beginning. It marks the start of growth.

We can't wait to see you around the campfire! Don't wait!



Freyr's Harvest Feast in Montana | September 22nd-24th



Freyr's Harvest Feast is the time to honor the Gods after a productive year's Harvest. On September 22nd through the 24th, we gather together for a weekend filled with activities that honor the three Vanir deities Njord, Freyr, and Freya.

During the course of the weekend, the folk gathers together for three blots using mead donated by Heinlein's Hollow Meadery.

In addition to blot, we see the display of Freyr's Proposal on stage (stage under construction), the viking games tournament with a prize to be revealed at the feast as well as access to the Drengr Dinner where all previous years' champions are invited out the day before the event.

In addition to brawn, the brain is tested in our Hnefatafl competition. While this competition is less fierce the bragging rights are still pretty good. Guests can also test their luck at a game of Orlog.

While there are plenty of contests, we still have plenty of time for several workshops, and speeches by guest speakers. Craftsmen will also bring their wares out to sell and authors to sign their books. An AFA benefiting auction will provide ample opportunities to walk away with a bag full of spoils.

The whole event is hosted on a private 20-acre ranch in a very low-population area. It's on the river and away from prying eyes. So not only do you get to enjoy a full event you can take in the beauty of rural Montana, enjoy the river and see what an AFA homestead looks like. An optional tour and sumbel will be held in the early morning for those wanting to see inside a proper meadery.

Lodging is straightforward as well. Bring an RV or tent and camp under the beautiful stars. Trust us when we say there's more of them visible than wherever you're coming from and on lucky nights the Northern Lights can be seen.

For those who want less rustic accommodations, there are numerous hotels and motels within a reasonable driving distance. In a few more years we will have cabins available too!

So that's lodging but everyone's got to eat right? Well, we got you covered as well. The meals are all plentiful and delicious, none more so than the feast itself. Last year we filled the dining hall with food and refreshments and this year we aim to provide just as much good fare. Five to ten gallons of mead will be provided for the feast according to turnout and the couples dance that follows is always great fun.

Remember to dress your best at the feast and dance but it won't all be formal. For the first blot, we go into the water to honor Njord. Ladies especially, make sure that you wear clothes that you're not only comfortable getting wet but are also modest when wet.

While the prospect of getting into the water in September might be daunting to some, the month has a wonderful climate. It has a high of 70 and a low of 50 with a nice midday breeze.

The truth is unless you come out you won't know what you're missing so don't make that mistake and come out to Freyr's Harvest Feast.

Please make your will **today**.








Cooking for our Folk



Cooking from the Heart. One of the first chefs I worked for told me that there are two main rules to cooking.

- 1. ALWAYS cook from the heart!
- 2. You must know the why of the rule before you can think about breaking it.

To this day, I still believe that number one is the most important; but two is the most valuable lesson. So, for example: why would you add flour to the mix when you are making Fried Potato balls? It doesn't add anything to the dish overall and in fact, it takes away flavor and disrupts texture. The reason is that what flour takes away: is moisture. It adds to the binder and liquid consumption.

So, what does this mean for the folk? Plan and simple, don't take shortcuts. Whenever I pick up the knife and began cooking for the folk, I think of it as channeling the ancestors. Cooking reminds me of that age-old musing "I don't measure seasoning; I wait for the tap on the shoulder from the ancestors to tell me that's enough."

When you cook from the heart, people can tell. Don't cook out of spite or obligation. Cook for the folk because you want to! Find new recipes. Test them. Make them better. And when your heart tells you it is right...time to serve. If you have never made

cookies from scratch...make them. Why not? Use the best ingredients you can afford (don't take out a second mortgage for this) but be proud to feed the folk.

