The basic idea is that your Folkbuilder will follow events during a natural disaster in your area, contact you if necessary to assure your safety, and help us come to your aid if you need it. We urge you to take prudent precautions to assure your own welfare, of course, based on published Red Cross and Homeland Security standards.

Starting in the next issue of *The Voice*, our Family Safety Program will walk you through a step-by-step monthly program designed to help you affordably and systematically prepare for power outages, hurricanes, fires, floods and other disasters which might strike your home or endanger your family.



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

In Memory - Clark Wullenweber 1947 - 2014



Clark Wullenweber, AFA-WV went to his ancestors March 29th, 2014. He was born on a farm in Ohio, and spent most of his life in Florida, retiring to West Virginia four years ago.

Clark was a veteran of the Vietnam War, receiving a Purple Heart after being shot by the enemy. After his recovery he went on to train special forces at Fort Bragg, NC, and also to fight in the war in Biafra as a mercenary.

An avid historian, he retired after 20 years working in a museum in St Augustine, FL, where he was the favorite of the many thousands of schoolchildren that he spoke with every year. A skilled craftsman, he took what he had learned of traditional carpentry from his grandfather and applied it to creating 18th century style furniture. Although woodworking was his primary skill, he was more than proficient at blacksmithing, thatching, leatherwork and horning. He was a standing member of the Guild of Horners, and one of his powder horns is owned by the King of Spain.

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ancestry. He wore his hammer every day, and never shied away from explaining his faith and love of folk to all who would listen. Clark believed in Tradition above all things, and the nobility of the folk.

His influence in Asatru in the southeastern US is not to be underestimated. Through his influence and tutelage, the $Hr\tilde{A}_{l}^{l}$ fn Wudu Kindred was created, of which all are long standing AFA members.

His funeral was arranged and conducted by Brad Taylor-Hicks and Calen Smith, who saw to it that his final wishes were met. His remains are to be interred later this year and a veteran's headstone with the Mjolnir symbol is being secured as a memorial stone for him. He will be laid to rest in the same cemetery as his ancestor, frontiersman Lewis Wetzel. He is survived by his mother, Jaqueline Wullenweber; his wife, Pamela; and his beloved Kinfolk.


Wisdom On Going

Written by long time AFA member Stefn Piparskeggr, <u>The Piparskeggrsmal</u>, like the Sayings of Har, is (as Piparskegrr himself says): "written in what is called gnomic verse. This is a poetic method, first noted in Greece during the 6th Century BCE, of conveying advice or wisdom (not necessarily the same thing) in a form that was easy to memorize.â€□ Although the use of such gnomes (as they are called) is widespread—besides the ancient Greek writings, they may be found in Old English poems, such as Beowulf, and in later English poetry such as works by Alexander Pope or William Blake, and even most recently in Robert Creeley's modern gnomic â€~verses'—it's a rare to find them executed well. As editor G. M. Palmer of *Strong Verse* explains, most gnomic poems feel as if they were the product of the "poet-on-high telling us how to behave. But it's worse than that. It's the poet-on-high, the poet-guru, telling us in enigmatic phrases, how to behave. What is. What to be.â€□

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of verse is offered not as imperial rules that ought to be followed but as wise and caring guidelines, set to paper for the benefit of those folk who will heed them.

Written in what Piparskeggr refers to as "standard Pipsdraupa, 4 lines of 8 beats each,â€□ these verses are numbered, but not arranged in thematic groupings. They organically weave themselves around, through, and back to the sundry subjects that constitute Tru life.

There is more and deeper Asatru wisdom distilled into these verses than can be found in many other books on the subject. Take Verse 147 for example:

147

If you will look unto the Gods
Give steadfast love and worship true
Acknowledge Them and Gift Them well
Then They will look, and see you too

The truth of this exchange between our Folk and our Gods has never been told so finely before, or so memorably. Which is the power of Piparskeggr's gnomic gems.

Ranging from personal observation:

11

I only know, that I believe
In Faithful Troth, to Holy Ones
My Words and Deeds, with Rightful Wit
Do Shape myself and build Orlay

to wise advice wrought of hard won experience:

There comes a day in ev'ry life When news is bad, or sometimes worse to thoughts that are sage, comforting and profound:

My Odal Lands are far away
From place where I lay down my head
But they are there within my bones
They call my heart and Know my Name.

each verse is distinct, transcendent, august, and poetically sound, while keeping the same poetic voice throughout. It is not an easy style to sustain.

Besides containing 450 gnomes (as if that weren't enough!), there is an afterword of extra words, an extra poem and the Nine Ignoble Thewsâ€"a wry summation of truisms gleaned from Pip's 25 plus years in the greater Pagan community.

The slim <u>Piparskeggrsmal Book 1</u> might not be a 100 pages long (it is 94 pages long, to be exact), but it is a trove of Tru inspiration: in it there is a world of words telling of wisdoms tried and true, of holy meditation and of high mindedness, and a genuinely remarkable feeling of sage companionship as well.

It is not without realizing what I am saying that I sayâ€"I think that this book is a book that shall indeed go on to become renowned and regarded far beyond its own time. It is a book that every Asatruar ought to read, to memorize parts of, to gift copies of. It is a book to take from the shelf in good times and in troubled times, when no other words will do but these words, for these words were written for our folk by one of our own. There is much in it for every time and everyone who heeds. I am very, very glad to have a copy of The Piparskeggrsmal Book 1 of my own. I have read it back to front, and over and over. And I know that I will continue to read from it as my life goes on. I understand that Book 2 is currently being written; I cannot wait.

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Who become those, we learn from, like
To better selves, within our hearts
Their manner calls, we owe them thanks
