Fire Season Tips by Ryan Harlan

In the August issue of The Voice, Steve mentioned in the Family Safety section that there were many wild fires burning in Northern California. Every year, all across the world, wild fires burn millions of acres of public and private land. Many of us, including myself, live in areas that are prone to wild fires. Last year on my forest we had the largest fire in the recorded history of the Sierra Nevada Mountains. I have worked as a firefighter for the U.S. Forest Service for 14 years now, and the one thing that I notice every fire season is the lack of preparedness by those residents who are in the fire's path.

The best thing that you can do as a home owner or resident in the "wild land urban interface," or where our natural world comes into contact with "civilization," is to make sure

to the tree tops) like brush, moving fire wood away from your house, and keeping your roof and gutters free of leaves and pine needles. All are very simple and very doable projects that can save your home and – for some areas – could keep you from being fined. If you are not sure if your home or property is defensible, call your local fire protection district, State Forestry, or Forest Service station. Most departments are more than willing to give advice or come out and take a look and let you know how you could improve your defensible space.

For those of us who live a little closer to the forest, we might want to consider a little bit more protection. Rolls of fire shelter material can be bought (though it is very expensive!) that can be put on your house in the same manner as siding by using staples and aluminized tape. Sprinkler systems can be built out of PVC pipe and mounted on your roof and either run off of your well (so long as you don't lose power) or run off of small gaspowered pumps which can be bought at tractor supply places or found online. Do not rely on public water systems that can become over-taxed in an emergency! Small aboveground swimming pools can be used as an emergency water source that can be stored away during the winter. Try to find one that can hold at least 800 to 1000 gallons and that is self-supporting if possible.

If a fire starts in your area and there is a possibility of needing to evacuate, be proactive and pack important items, documents, clothes, extra cash, and other items that might be needed before you are given an evacuation order. Have an escape plan along with emergency provisions for at least 24 hours. Know how many options you have for escape, as some areas have limited access or egress. By knowing your options and being proactive you can avoid traffic jams. If you have pets or livestock, make sure that you include them in your plans. Try and get your furry friends to safety, too. My local area has a few organizations that can help provide for short-term pet and livestock care for emergencies, and one will even come to rescue horses and other animals if you cannot make it yourself. Try and locate such an organization if there is the possibility of need. If you have family or friends in your area, make sure that they are aware of your emergency plans. If you don't have anyone close by, make sure that your folk builders are in the loop! This is in no way a comprehensive list and is not guaranteed to save your home, property, loved ones, or pets. But by being as prepared as possible we can all increase our odds. I

Meet us at the Clan MacLean tent after Parade of the Clans, and we will find a nice spot to BIót. Festival admission and parking are free!





Odinic Hero of the Future

A Review of: The Tribes of Yggdrasil â€" Books 1 and 2 by Hugh B. Long published by Asgard Studios; available on amazon.com and smashwords.com

AFA member Hugh B. Long (a.k.a. Eoghan Odinsson) has written the first two in a series of science fiction novels called "The Tribes of Yggdrasil.â€□ I have read and enjoyed both.

This adventure series is set a hundred and some years in the future. The basic scenario is classic science fiction -- think Star Trek and that ilk -- with humans traveling through space and meeting other races. The twist is that the space aliens are based on races from Norse mythology, including Alfar and Svartalfar (dwarfs). Bits of the old lore are worked into the story to good effect.

The hero, Hal, is just that – a hero – without being too good to be true. His all-too-human doubts and fears, temptations and frustrations, make him believable; his steadfastness and courage in the face of overwhelming odds make him admirable as well as likeable. He is also an avowed Odinsman, the ancient virtues of the Germanic people forming his guiding principles. In this future world multiple religious systems are followed by mankind. One of Hal's Italian colleagues prays to Janus, another friend is Christian, and all seem comfortable with their diversity of spiritual paths. In Book 2, however, we get a first glimpse of a dangerous religious extremism from a non-human quarter.

Malicious alien races are not the only foes; Hal also faces the more homely problems of dysfunctional government, confusing relationships with women, and trust issues with long-time friends. The mistreatment of a little boy shows how a young mind can be warped. The story is thus deeper than a simple shoot-em-up action adventure.