Ancestral Food and Culture

Good Mornings Start with Fresh Bagels and Coffee



In America we may associate bagels with New York City, but they have a long and storied Aryan past. They are believed to have originally been invented in German monasteries during the Middle Ages, much like their cousins the pretzel. They were brought from Germany into Poland by peasant farm workers. They have become a staple food in the country going by the name obwarzanek and are found in most Central European countries. In America today, bagels are found everywhere in grocery stores, cafes, and drive thrus, but for me, nothing beats homemade. They're simple and once you get a knack for it, they're very easy to make.

For the dough:

1 and 1/2 C warm water

4 tsp yeast

4 C flour

1 Tbsp honey

2 tsp salt

Eggwash:

1 egg, beaten

2 Tbsp water

For Boiling:

2 Quarts water

1/4 Cup honey

Any bagel seasoning you might like on top (everything, onion/garlic salt, coarse sea salt, sesame seeds)

Add yeast, warm water and honey to a mixing bowl or stand mixer, allow yeast time to activate and foam (5-7 minutes)

Mix in flour and salt, forming stiff, dry dough

Knead for 5-7 minutes or until smooth and stiff

Allow the dough to rest in a clean, covered dish for an hour or until doubled in size

Preheat oven to 425°F

Line two baking sheets with parchment paper

Put the water and honey for boiling on the stove at medium heat allowing it to warm as you shape the bagels

Divide dough into 8 equal sized parts and form each into a ball

To form the bagel shape, slightly flatten each ball and poke your finger through the center of it. Gently stretch from both sides until the hole in the center reaches around 2 inches.

Allow each bagel a few minutes to rest before boiling

When the water reaches boiling, place two bagels at a time in and allow them to boil 2-3 minutes. They should float when they're done.

Set each bagel on the parchment as it's removed from the water to give them time to cool off.

Once your bagels have had time to cool, gently dip the top side only in the egg wash then dust with seasoning.

Bake 20-25 minutes, until golden brown.

It's important to give your bagels a bit to rest out of the oven to allow them to become chewy and delicious. I usually let them sit for 15-20 minutes before cutting into one.

Serve with butter, cream cheese, jam, as a breakfast sandwich or with soup. They're delicious however you choose to enjoy.

- 2 English Cucumbers
- ½ C sour cream
- 1 Tbsp white vinegar

- 1 tsp sugar
- 1 Tbsp fresh dill chopped
- ½ tsp salt
- black pepper to taste


Instructions

- 1. Peel the cucumbers if desired and thinly slice them with a mandolin slicer. The thinner the better! Put them in a large salad bowl.
- 2. In a medium bowl, whisk together sour cream, vinegar, sugar, and dill. Salt and pepper to taste.
- 3. Pour dressing over cucumber slices and toss until combined.
- 4. Cover and refrigerate at least 4 hours or overnight.
- 5. Serve with a slotted spoon.



To Hexennacht or HexenNot



As a single, middle-aged guy living in a house full of men, I bravely and consistently fight the uphill battle to convince my neighbors that I'm not gay. Some days, I gain ground; like that time a female delivery driver was seen leaving my house in her personal vehicle. Some days, I lose ground, like the roughly weekly occurrence of coming home to find shirtless dudes tussling in my lawn. On this particular occasion, I pulled into my driveway to witness the birth of a homemade Bulgarian Bag; a Frankenstein's Monster of a piece of exercise equipment cobbled together from an old tire, sand, rocks, and tape; designed by a Bulgarian Olympiad wrestler to mimic the act of carrying and swinging sheep... because, that's a thing.



After witnessing a master class in cutting-edge artificial sheep swinging technology, it was down to business. We have ordered 90 trees for planting, that's a lot of trees. Standard logic will tell you that shipping so many trees is prohibitively expensive so I need to drive the truck to the nursery in northwestern Michigan on the upcoming

weekend to pick them up. Fortunately, I can add some efficiency to the trip by tossing out a quick Michigan moot on my way back home.

About 6 hours after beginning my journey I've backed my truck up to a rolling door and I'm standing in the nursery's shipping warehouse, where men are packing boxes and loading skids. I give one of the guys the order number. "I'm here to pick up 90 trees, I'm parked outside." The man looked over his list and said "looks good bud, here ya' go" before basically tossing me a sandwich bag stuffed with what 90 "trees" apparently look like.



On the plus side, there was still plenty of room in the back for what remained of my dignity (not pictured).



Many people are of the opinion that skepticism and religion do not mix well, but I disagree. Just because Wyrd, divination, omens and the supernatural are often marginally observable things to us, it is important to consider our individual biases and fallibility as we attempt to interpret them. For this reason, I tend to enact whatever I have decided to do regardless of any "coincidental" actions and then ponder over their significance later. I also tend to "play it by ear" much of the time assuming that the finer details will shape themselves as they should (also I'm lazy and disorganized.)

Regardless, I had not driven more than a mile down the road when I came across a man selling backyard maple syrup. Being a religious man (as well as a dope) I thought to myself "perhaps this is why I was meant to come up here (since it obviously wasn't "trees")."



I do always like to purchase locally made goods for offerings when I travel, I think it's a nice touch. I thought to myself "but what should I serve with this syrup" another mile down the road I find a place selling locally baked loaves of cinnamon and raisin bread, I pick up one of each some strawberries and a locally produced cherry juice for the libation. The small greenhouse attached to the building even had some juniper plants (juniper being a plant traditionally used (to my understanding) in old saining rituals).



About this time, I'm feeling pretty good about the Wyrd of the situation. I trek on southward until I arrive at the park, we had chosen to meet with the stalwart individuals who showed up in spite of the touch-and-go weather situation. We had a pleasant time gathering and socializing amongst ourselves (admittedly I was pretty low energy by this point). Blot time was coming so I gathered my usual items and laid out the gifts that I had brought to act as an offering to Freyja (an appropriate choice of deity given the holiday) who, after looking down upon our gifts... opted to more or less dump a bucket of water on my head.



I recall thinking, "it would be reasonable to interpret this as a bad omen" but faint hearts never win fair ladies, and so we stood resolutely and conducted our blot in the downpour (which predictably ended as soon as we finished). Perhaps with a little less fanfare, but the rites were observed, and the gifts presented in good faith.



During the journey home myself and a companion traveling back to the Hoosier Urheimat with me, met with a friend and had a good time throwing some axes. About halfway through the night, a beautiful young woman walked in and is introduced to me by my friend; we exchange pleasantries and I wonder if the goddess of beauty is rewarding me for my perseverance during Rain-Blot 2023 (or if this girl is being punished for some malfeasance and being cursed with a rain-bedraggled, sleep deprived middle-aged nerd; just as good) but I strongly suspect that the more likely scenario is that our Lady simply hadn't finished waterboarding me, time will tell.






Roll Dice with Your Kids



Like many people, I pay some attention to what is going on in the world. From the recent addition to the Minnesota state legislature (and the horrific bill that is being introduced by said addition) and the anti-free speech laws being passed in Florida (and being signed in a foreign country apparently, for some reason) it becomes easy to get caught in a negative mindset. Between all that is going on and having to work extra just to make ends meet (or barely keep your head above water) it becomes easy to put "childish" things to the wayside, specifically the "childish" things that your kids are interested in and want to do.

As anyone who pays attention to popular culture is aware, all that is good is being twisted to be presented as evil and even the supposedly most wholesome and popular content creators are now pushing unhealthy and immoral ideas and lifestyle choices to children. It can become quite depressing, having to go through and curate what content your children have access to (and the tools for parental controls typically do not allow for such stringent control of unacceptable content, making your job all the more difficult.)

Now, the "easy" thing to do would be to just tell your kids no and prevent them from accessing content at all. Everything is terrible and you are so busy with work after all. But your children WILL interact with popular culture, and it is being weaponised against you and your culture. Every avenue that can be taken from you is being done so (I literally had my discord account deleted for "hateful content" when all I ever used it for was to talk about the funny antics of a Kenku Bard in my local D&D game). A negative outlook and reinforcement is not what is needed to defeat the forces being leveled against us and our children.

What is needed is for us to remember that the "childish" things that our kids want to do are what will help shape their future. The way to push back against the hostile and sick

world that stands against us (and comes for our children, as it came for us when we were young) is to build a positive culture for our children to become enmeshed in. This means not only teaching them right from wrong and having them join with their Folk on a regular basis, but to create and play games with them that reinforce our values. I have found that, along with playing with swords and other weapons, teaching my kids to play D&D seems to be a good tool for this. Along with math skills, I can curate and create a story for them to take part in, where the bad guys are bad, and the good guys are good (and there isn't some blue haired inclusivity director trying to teach my kids, they are born evil and all the other crazy crap there is out there). They genuinely enjoy it and daddy gets to show them what is good and cool, rather than just harp and moan on what is terrible and needs to be blocked.

If you don't teach and play with your children, someone else will do it in your stead. Our Folk need to be brought up strong and healthy, both in body and mind. Do not get so distracted that the most important people get pushed to the sidelines, either because you are wrapped up in what is going on in the world, or because you are having to chase a dollar. Our children and their culture are our future. Build it with them now.


connection to our gods and goddesses and ancestors.



Walpurgisnacht Moot



May Day New Hampshire





Central Ohio Haufbrauhaus Moot





PA Hike and Eir Blessing



The Redcoats are Coming



While waiting for the next set of orders to be passed, the British gathered their strength in the city stronghold of Boston, conversation and drink were a necessity. The soldiers knew they had some distance to cover, they knew there was cold lead itching to be spit into their chests. War brings out the worst and best of men, either way a nice swig of brandy can calm some nerves. The battle for Lexington was close at hand, The capture of Samuel Adams and John Handcock was plotted. One command is all that was needed, one command to set this epic tale in motion. "Forward March!"

Yet!!!

Who cares about the British, Taxation without Representation, 13 colonies being ruled half a world away, by a King who was stubborn. King George refused to lose his grip, his control of the people who now inhabited this new green and fertile land. This was just folly; the Patriots saw this corruption for what it was and took matters into their own hands. But that is a different story.

The Midnight Ride is the epic I speak of. Paul Revere risked family and his own life for

the sole purpose of saving his Patriot Brothers and protecting an idea that sounded ever so sweet when it rolled off the tongue, freedom!

On the evening of April 18th, 1775, Paul's presence was requested by one of the last major Patriot leaders hidden in and amongst the overwhelming coats that occupied Boston. Upon his arrival Paul was brought up to some significant news. The British troops were to march on Concord, destroying any and all storage/ammo houses in their path. Another important note was the arrest of both Samuel and John who were staying with Hancock's relatives in Lexington. Paul began constructing his own plan of action, he returned to his neighborhood where he contacted a close friend, asking the man to climb the bell tower of Christ's Church to set the infamous signal, the Two Lanterns. One lantern meant the British planned to march by land, whereas two emphasized the troops' plans to cross the Charles River.


Paul then prepped for the 12-mile horse ride to Lexington. Making his way down to the North End waterfront Revere slipped into a small rowboat to cross the mouth of the Charles River. The water wasn't safe by any means, he had to sneak past the British warship HMS Somerset. The ship had been anchored close to where the ferries normally traveled to Charlestown, pressing past Paul and making his way deeper into town. After confirming that the Sons of Liberty had seen the lanterns that were lit Revere mounted a horse and began his race through the countryside. Just outside of Charlestown Paul was confronted by a British patrol, spurring his stead, he blasted by narrowly escaping capture.

Paul rode hard, waking and notifying all the humble Patriots in his path. When he arrived at the steps of the Hancock residence in Lexington, he was approached by a sentry who wished to know his business and asked Revere not to make so much noise! "Noise! You'll have enough noise before long! The regulars are coming out!" Contrary to belief Paul Revere never actually shouted "The redcoats are coming!" That was the work of Henry Longfellow, a Poet who took the written accounts of April 18th, twisting them, publishing a newer, fresher version. Yet while doing so he left behind such a great story.

Paul Revere is a great example of a Patriot, but he also shows the true power of brotherhood and standing for something more than just himself. He would do anything for those he called family. This story gives a brief glimpse into how impactful an idea can become, how it can grow and push men to tackle great feats.

Our Founder Stephen McNallen has shown the same qualities as he progressed through the years. He held on to an Idea, a belief that has impacted everyone reading. We have the tools to make the AFA more than just grand, a Utopia for generations to come. All it takes is the courage to become involved. If you don't believe in anything, believe in this organization, take care of those you call family. Together let's tackle the feat of feats! Bring our Folk home and our Roots back to the forefront!





Moosehunt: Spring Preparation

English:

Moose-season up in the north is sacred. Back in the day it was assumed that the first week of moose-hunt, no hunter would show up for work. I've heard several stories of people matter of fact letting their employer know that if they don't get time off for hunting moose in September, they'll look for work elsewhere.

It used to be a life and death situation. When the crops failed and survival was at stake, being able to bag a moose would be a lifesaver.

The total moose population in Sweden is estimated to about 320 000. About 25%, 80 000, is felled each year. Needless to say, the moose remains one of the most important game in Sweden to this day. Maybe the most important.

This time of year, many hunters focus their attention on preparing for autumns hunt. The most important task is making sure the stands from which most hunters hunt from are in serviceable condition. A lot of repairing is needed every year, and eventually a stand needs to be replaced by a new one.

Every hunting team has their own design and look to their stands. What they share in common is giving the hunter a good place to sit, watch from and keep their heavy backpack full of food and coffee to last them the day.

It is oftentimes a communal activity getting together to build new moose stands. Between hammering in nails and sawing boards, there is at least one fika, where all things moose are discussed. How is the population looking this year? What stories can we share from last year? Who has a new promising hunting dog in the team? Will it be a good summer or a bad one for the moose?

The pregnant cows are just weeks away from having their calves. Will this be a good summer for them to thrive? Time will tell!

Svenska:

Älgjakten uppe i norr är helig. För i tiden antog man att älgjaktens första vecka skulle se flera arbetsplatser tomma på personal. Jag har hört flera personer berätta att de har givit arbetsgivare ultimatum: Om jag inte får ledigt för älgjakten, så söker jag arbete någon annanstans.

Det brukade handla om liv och död. När skörden slog fel, och ens överlevnad stod på spel, så kunde en skjuten älg betyda allt.

Den totala älgstammen i Sverige uppskattas till 320 000 individer. Ungefär 25%, 80 000 fälls årligen. Det är ingen överdrift att säga att älgen fortfarande är ett av Sveriges viktigaste vilt. Kanske till och med det viktigaste.

Den här tiden på året fokuserar många jägare på att förbereda för höstens jakt. Det viktigaste är att se till att älgtornen är i gott skick. Många torn är i behov av reparation, och tids nog behöver alla torn bytas ut.

Varje jaktlag har sin egen torn-design. Vad som förenar dem är en komfortabel sittplats med god utsikt och rum för en tung ryggsäck full av mat och kaffe som räcker hela dagen.

Det är oftast en gemensam aktivitet när man ska bygga nya torn. Mellan hammrandet av spikar och sågande av brädor så tar man minst en fika. Samtalsämnet är då, föga

förvånande, älg. Hur ser stammen ut? Vad minns vi från föregående år? Har någon en ny älghund på gång? Blir det en bra eller dålig sommar för kalvarna?

De dräktiga korna är veckor ifrån att föda sina kalvar. Kommer det bli en bra sommar för dem? Den som lever får se!






